- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 15.1-09.1 of the North Dakota
- 2 Century Code, relating to audits of regional education associations; to amend and reenact
- 3 sections 15.1-01-03, 15.1-09.1-10, 15.1-27-03.1 and 15.1-27-04.1 of the North Dakota Century
- 4 Code, relating to the powers and duties of the state board of public school education and the
- 5 determination of state aid payable to school districts and regional education associations; to
- 6 provide statements of legislative intent; and to provide for a legislative management study.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 8 **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-01-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 10 15.1-01-03. State board of public school education Powers and duties.
- 11 1. The state board of public school education shall:
- 12 a. Assist county committees in carrying out their duties.
- b. Provide county committees with clerical assistance, plans of procedure,
 standards, data, maps, forms, and other materials, information, and services.
 - c. Appoint members to the county committee, if the county superintendent does not fulfill this duty, as provided for in section 15.1-10-01.
 - d. Provide oversight for regional education associations as required by chapter
 15.1-09.1.
 - 2. The state board of public school education may adopt rules regarding school district reorganizations, annexations, and dissolutions in accordance with chapter 28-32.
- SECTION 2. A new section to chapter 15.1-09.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

2	To be eligible for state funding, a regional education association must be audited, at least					
3	<u>annually</u>	, by a certified public accountant or a licensed public accountant. The audit must be				
4	presente	ed to the state board of public school education. If any irregularities are noted, the state				
5	board of public school education may direct the superintendent of public instruction to withhold					
6	all payments to a regional education association until the board determines the irregularities					
7	have been addressed.					
8	SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-09.1-10 of the North Dakota Century Code is					
9	amende	d and reenacted as follows:

17		time and in the same manner as provided for other state aid payments under section

20		meet any contractual or statutory obligation imposed upon it as a result of the district's				
21		participation in a regional education association, the superintendent shall notify the				
22		state board of public school education and shall subtract the amount for which the				
23		district was not eligible from any future distribution of state aid to the district under				
24		section 15.1-27-01.

1 The superintendent shall divide the district's total baseline funding by the district's 2 2012-13 weighted student units in order to determine the district's baseline funding per 3 weighted student unit. 4 3. In 2015-162017-18, the superintendent shall multiply the district's weighted 5 student units by nine thousand threesix hundred sixty-fiveforty-six dollars. 6 The superintendent shall adjust the product to ensure that the product is at 7 least equal to the greater of: 8 One hundred sixeight percent of the district's baseline funding per (a) 9 weighted student unit, as established in subsection 2, multiplied by 10 the district's 2013-14 weighted student units from the previous school 11 vear; or 12 One hundred percent of the district's baseline funding as established (b) 13 in subsection 1. 14 The superintendent also shall also adjust the product to ensure that the (2) 15 product does not exceed one hundred thirtyforty percent of the district's 16 baseline funding per weighted student unit multiplied by the district's 17 2013-14 weighted student units from the previous school year, as 18 established in subsection 2. 19 b. In 2016-172018-19, the superintendent shall multiply the district's weighted 20 student units by nine thousand six hundred forty-six dollars. 21 The superintendent shall adjust the product to ensure that the product is at 22 least equal to the greater of: 23 One hundred eight percent of the district's baseline funding per (a) 24 weighted student unit, as established in subsection 2, multiplied by 25 the district's 2014-15 weighted student units from the previous school 26 year; or 27 (b) One hundred percent of the district's baseline funding as established 28 in subsection 1. 29 (2) The superintendent also shall also adjust the product to ensure that the 30 product does not exceed one hundred forty percent of the district's baseline 31 funding per weighted student unit, as established in subsection 2, multiplied

- by the district's 2014-15 weighted student units <u>from the previous school</u>

 year.
 - 4. After determining the product in accordance with subsection 3, the superintendent of public instruction shall:
 - a. Subtract an amount equal to sixty mills multiplied by the taxable valuation of the school district, provided that after 2013, except the amount in dollars subtracted for purposes of this subdivision may not exceed the previous year's amount in dollars subtracted for purposes of this subdivision by more than twelve percent; and
 - b. Subtract an amount equal to seventy-five percent of all revenues listed in paragraphs 1 through 5, and 7 of subdivision f of subsection 1 and one hundred percent of all revenues listed in paragraphs 6, 8, and 9 of subdivision f of subsection 1.
 - 5. The amount remaining after the computation required under subsection 4 is the amount of state aid to which a school district is entitled, subject to any other statutory requirements or limitations.

SCHOOLS. During the 2017-18 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying entities that deliver kindergarten through grade twelve professional development services, distance curriculum, support for schools in achieving school improvement goals, assistance with analysis and interpretation of student achievement data, and technology support services. The study must focus on the funding, governance, nature, scope, and quality of services provided to schools. The study also must focus on the duplication of services across entities and the accountability for expenditures. The study must identify efficiencies and the desirability and feasibility of consolidating services. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-sixth legislative assembly.

SECTION 7. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - REGIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATIONS. It is the intent of the sixty-fifth legislative assembly that, during the 2017-19 biennium, regional education associations merge with other regional education associations to form four regional

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- 1 education associations each representing a quadrant in the northeast, southeast, southwest,
- 2 and northwest portions of the state.
- 3 SECTION 8. LEGISLATIVE INTENT TRANSPORTATION GRANTS. It is the intent of the
- 4 sixty-fifth legislative assembly that \$55,400,000 be included in the transportation grants line
- 5 item in House Bill No. 1013.
