1	A BILL for an Act to create and enact chapter 54-17.8 a new chapter to title 15 of the North				
2	Dakota Century Code, relating to the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund; to amend and				
3	reenact subsection 1 of section 57-51-15 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the oil				
4	and gas gross production tax; to provide an appropriation; and to provide a continuing				
5	appropriation.				
6	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:				
7	SECTION 1. Chapter 54-17.8 A new chapter to title 15 of the North Dakota Century Code is				
8	created and enacted as follows:				
9	<del>54-17.8-01.</del> Definitions.				
10	1. "Advisory board" means the North Dakota outdoor heritage advisory board.				
11	2. "Commission" Board means the industrial commission board of university and school				
12	lands.				
13	3. "Fund" means the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund.				
14	54-17.8-02. North Dakota outdoor heritage fund - Continuing appropriation.				
15	There is created a North Dakota outdoor heritage fund that is governed by the				
16	commission board. Any money deposited in the fund is appropriated on a continuing basis to the				
17	commission board for the purposes of this chapter. Interest earned by the fund must be credited				
18	to the fund. The commission board shall keep accurate records of all financial transactions				
19	performed under this chapter.

## 1 54-17.8-06. North Dakota outdoor heritage advisory board - Members. 2 There is created a North Dakota outdoor heritage advisory board consisting of twelve <u>1.</u> 3 members. The governor shall appoint representatives from each of the groups listed in this section based upon recommendations made by the appropriate group. The 4 5 advisory board consists of: 6 Four members from the agriculture community. The governor shall appoint one <u>a.</u> 7 member from the North Dakota farm bureau, North Dakota farmers union, the 8 North Dakota stockmen's association, and the North Dakota grain growers 9 association. 10 Two members from the energy industry. The governor shall appoint one member b. 11 from the North Dakota petroleum council and one member from the lignite energy 12 council. 13 Four members from the conservation community. The governor shall appoint one C. 14 member from ducks unlimited of North Dakota, the North Dakota natural 15 resources trust fund, the North Dakota chapter of pheasants forever, and the 16 conservation community at large. 17 One member from the business community from the greater North Dakota <u>d.</u> 18 chamber. 19 One member from the North Dakota recreation and park association. 20 The governor also shall appoint to the advisory board one representative from each of <u>2.</u> 21 the following agencies to serve as ex officio, nonvoting technical members: the 22 department of parks and recreation, the game and fish department, the office of the 23 state forester, and the North Dakota association of soil conservation districts. 24 <u>3.</u> The term of office of each member of the advisory board is four years and members 25 may not serve more than two consecutive terms. The terms of office commence on the 26 first day of July. The initial terms for the advisory board members must be staggered 27 following a method determined by the advisory board. 28 The advisory board shall select a chairman from among the members. Seven voting 4. 29 members is a quorum at any meeting. 30 The advisory board shall have at least two regular meetings each year and additional <u>5.</u> 31 meetings as the chairman determines necessary at a time and place to be fixed by the
