# Program Overview & Administration

- ND Academic and ND Career & Technical Education Scholarships
  - Aimed at increasing high school rigor
  - Retaining college students in ND
- Administered jointly by the ND DPI and the NDUS

# Current Requirements

- Students may qualify and apply for one scholarship
  - \$6,000 maximum value
    - \$750 per semester or \$500 per quarter; \$1,500 per year
  - Must be utilized within 6 academic years following high school graduation
  - Students must be “fulltime”
    - 12 cr per semester in first year
    - 15 cr per semester in subsequent years
    - Limited exceptions *\*new with 2013 changes*
  - 2.75 minimum GPA to renew
    - One semester of probation is allowed
  - Cannot be used for graduate studies

**2013 High School Seniors**  
The 2013 ND high school seniors accounted for 8,398 students. Of these students, 1,498 met the scholarship requirements. The number of eligible seniors increased by 150 from 2012 to 2013. Total eligible students from 2012 to 2013 increased by 1%. (Table 1)

**Budget Update**  
For the 2013-15 biennium, the ND Academic and Career & Technical Education Scholarship received appropriations of \$10,000,000 and had a carry-over of \$4,158,261.  
  
Although the pace of additional eligible students has slowed, it is anticipated that the scholarship programs will see continued growth in upcoming years as students have greater understanding of the program and more time to complete the required curriculum.

**Other Facts**

- Of those who received a disbursement in fall 2013, what was the average credit load?.....**16.13 credits**
- Number of students who were enrolled in fewer than 15 credits but at least 12 in fall 2013, by cohort:
  - Cohort 2010 = 123 students; 121 were funded
  - Cohort 2011 = 56 students; 2 were funded
  - Cohort 2012 = 98 students; 10 were funded
  - Cohort 2013 = 292 students; 292 were funded
- Number of low GPA warnings issued and number of scholarships subsequently lost:
  - Since inception, 830 students received warning notices due to low GPA. Of those, 625 lost their scholarship through spring 2013. Currently, students are allowed one semester to raise their cumulative GPA above 2.75 to retain their scholarship.

## Appendix A – Program Overview

### Program Overview

Two merit scholarships were created during the 2009 legislative session. These scholarships are aimed at increasing high school rigor and retaining college students in North Dakota. During the first year of the program (HS graduating class Spring 2010), a student had to graduate from a North Dakota high school and achieve an ACT exam score of 24 to qualify for an Academic Scholarship. To qualify for the Career and Technical Education Scholarship a student had to graduate from a North Dakota high school and achieve an ACT exam score of 24 or a WorkKeys score of 5 on three assessments.

Qualification in following years requires students to meet the original requirements, plus complete a specific high school curriculum. Qualifying North Dakota high school graduates could receive \$1,500 per year for 4 years, or a total of \$6,000 within 6 years following their high school graduation.

### Program Administration

The North Dakota Academic and Career and Technical Education Scholarships are administered jointly by the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) and the North Dakota University System (NDUS). Through an Agency Administrative Agreement, DPI is responsible for the application-side of the scholarship programs including such things as advertising, maintaining applications, verifying accuracy of the application, including ACT and WorkKeys scores, high school grade point average (GPA) and course work requirements, and notifying recipients of their initial scholarship eligibility. The North Dakota University System (NDUS) is responsible for post-award activities including notifying financial aid offices of a recipient's scholarship eligibility for financial-aid packaging purposes, distributing scholarship payments to respective colleges and universities, tracking student transfers, verifying full-time enrollment status and college cumulative grade averages for renewal purposes, maintaining fiscal files, and sending rejection letters, as appropriate.

### Current Program Requirements

Students can qualify for either the North Dakota Academic Scholarship or the North Dakota Career and Technical Education Scholarship. Award amounts are limited to \$6,000 and must be utilized within six academic school years (do not have to be consecutive years) following high school graduation. The amount of each scholarship is \$750 per semester or \$500 per quarter, for a total of \$1,500 for the academic year. Students must be enrolled full-time at an accredited higher education institution in North Dakota, either public or private. The scholarships are renewable provided the student maintains a 2.75 cumulative grade point average based on a 4.00 scale reviewed each semester. The scholarship cannot be used for graduate studies.

For purposes of the ND Academic and ND Career and Technical Education Scholarships, “full-time” means enrollment in at least twelve credits during a student’s first two semesters and enrollment in at least fifteen credits during each semester thereafter. The following exceptions apply. In regard to applicability of the exception areas, the NDUS Financial Aid Office requires students to appeal.

1. If a student requires fewer than fifteen credits to graduate, the student may retain scholarship eligibility by enrolling in fewer than fifteen but at least twelve credits during the semester, or the equivalent number of credits, as determined by the state board of higher education, with respect to students in a quarter system. This exception applies to the final semester prior to graduation.
2. Students who graduated from high school during the 2009-10 or the 2010-11 school year and who have completed six semesters may retain scholarship eligibility by enrolling in only twelve credits during each of the student’s final two semesters, or the equivalent number of credits, as determined by the state board of higher education, with respect to students in a quarter system.
3. The requirement that a student be enrolled in at least fifteen credits does not apply in the case of a student participating in a clinical, practicum, internship, cooperative program, or similar external experience, provided the external experience is equivalent to at least twelve units, or such similar amount as determined by the state board of higher education, with respect to students in a quarter system, and considered to be “full time” placement for purposes of meeting graduation requirements.

### **Applications**

High school seniors are required to apply for the scholarship beginning in March of their senior year and then subsequently accept the scholarship if awarded by DPI. Applications are available from March 1-June 7 at:

## ND Diploma Requirements

1. 4 units of English language arts from a sequence that includes literature, composition, and speech
2. 3 units of mathematics
3. 3 units of science, including:
  - 1 unit of physical science
  - 1 unit of biology and
  - 1 unit (or 2 one-half units) of any other science
4. 3 units of social studies, including:
  - 1 unit of US history
  - ½ unit of US government and ½ unit of economics; OR
  - 1 unit of problems of democracy; AND
  - 1 unit (or 2 one-half units) of any other social studies, which may include civics, civilization, geography and multicultural studies, ND studies, psychology, sociology, and world history
5. 1 unit of physical education; OR  
½ unit of physical education and ½ unit of health
6. 3 units of:
  - a. Foreign language;
  - b. Native American languages;
  - c. Fine arts; or
  - d. Career and technical education courses
7. Any 5 additional units

## Scholarship Renewal Requirements

- Student must be enrolled as a full-time student in an approved accredited higher education institution in North Dakota, either public or private. Full-time for the purpose of North Dakota scholarship eligibility means enrollment in at least twelve credits during a student's first two semesters and enrollment in at least fifteen credits during each semester thereafter or enrollment in the equivalent number of credits, with respect to a quarter system, with few exceptions.
- Student must maintain a 2.75 cumulative GPA based on a 4.00 scale, reviewed each semester. If a student's cumulative GPA falls below 2.75, the student will be given one term to bring the cumulative GPA to 2.75 or higher. The scholarship will be revoked if the student fails to meet the GPA requirement after the next term.
- If a student is not enrolled as a full-time student, the scholarship will be revoked until the time the student is enrolled full-time. The scholarship will be reinstated the next semester the student is enrolled full-time.

## Additional Details

- A student does not have to be enrolled in consecutive semesters. However, the scholarship is valid only for 6 academic years after the student's graduation from high school. The total value of the scholarship is \$6,000.
- The scholarship may not be applied to graduate studies. Determination of undergraduate or graduate is based on the program classification of the student's college.
