Minutes:

Roll was taken and all members were present.

Sen. Dever, Chairman, opened the hearing on SB 2230.

Senator Oehlke from District 15 introduced the bill. See attachment # 1.

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State, clarified that the elections can be done by mail for the June elections, but to date that option has not been there for the November elections. Voters do not like the inconsistency. See attachment # 2. He also mentioned with the Help America Vote Act there has to be a scanner and a voting device available to every voter. Each voting machine for the disabled costs \$5,000.00. If there could be only one polling place per county, it would save a lot of money. The mail in option would most likely be exercised by counties with lower populations.

Senator Horne asked whether voters can vote at the courthouse on Election Day.

Secretary of State Jaeger responded that the bill states there would have to be a polling place open in the county.

Senator Oehlke asked if the mailed out applications would only go to the voters who turned out for the primaries. Primaries sometimes have a very low turnout.

Secretary of State Jaeger responded the amendment would address that problem.

Senator Nelson asked about the Central Voter File.

Mr. Jaeger clarified that the Central Voter File is a record of who has voted, not of who can vote. It just compiles the voter list of the 53 counties of the state, all of which is public record.

Senator Dever asked if there is a problem with having one polling place in the county with multiple legislative districts and school districts.

Mr. Jaeger responded that those counties most likely would not pursue this. Some people even feel our present system of voting absentee is already a vote by mail system.

Senator Horne mentioned there is confusion about where to vote. Could it all be done at one location?

Al Jaeger said that would be addressed in another bill.

Senator Nelson asked what the process is to delete people from the Central Voter File.

Al said that is addressed in another bill.

Danette Odenbach, from North Dakota Association of Counties, spoke in support of SB 2230.

See attachment # 3.

Senator Nelson asked if the poll workers have to wait until the end of the day to enter the votes.

Jim Silrum, the Deputy Secretary of State, responded they can enter them during the day but they have to wait until the end of the day to tabulate them.

Blanche Schumacher, Logan County Auditor, spoke in favor of the bill. See attachment # 4.



Minutes:

**Al Jaeger:** Testimony attached.

**Rep. Froseth:** I think the mail ballot is a good idea. I think it was very effective in the counties that were using it. It was very effective. I think it's a good idea to use it for the general election to. On page 1 you would be sending an application for the ballot from the central voter file.

That is going to leave a lot of people who didn't vote in the last general election without an application ballot. Wouldn't it be better to try and devise some kind of method where everyone would get an application notice, not just those who voted in the last election, is that possible?

**Al Jaeger:** I will defer that question to Danette Odenbach.

**Rep. Karls:** So would the mail ballots replace the absentee ballots, or would you still have that option?

**Al Jaeger:** I guess they are really the same. I don't think they would replace it.

**Rep. Haas:** Isn't there a difference because a person generally goes in to request the absentee ballot?

**Al Jaeger:** Right. The people can still request it. There was a test county back in 1990 and it worked very well. Adam's county has used it a few times.

**Rep. Karls:** Now will this pick up duplicates?

**Al Jaeger:** We have another system that is currently in place that will be interactive. When those ballots come in they will be recorded like they are in a poll book. A same person can't vote twice if that is what you are getting at. We have a whole system that is being developed in the central voter file.

**Rep. Boehning:** Was the voter turnout higher when they had the mail in ballots compared to a previous primary.

**Al Jaeger:** I guess I can't give a good answer to that. It has been a few years since they have done it. I just know the feedback was good.

**Danette Odenbach:** Testimony attached.

**Danette Odenbach:** To answer Rep. Froseth's question, this bill was amended by the senate. It says the source comes to the voter's office and will be updated with accurate information. It comes from the Department of Transportation, so anyone who has a driver's license or a state issued ID is in there who is 18 or over. In addition to that if you don't have an ID, that source comes from the poll book as well.

**Rep. Froseth:** How do 18 year olds first get established in the central voting file

**Danette Odenbach:** It actually comes from the DOT. Most 18 year olds have driver's licenses. They can also apply for absentee ballots. If they don't receive an application from the county they can request an application online or any number of ways.

**Rep. Amerman:** Is there any talk about the costs to counties for the mailing and such?

**Danette Odenbach:** Actually the counties are predicting that there will be a decrease in cost.

**Rep. Haas:** Let's take Adams County for example, in a situation where they did mail the ballot and had one voting location that location is almost like a vote center?

**Danette Odenbach:** You are correct. It actually does operate a lot like that.

**Rep. Kasper:** How do you protect against a 16 year old with a drivers license from voting?

**Danette Odenbach:** There age is in the central voters file. If you are under 18 you aren't recognized as a voter.

**Kevin Glatt:** Testimony attached.

**Rep. Kasper:** Would it be your intention if you were doing a mail ballot, that there would only be one polling place open besides the balloting? If you have a district that has many miles between where voters live, would you have more than one voting place?

**Kevin Glatt:** I would consider more than one vote center. When we have used the vote by mail for a presidential primary back in about 1986, they used the Bismarck Civic Center. I think it would be my recommendation to the County Commissioner regards to the number of polling places to be open would be based upon what is on the ballot. There are certain elections whether general or special elections, based upon what is on the ballot that drives voter turnout.

**Rep. Kasper:** Don't you see the potential that this could reduce voter turnout? Some people are used to going to the polls on voting day. The poll they are used to going to is no longer there. They didn't mail in their ballot so they say they aren't going to vote.

**Kevin Glatt:** I really do not see that. I think voting by mail will perhaps increase voter turnout. People more and more want to vote at home, at their own convenience.

**Rep. Kasper:** But you've done no research to verify what you just said. This is your own personal judgment? Is that not correct?

**Kevin Glatt:** Yes it is my own judgment.

**Rep. Weiler:** So the second page of your handout is something that you have received in the mail?

**Kevin Glatt:** Yes.

**Rep. Potter:** Is this sought out more for rural areas? Or do you see this working in a city like Bismarck?

**Kevin Glatt:** I think this could be used throughout the state in urban and rural areas. Right now we can use it in the primary. I'm hesitant and I won't use it in the primary. If I do, come November, everyone is going to expect a ballot mailed to their house. People are busy. That is the reason I get when we have absentee ballots available. I asked people why they came to vote absentee when they did. It is a convenience. They would have 30 days prior to the election to do it when they can, and not when we tell them they have to. I just think people see it as a convenience.

**Rep. Karls:** When you are doing a mailing ballot, do you mail the ballot without a request, or do you send a request?

**Kevin Glatt:** There would be an application that would be mailed. Upon receiving the application we would mail the ballot.

**Rep. Karls:** Say a person gets the mail ballot and you forget about it. Or they mail it in and forget. If they go to vote will that duplication be caught?

**Kevin Glatt:** I believe that this requires that we provide a list to the polling place of all the returned ballots. If that person comes in person to cast a ballot they can refer to the list and say they have already turned in a ballot.

**Rep. Weiler:** I'm trying to go over the timing of this. I think it's in section 4 and 5. If I receive this ballot in the mail and I decide to turn it in at the last minute, do you need to receive it the day before the election?

**Kevin Glatt:** It has to be postmarked the day before.

**Rep. Weiler:** So you might not receive it until the day before or the day after, is that correct?

**Kevin Glatt:** In all sincerity I have learned I cannot answer for the US Postal Service.

**Rep. Weiler:** So if you are going to still count that ballot even though it was postmarked the day before the election which I sent it the day before, now I want to show up at the booth and vote again. Can I do that?

**Al Jaeger:** First of all we are going to recommend going to electronic poll books. What is going to happen is that if you come in on Election Day to vote you are going to be entered into that book. If your ballot comes in after Election Day your name is immediately going to match with the fact that you have already voted.

**Rep. Meier:** Could we address about the central voter files, and will this pose a problem right now?

**Al Jaeger:** The thing with voting centers is that you still have the absentee voting. You can allow people to come in to a number of different areas. We don't really proceed, the small populated counties may do a voting center. We see that more of something of the larger counties. There may be a couple of different places in Bismarck. In small populated counties I can see that this would be an alternative.



**Rep. Haas:** I want to open the floor to promotion discussion on SB 2230. I believe Rep. Meier has some comments.

**Rep. Meier:** Based on the discussion this morning I just have a little thought for amending the bill. On line 8, I believe that the Secretary of State wanted this bill for populations less than 5,000. So after a county to put less than 5,000 populations. I think that would address mainly what the Secretary of State wanted in the bill. I know that the Bismarck auditor had gotten up and said that it might work really well for Bismarck. This bill really does address some of the 29 counties.

**Rep. Haas:** There is 29 counties that have less than 5,000 populations in the state right now. The way the statute is structured now, any county could conduct a primary election by mail ballot. Perhaps if we simply insert that language, then it would preclude any county from over 5,000 from even conducting the mail ballot for the primary. We might need to go to legislative council and get your amendment worked on. Are there other comments on this bill?

**Rep. Potter:** To tag along with what we are discussing, I would hate to preclude a county larger than 5,000 from this. If they would want to do that, they couldn't if we made this

amendment. With the way the wording is now it seems like they have a choice to do that. It is not a requirement but they do have the option. I like that.

**Rep. Haas:** Is there further discussion? If not Rep. Meier will send this to legislative council for amendments.



RE: SB 2230 – Mail Ballot Elections

Under current state law, a county has the option of conducting a vote my mail election in the June election. They do not have the same option in the November election. The state has 29 counties having a population of 5,000 or fewer people. Some of these counties want the option of conducting an election by mail in both the June and November election.

This option is allowed in Sections 1, 2 and 3 of the bill.

For your information, current law mandates a county to have at least one polling location open on election day.

Section 4, page 3: Under current law, ballots can be hand-delivered or mailed to the county auditor on the day of the election. This amendment changes it to the day before the election.

Section 5: This change allows the election board to insert ballots into optical scanner after the opening of the county's single polling location and makes it clear the vote is tabulated after the poll is closed at the end of day.

**REGARDING SENATE BILL 2230**

Chairman Dever and members of the Senate GVA Committee:

The North Dakota Association of Counties (NDACo), on behalf and at the request of the North Dakota County Auditor's Association (NDCAA), submits this testimony in support of Senate Bill 2230.

Senate Bill 2230 amends section 16.1-11.1 of the North Dakota Century Code to allow counties to conduct elections by mail ballot. Currently, the statute allows only for a primary election to be conducted by mail.

With the introduction of no-reason absentee voting and a continued trend in extended work commutes, counties are experiencing a significant increase in absentee voting rates. Providing the state's 53 counties the option to conduct an election through the mail would allow small population counties opportunities for increased administrative time efficiency and cost-savings. For those voters who would prefer to cast their ballot in person, all counties would continue to have at least one polling site open on the day of election (16.1-11.1-01).

The bill would require voters to return their ballot in-person or have it post-marked the day before the election.

Finally, the bill would allow counties to begin scanning absentee ballots after the polls have opened on election day. However, totals of the ballots scanned may not be tabulated until the polls have closed.

The North Dakota Association of Counties and the North Dakota County Auditor's Association appreciate your consideration and request a Do Pass recommendation on Senate Bill 2230.

## **ELECTION STATISTICS:**

- 1. INTRODUCTION: Thank you for giving us the opportunity to meet with you here today—**

- 3. REASON: We are present here today to support Senate Bill 2230, relating to mail ballot elections.**
  
- 4. We encourage and respectfully request that this committee support Senate Bill 2230 which would allow the board of county commissioners to conduct an election by mail for several reasons:**
  - (1) Greater Voter Turnout*
  - (2) Difficulty in finding qualified election workers*
  - (3) Cost-savings for residents.*

**(A) Our State is composed of 53 counties, with 45 of those being very rural, sparsely populated counties.**

**(B) It is becoming more and more difficult to find qualified electors to serve on the elections boards. (Clerk & Judge switched places; job related duties—new Inspector worked out of her home & during workshop needed to be excused for a conference call that she could not miss). In the past it has not been all that difficult to find workers—they are very conscientious and very willing to serve—there are just fewer and fewer that can afford to take the time to do so.**

**The mail ballot election would allow us to utilize a 5 member board, and have a single precinct open on election day.**

**In 1992, Adams County agreed to be a pilot county for a mail ballot primary election and has been conducting a mail ballot primary election every year since that time. In keeping in contact with the former and present auditors, they say their people are very pleased with it. I have not conducted the mail ballot primary as of yet as the cities have no one running in the elections, and all votes are write-ins and have to be hand counted. Population of cities has decreased, with fewer votes to count.**

**Concerning SB2230**

Chairman Haas and members of the committee, I appear before you to express my support for SB2230. **This is permissive legislation that will serve to promote voter participation and decrease election costs.** The one (1) experience Burleigh County had with *Vote by Mail* was operationally very positive.

I support SB2230 -*Vote by Mail*- because current law does not require any reason for voting absentee and no longer requires voters to be absent from their precinct on Election Day. Current state law has in fact authorized voting by mail. As such, current law requires counties to maintain two (2) separate election systems – a *Vote by Mail* and a precinct system.

Current law only authorizes MAIL ballot elections for Primary elections. However, both political parties have circumvented this through their attempts to get out the vote. Please note the attached party mailings. Other groups have quickly followed (AFLCIO, NDEA, etc).

I understand the goal of all the political party mailings – increased voter turnout. I understand the previous legislation to remove the requirement to state a reason for voting absentee – increased voter turnout. *I do not think the present system increases participation, only shifts voting methods from traditional precinct balloting to mail balloting.*

The effect of the present absent voter system is placing an administrative and fiscal burden on counties. There is no easy way to handle absentee ballots. The political party mailings compound this burden by increasing the number of absent voters. From my visits with people returning absent voter ballots to my office, their only reason for voting absentee was the convenience, and if they had not received an absent voter application they would have voted on Election Day at their normal precinct. I received several duplicate applications for absent voter ballot from the same elector – 1 from each party and the AFLCIO. I received many, many incomplete applications which required follow up by a phone call or mail (all of which must be done on a very timely basis). My records show that the combined staff of the Burleigh County Auditor, Treasurer and Director of Tax Equalization basically shut down everyday between October 15th thru November 7th from 7:00AM until 3:00PM to process the applications for absentee ballots and get the ballots in the mail for delivery to the electors.

Presently county auditors have to prepare for two (2) types of elections: traditional polling places and vote by mail. County auditors have no way of knowing how many people will vote "absentee" and how many will show up on Election Day. County auditors need to staff polling places and order enough ballots for both the traditional and mail election. I estimate that this increases costs in Burleigh County by at least 25%.

**Mr. Chairman, as I believe this legislation will increase voter turnout and decrease election costs, I encourage your support for this bill.**



**REGARDING SENATE BILL 2230**

Chairman Haas and members of the House GVA Committee:

The North Dakota Association of Counties (NDACo) submits this testimony in support of Senate Bill 2230.

Senate Bill 2230 amends section 16.1-11.1 of the North Dakota Century Code to allow counties to conduct elections by mail ballot. Currently, the statute allows only for a primary election to be conducted by mail.

With the introduction of no-reason absentee voting and a continued trend in extended work commutes, counties are experiencing a significant increase in absentee voting rates. Providing the state's 53 counties the option to conduct an election through the mail would allow small population counties opportunities for increased administrative time efficiency and cost-savings. For those voters who would prefer to cast their ballot in person, all counties opting to conduct an all-mail election would continue to have at least one polling site open on the day of election (16.1-11.1-01). Additionally, the bill would allow counties to begin scanning absentee ballots after the polls have opened on election day. However, totals of the ballots scanned may not be tabulated until the polls have closed.

The Senate did amend the bill at the request of the Secretary of State to change the source of the mailing list for ballot applications from the pollbook to the Central Voter File. Otherwise, the bill comes before you as originally submitted.

The North Dakota Association of Counties appreciates your consideration and requests a Do Pass recommendation on Senate Bill 2230.

REGARDING SENATE BILL 2230

Chairman Haas and members of the House GVA Committee:

I apologize I cannot present my testimony in person today, but I appreciate your acceptance of this written submission supporting Senate Bill 2230.

I, along with my fellow county auditors, encourage and respectfully request that this committee support Senate Bill 2230 which would allow the Board of County Commissioners to conduct an election by mail for several reasons:

- Our state is composed of 53 counties, with 45 of those being very rural, sparsely populated counties.
- It is becoming more and more difficult to find qualified electors to serve on the elections boards. In the past it has not been all that difficult to find workers – they are very conscientious and very willing to serve – there are just fewer and fewer that can afford to take the time to do so.
- The mail ballot election would allow us to utilize a five member board and have a single precinct open on Election Day.

In 1992, Adams County agreed to be a pilot county for a mail ballot primary election and has been conducting a mail ballot primary election every year since that time. In keeping in contact with the former and present auditors for that county, they say their people are very pleased with it. I have not conducted the mail ballot primary as of yet as the cities have no one running in the elections, and all voters are write-ins and have to be hand counted. Population of cities has decreased, with fewer votes to count.

Mail ballot elections would hopefully increase voter turnout and provide an approximate \$2000 savings per election, reducing the cost per vote, passing the savings back to the residents and tax payers.

Chairman Haas and members of the committee, for these reasons we respectfully request you support Senate Bill 2230 to allow mail ballot elections.

RE: SB 2230 – Mail Ballot Elections

Under current state law, a county has the option of conducting a mail ballot election only in the June election. They do not have the same option in the November election. The state has 29 counties having a population of 5,000 or fewer people. Some of these counties and their voters wish to have the option of conducting a mail ballot election in both the June and November election. This option is allowed in Sections 1, 2 and 3 of the bill.

Whenever a mail ballot election is held, the law mandates a county to have at least one polling location open on Election Day.

Section 4, page 3: Under current law, mail ballots can be hand-delivered or mailed to the county auditor on the day of the election. This amendment changes it to the day before the election to make it the same as the deadline for the mailing or delivery of absentee ballots.

Section 5: This change allows the election board to insert ballots into the optical scanner after the opening of the county's single polling location and makes it clear the vote count is only tabulated after the poll is closed at the end of day.
