A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the state historical society; and to provide an exemption				
Minutes: Testimony 1-13				

Chairman Skarphol: Called the meeting to order and introduced Merle Paaverud.

Robert Erbele, Senator from District 28: Presented Amendment 13.8147.01001. It is a proposal to let the Heritage Society purchase the Lawrence Welk Homestead on behalf of the State of North Dakota.. It is now on the market for sale but we don't know what the amount is. We would make an offer and put some money down contingent upon the approval of the legislature to purchase that. . South Central Tourism and Alliance that gives tours and the German of Russia Heritage Society willing to do in kind labor and upkeep.

Chairman Skarphol: Has Mr. Paaverud put together some numbers that would be included in his discussion?

Erbele: Yes, the numbers are there but we don't know what the purchase price will be.

Rep. Williams: Do you have any idea what they are asking for the property?

Senator Erbele: I know what they are asking and it is \$125,000. There are six acres, the original sod house that Lawrence Welk was born in, a house, summer kitchen. We see it as a multiple endeavor, he is the number two man out here in the Roughrider Hall. The German Russian story is an historical story, pioneer agriculture, and it is on a major highway leading into North Dakota.

Chairman Skarphol: I appreciate your bringing this out on this side.

Merl Paaverude, Director of the Historical Society: Presented testimony, see attachment # 2, PP. 1-4. It has been a good year along with the construction. Reviewing the proposed budget...

Chairman Skarphol: You referred to gifts, are they segregated by what ever gifts are given, could you provide us with a list?

Paaverude: Yes. Gifts and bequests, concession stands and permits.

David Skalsky, Assistant Director of the State Historical Society: Distributed Attachment # 3 and highlighted budget items.

Chairman Skarphol: Building and Maintenance on P. 1, you carried forward \$274,000 from the '09 biennium to this biennium and you have expended \$228,000 of it

Skalsky: Not all of it has been expended. There are other repairs that we are still completing. But \$220,000 was expended on the Fort Totten project.

Chairman Skarphol: To be expended in this biennium. With regard to the compact shelving, the \$345,000, has it been expended?

Skalky: That has been expended and the compact shelving is complete.

Chairman Skarphol: And of the \$34M that you carried forward on the Center itself, has a fair share been spent?

Skalky: There is \$13M to \$14M left on that.

Rep. Dosch: How are you doing on the time frame for completion and also the dollars are you on track?

Skalsky: We are on schedule. There will be a soft opening sometime in September. The exterior will be finished sometime between May and September. After we have access to the building in May, they will start on the hallway galleries and the Paleo Gallery. A grand opening is being planned for October and the total completion of the building with exhibits will be November of 2014.

Rep. Dosch: Are you on budget for the project?

Skalsky: There are still some things for which we do not have estimates. We will get the project done with the money funded. There are unexpected things but we have been able to take care of them

Vice Chairman Monson: Referring to Attachment # 3, P. 1 the carry over to the '11-'13 biennium, these funds were appropriated in 2009-'11 and carried over to "11-'13 and you are expending them or have expended them.

Skalsky: Correct, sometimes there are projects that are mid-stream and we are completing them with carry over money.

Vice Chairman Monson: The Fort Totten carry over will be expended by June 30th.

Skalsky: We anticipate all these funds will be completed except maybe with the exception of the Heritage Center expansion.

Vice Chairman Monson: Are there any projects that will not be completed because you need more money?

Skalsky: There are some projects that will have multiple phases. Looking at the '13-'15 biennium those additional funds requested for Fort Totten that was not included in the Executive budget is an example.

Rep. Williams: Looking at P. 4, you are getting six of the 24 positions as recommended by the Governor's budget. What do the other positions have to do with?

Skalsky: Referring to attachment 4, P. 7. That tells you where those positions are. We are looking at 12.3 positions based on the total number of hours. Looking at total building security hours we are at 225,000 hours. The total work hours in a year is 2080. So that would be 12 positions, we currently have six. In Executive budget we included one more security position.

Rep. Grande: When we voted to approve this 6 years ago, did we know that you would require 26 more FTE?

Skalsky: We did give information to this committee, and it was not 22 positions but nine or ten for us and four or five for facility management. We did underestimate.

Rep. Grande: Could you give me a copy of that initial proposal?

Skalsky: Continuing with Attachment # 3, p. 4 and reviewing the budget requests.

Chairman Skarphol: Going back with staff requests on item # 2. How many?

Skalsky: We have requested 22 positions.

Chairman Skarphol: That's 22 total positions and that is the same positions reflected further down in the temporary salaries?

Skalsky: No, those are basically seasonal historic site staff.

Chairman Skarphol: How many people would be involved in that?

Skalsky: Different variations, some might work 40 to 60, not every day of the week.

Chairman Skarphol: Is that in addition to what you currently have?

Skalsky: That would be in additional pay to those that are currently employed. That comes out to about \$1.00 an hour per year.

Chairman Skarphol: The \$183,000 would?

Skalsky: The \$183,000. It is additional hourly for our seasonal people.

Chairman Skarphol: This is additional salary for existing people, not additional salary for additional people. Give us a breakdown for the operating costs that you had asked for and what you feel was granted. The Governor's traveling Gallery.

Chris Johnson, Museum Division Director, project manager related to the exhibits: The \$250,000 is an appropriation that we are asking for to assist in financing temporary exhibits that come into the Governor's Gallery. These are vendors who come in from across the nation, like the Smithsonian, National Archives. They all have their owns use fees for bringing in exhibits.

Vice Chairman Monson: You have a request for phase 1 of the Stutsman County Court house and it was not in the Governor's budget for \$250,000 but how many phases are there and what would it look like?

Fern Swenson, Director of the Archeology and Historic Preservation Division: The total amount would be \$1.25M, including everything for the restoration of the courthouse itself and it could ne used as an historic site and serve as a community center for various events.

Vice Chairman Monson: Is this their currently used county court house?

Swenson: They have new county courthouse. This came into our management in the late 1980s. There is a need for mold and asbestos abatement.

Vice Chairman Monson: Is it setting empty right now?

Swenson: It is empty.

Chairman Skarphol: Is it it good condition?

Swenson: It is good condition. The exterior was repaired in the early 1990's. Minor projects will have to be done. It is not heated but is in excellent shape.

Chairman Skarphol: There is no damage from heating and cooling.

Swenson: The basement had problems with mold.

Chairman Skarphol: It is on the register of historical places and the State Historical Society owns the building. If the money is not appropriated the building will sit there unless you can find someone else to take on the project.

Vice Chairman Monson: On item # 7 on attachment 3, the Fort Totten Hospital, the Governor did not fund this one. How many phases are you anticipating and how long into the future?

Swenson: The total project cost is estimated to \$1.4M for the hospital, the largest building on the site.

Chairman Skarphol: You have \$1.4M left to invest in this project. Is this some of the cost?

Swenson: That is the total current remaining cost. It is currently being used.

Chairman Skarphol: At Fort Totten, it is staffed with temporary salaries and temporary people for Stutsman County.

Swenson: Temporary salary money to keep it open in the summer and by appointment.

Rep. Grande: We need \$1.4M more just to do the hospital at Fort Totten. How many buildings did you say you wanted to work on?

Swenson: The only building slated for rehabilitation is the gym.

Rep. Grande: What is the cost?

Swenson: We do not have a cost,

Rep. Grande: Is there an overall idea of costs. How many more buildings are there that will be asked about? What staff requirements will be requested with these long term projects? How many more buildings will be brought to the committee?

Swenson: There is no other staff required for Fort Totten.

Rep. Grande: How many buildings are there?

Swenson: There are 16 of the original buildings and two others.

Rep. Grande: How many need repair?

Swenson: Most of the buildings are now open and have had repairs.

Vice Chairman Monson: At the bottom of P. 1 of Attachment 3, is it phase 3?

Swenson: It is phase 3. We didn't have it divided up into phases because we were expecting federal funding. We now have 10 phases because the architectural specifications had to be revised.

Chairman Skarphol: Give us a historical perspective of all the off-site projects along with the phases. If you have multiple phases in mind let us know the cost of each one. Referring to Attachment # 1, P. 4. On the bill, detailed Business Analysis, remind me of what the discussion was.

Skalsky: There was money included last biennium in the Executive Budget of \$145,000. \$135,000 was pulled out and \$10,000 was remaining.

Chairman Skarphol: Nothing has been done with the \$10,000. The web content management system, # 12, give a brief synopsis of the intention of that.

Skalsky: We have one person assigned to that. It allows multiple users and information will be available on line. It would update the current site.

Chairman Skarphol: The \$173,000 as that done in consultation with ITD?

Skalsky: Yes, it could be less if we would transfer all of the data pages over.

Vice Chairman Monson: With the 8th grade curriculum development. Part 1 is \$125,000, Part 2 is \$150,000. Will more be needed.

Skalsky: That completes the project.

Chairman Skarphol: Looking at the Green Sheet, the Executive Budget highlights, item # 1, one-time.

Skalsky: We have problems housing for two staff in the western part of the state. We will not do that for those who have their own homes in other places.

Chairman Skarphol: Traveling exhibits, \$250,000 are these exhibits that will be coming into North Dakota?

Skalsky: Yes

Chairman Skarphol: Item # 3.

Skalsky: We are trying to change them out and there and there are display cases.

Paaverud: Changes will be seen

Chairman Skarphol: Calling it one time may be creative.

Paaverud: We are going to try to get sponsors to help us with that. The Governor has a plan for 125^{th.}

Chairman Skarphol: Is the coordinator in this year's budget.

Paaverud: We've hired that person.

Chairman Skarphol: Item # 6 is the six FTEs, and that would be two years salary? Continuing with items 7-9

Rep. Grande: One time funding for 8th grade curriculum, whose budget will that come out of, Department of Public Instruction (DPI) or yours and what is the cost?

Neil Howe: This curriculum will be web based and will be relatively maintenance free, based on the documents housed in the archives. There is a huge maintenance cost with print and those should go away.

Chairman Skarphol: What value will students receive for this, and how will we receive assurance that there is value in this?

Neal Howe: It is widely used. Current 8th grade, web based is being used by about 95% of all 4th grade classes in the state. It is print based and the current 8th grade based is in 80-85% of the schools. Things that are on line will be the prevalent curriculum.

Vice Chairman Monson: It is required curriculum. Is this a supplement or a replacement?

Howe: It is to replace the print book. This is a requirement that North Dakota studies is in grades 4, 8 and high school.

Vice Chairman Monson: Are the print books being sold?

Howe: They are still being printed; sold for \$10, cost \$5.00 to print.

Chairman Skarphol: I would envision this as a pilot project in the future?

Howe: This is all from primary documents. There is going to be teacher training

Chairman Skarphol: We have spent a lot of money on these books, would you recommend that we rely solely on on- line learning?

Howe: That is what is coming.

Vice Chairman Monson: Where are you in the HS curriculum?

Howe: in 2007, the legislature required this at the high school level.

Chairman Skarphol: We need confidence that it will be used.

Howe: We are teaching teachers to use primary sources.

Chairman Skarphol: You have requests for a large amount of money.

Paaverud: We had alternates that were not included. We will likely be down to the last dollar. I don't foresee much being left over.

Chairman Skarphol: Mr. Boyle, I would like to see a breakdown of costs.

Explanation or reason for introduction of bill/resolution:

A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the state historical society; and to provide an exemption.

Minutes:

Attached testimony #s 1 and 2

Chairman Skarphol: Called the committee to order to discuss HB 1018, North Dakota State Historical Society (NDSHS) Budget # 701. Announcing that all members of the Committee are present. Welcoming back Rep. Boe from his trip to Washington.

Yesterday's discussion with DPI on the weighted student descriptions and how the funding formula works. There may be a follow up discussion.

Introducing Merl Paaverud, Director of the (NDSHS) and requesting an update of the funding of the building, expenditures and timelines.

1:44 to

Paaverud: The main building will be turned over to us in May. In September the entire building will be open. Soft openings are individual openings of the exhibit halls, rather than waiting until the end. The grand opening will be November 2, 2014 which is the state's 125th anniversary.

Chairman Skarphol: You have redone and rearranged some of the existing areas.

Paaverud: We had some issues with access, especially with access for the disabled. There were some code issues, removal of combustible materials, updates of areas with electrical security.

Chairman Skarphol: Are you completing it in segments?

Paaverud: Areas that are done are are back in use, the lobby reopened again. The mezzanine will be the tree house, the kids area. Sprinklers were put in there. The plan is to keep moving to the east.

Chairman Skarphol: Will the soft openings be opened as the segments are completed? You have in the bill a room called Legislative Hearing Room.

Paaverud: That is our legislative assembly meeting room, used for meetings. The name was chosen when we did the archives to recognize the legislature and the support that has been given.

Rep.Streyle: \$40M was appropriated, the bids come in at \$30M, you were supposed to put in \$12M that was to be raised. How much of that \$12M do you have?

Paaverud: The legislature appropriated \$37.9M and with the \$12M, a total of \$51.7M. The representative of our foundation involved with the fund raising is here.

8:00 to 11:00

Karl Lembke, NDSHS Foundation: Provided Attachment # 1. This is what was projected in 2009 from a feasibility study regarding the expansion fundraising. The goal was to be \$15M, P. 2 shows where we are at the end of the year 2012. We have exceeded what we thought we were getting in prior funding.

In the checking account I would have Marlo Sveen, Development Director report on specific numbers.

Rep. Streyle: Not any where near close to the \$10M.

Lembke: No, a guess is that with pledges we are somewhere around \$10.6M towards that goal.

Vice Chairman Monson: Private funds do not go into the foundation, or how does that work?

Lembke: Private funding is specifically corporations, individuals. Foundation funding is like the Bush Foundation, Kresge Foundation, things of that nature.

Chairman Skarphol: \$6M in discounted funds or pledges was required at the time construction was beginning you had a commitment at around \$7M. Have the pledges that were made, been coming in before construction was initiated?

Lembke: Each donor's specific wishes for time line have held true.

Rep. Martinson: How do you spend the money, is it in your checking account? Do you use some of the State's money or your money, or is it all in your checking account?

David Skalsky, Assistant Director NDSHS: The money would be run through us, when the Foundation does not have all of the money and discussed Attachment # 2 for further explanation. We make sure that we have the funding available to pay the bills.

Grande: You are relying on federal money, since we have a government that is broke. Did I say broke, broke, broke? I don't know that they will be putting out a lot of money, so you plan to find that someplace else, and with the Foundations not coming in and when we have an economic turndown as we do foundations don't tend to have a lot of money. How are you going to replace that in your pledge plans? Is there a scheduled plan for the

pledges coming in? Do you have any big dollar ones put there that is sort of locked that could be affected by the economy?

Lembke: Money has run out from federal or large foundation funding. That has dried up. We went to a fund raising consultant to address that short fall, we have \$6M worth of asks, that donors who are considering our request for the funding at this time and approximately \$3M in the corporations that are considering a gift. We have a strategic plan for those shortfalls and we will meet that goal of \$15M.

Rep. Grande: How much actual money have you actually brought in, not pledged but actually brought in? Please get that from Marlo.

Vice Chairman Monson: How could you have projected that you would get \$3.5M from various foundations and you end up with \$20,000. How could you miscalculate that much?

Lembke: It was hard to estimate the shortfall. We did have some soft commitments of the million dollar variety. We did request from our foundations \$4.5M that were all denied in 2009. There were some soft commitments of the million dollar variety from a couple of foundations that were taken away.

Vice Chairman Monson: Related to the economy, is it because it is so bad or is it because the economy is so good. What is the reason for this and why can't you go back to them?

Lembke: It is partly due to the bad economy. We do go after grants and we are starting to see some progress.

Rep. Streyle: The purchase of Dakota Dinosaur for \$3M is not a serious consideration, is it?

Chairman Skarphol: When was the last time a significant contribution was received? What is the current scenario?

Lembke: I believe the status has been steady. Last year we had less than normal intake of funds. One was from a North Dakotan for \$250,000 and another for \$400,000. They are sporadic, they don't come in regularly. The state of the fund raising is steady.

Chairman Skarphol: Have Marlo, give us a flow idea of incoming donations of those coming in or not coming in.

Vice Chairman Monson: When the state kicks in dollars are you cutting checks at the rate as the state is putting in money?

Skalsky: Currently most of the bills are paid with state money. There is some in kind money that was given to the contractor. Most of the money that has been spent has been state money and the state has been notified that we will be drawing that money as the building is completed.

Rep. Grande: In kind donations, are you counting that in the \$10.49M? Have him give us a breakdown of in kind and what is actual cash that will be coming in.

Paaverud: Responding to the question of the Dakota purchase, it was found at Marmarth Institute, it is a dinosaur that was unearthed several years back and is currently at the Heritage Center being worked on. It is one of the few that actually has skin. It will come to North Dakota Heritage Center

Marmarth Institute was founded by Tyler Lyson from, the south west part of the state, who excavated the dinosaur when he was a sophomore in High School. He is a rising star in the field of paleontology and is working at the Smithsonian and he is the prime partner for the Marmarth Institute. We have an ongoing partnership with the North Dakota geological survey by providing lab space for them. The structure is probably 80% with skin that has been fossilized. Findings have resulted from a study of this fossil and expand our history of the part of North Dakota.

The price was set up by our institute. The agreement has not been finished and is in the hands of the Marmarth Institute for review.

Chairman Skarphol: Referring to Attachment #2, the footnotes, discussing the projects that have not been completed. Some are a concern as freight elevator repair, hoping that you are not operating that as unsafe. Main gallery air handling unit should have been taken care of in the remodeling of the gallery, Why was that set back in the priorities?

Paaverud: Explaining the reason for these repairs is to make sure they are up to code. The air handling is on hold because the estimate overran what was budgeted.

Chairman Skarphol: Referring to Attachment # 2, are the items above the dotted line finished? Priorities

Paaverud: Those have been authorized and funded.

Chairman Skarphol: Donations needed listed on Attachment # 2, you are at about \$6.7M. You have actual gifts of \$10M.

Skalsky: There is \$100,000 that we got from Petroleumit went through the geological survey. We have spent about one half of the foundation money, about \$100,000. The rest is inkind use.

Chairman Skarphol: Going over the green sheet, beginning with the FTE, there are 22 positions.

Other properties that you are responsible for, what kinds of numbers do you have in local contributions? We are considering the Lawrence Welk property?

Paaverud: There are a number of properties that we operate around the state. Fort Beaufort, Chateau de Mores, Fort Abercrombie, Pembina State Museum, Fort Totten, Former Governor's Mansion are a few. We charge admission, 100,000 to 130,000 people visit these sites. Some are open year round now.

Chairman Skarphol: Are there any kind of revenue streams from local entities that have a facility?

Skalsky: Donation boxes, donations are made for specific projects. One example is the Confluence Center at Williston.

Chairman Skarphol: What is the sustainability of the Welk property?

Paaverud: It might operate at a seasonal schedule, maintenance for mowing, promotion. There is a tri county historical society, a German-Russian Heritage society that does tours. They are running out of resources because some of the folks are getting old and can't do it any more.

We have an estimate of what it would cost to operate it and we will send information.

Vice Chairman Monson: Are you making any money or are we subsidizing these with state funds to keep them running?

Paaverud: The state provides money to operate. What is collected is used for programming, special exhibits, it goes back into the site. In some communities, local groups use the site for a fee. It is a good partnership but we don't get enough to run them with visitation numbers.

The closest would be the Chateau that nearly covers its costs.

Vice Chairman Monson: So every time we purchase another one of these sites it is going to cost us more money.

Rep. Grande: You gave us a handout, referring to all of the North Dakota historical sites managed by the NDSHS and one that said you manage also state parks. This is really busy, could we get this in a list and what is the cost to run it and number of visitors to each of these?

Paaverud: NDSHS does not operate all of these but those assets are out there but we are associated with them and try to promote them, tourist sites, Big Iron, everything by trying to be a hub for information to visitors.

Vice Chairman Monson: With your new facility, can students see these sites on line?

Paaverud: This is a work in progress, there are millions of entries. Typically there are over 20,000 hits per month. A lot of Norwegians are coming back to find out what happened to the people who left Norway decades ago.

Rep. Grande: Collaboration with Parks and Recreation, melding with Tourism, I am seeing an overlap. How do you know which funds get used for which one?

Paaverud: The overlap partnership is crucial. These organizations have events that we don't have. Tourism is on our board, the director of Parks and Recreation and we work together to cross self-promote. When people come we want them to stay.

Rep. Grande: How are you dividing up the funds that you are asking for?

Paaverud: They produce material and we plug it in. We feel being partners is beneficial. It is not so much duplication. There is cross reference.

Rep. Boe: Are there agreements that you been signed with regard to payments?

Paaverud:: Not agreements, per se but the boards work together.

Chairman Skarphol: Referring to Budget Analysis and Reporting System (BARS) and addressing Sheila Peterson, Office of Management and Budget (OMB) analyst, looking at federal dollars and special funds we are increasing the amount of operating money of federal dollars but decreasing them under capital assets. Why are there some federal dollars for operating and a declining number.....I am wondering why your office is willing to depend on some federal dollars.

Skalsky: Capital assets, the reduction in that area we had some federal funds that we used for the Fort Abercrombie bank stabilization. That project is completed. The federal fund side would be our federal program and will be used in Historic preservation archeology area, for paying salaries and other costs. There is a continuing grant in our state archives that was awarded. We will get details on that change. If we had projected that we are going to get some money for a project using federal funds and if federal funds did not come in, that project would not be completed. We wouldn't come and ask you for money.

Chairman Skarphol: Reiterating the requests that were made. Committee Meeting is adjourned.

Chairman Skarphol: HB 1018 the Historical Society. I've asked Rep. Williams to carry this. We did have the request of Senator Erbele with regard to the purchase of the Lawrence Welk homestead property. They made an offer and there was no response.

Rep. Grande: Who made the offer?

Chairman Skarphol: Senator Erberle made the offer. They had to have a number for us to consider appropriating if we are going to do this.

Rep. Williams: What is the number?

Chairman Skarphol: 65,000 was the number of the offer.

Rep. Dosch: Suggestion to have it moved to Buckstop Junction or Bonanzaville.

Rep. Williams: I agree with Rep. Dosch.

Chairman Skarphol: As far as that proposal I suspect the committee is not interested in doing anything with it at this time. He had a proposed amendment 1001 he had handed us.

Rep. Martinson: I would like to add 150,000 to marketing grants line item.

Chairman Skarphol: Line 14 on budget bill which is under grants or is it 15 under cultural heritage grants?

Sheila Sandness: We'll make sure it gets in the right line item.

Chairman Skarphol: (5:00) We have a motion to add 150,000 from Rep. Martinson, second by Rep. Streyle. Discussion on current amounts in both grants line items and the distinction between the two grant line items.

Rep. Dosch: We should get list of proposed changes and see where we are at.

Chairman Skarphol: proposed changes to the budget or grants?

Rep. Dosch: To the whole thing.

Rep. Streyle: (9:30) Would Rep. Martinson like to include removing line 7 and 8 of the white sheet in his amendment too?

Chairman Skarphol: (11:00) Walked down the green sheet starting at number 1 and discussed various entities on the sheet.

Rep. Dosch: I am in favor to take it out, it's added onto Bob;s list.

Chairman Skarphol: Do you want to leave your motion?

Rep. Martinson: Withdraws his motion.

Chairman Skarphol: We have a motion to remove #1, one time funding for 50,000 by Rep. Dosch, second by Rep. Streyle. Voice vote, motion carried.

Chairman Skarphol: #2, one-time funding for traveling exhibits, do you want to remove it all of line 2 or authorize half to be used in the second half of the biennium?

Chairman Skarphol: Motion is to remove the whole 250,000 by Rep. Streyle, second by Rep. Grande. Discussion?

Rep. Boe: I prefer the Chairs thought of maybe cut it in half and limit it to the second half of the biennium. I will be resisting this motion.

Chairman Skarphol: Any other discussion on the motion to remove 250,000? Roll call vote. Motion passes. 6-1-1

Chairman Skarphol: (20:07) Continued discussion on items off green sheet, one-time funding for historic site exhibit.

Rep. Dosch: Made Motion to reduce that 65,000 down to 50,000, second by Grande voice vote, motion carries.

Chairman Skarphol: (23:16) Discussion on handout given with the grants lines.

Rep. Martinson: I want to increase this by 150,000.

Chairman Skarphol: How does the grants line item on line 14 for 1 million dollars differ from line 15 in the budget?

Chairman Skarphol: Go to #4 on green sheet, 125th celebration of statehood.

Becky Keller, LC: The 1 million is for historic preservation grants.

Chairman Skarphol: (28:14) Discussion continues on #4 and #5, one-time funding for the development of the 8th grade curriculum, we will leave that one alone. (32:47) #6, FTEs.

Chairman Skarphol: Any desire to change that or leave it alone or come back to it? Let's come back to it. (40.22) #7, to increase funding for seasonal salaries by \$1.00 per hour per year. #8, add funding for maintenance and the expanded exhibit areas in the heritage center of \$60,000.

Chairman Skarphol: (49:40) The Dakota purchase 3 million. Discussion follows.

Rep. Boe: Who invested the money into getting this dinosaur to the value of 3 million dollars?

Chairman Skarphol: I can't answer who invested the money.

Rep. Streyle: (55:34) Move on and leave it alone.

Becky Keller: (55:55) OMB has 190,000 in their bill for a temporary planning coordinator for the celebration.

Chairman Skarphol: (56:08) Nothing in tourism or other entity? Discussion follows on celebration coordinator.

Chairman Skarphol: (59:15) Now, let's go back to the employee that's in the OMB budget. Discussion follows on 6 FTEs.

Becky Keller: You asked for clarification on historic preservation grants, that 1 million dollar line item. Those are federal grants made available to properties listed on national registry. They are different from cultural heritage grants. The entities who receive the cultural heritage grants do not qualify for the federal historic preservation grants. It is two different items.

Rep. Grande: (1:01:13) Problem with 6 FTEs. Discussion follows.

Sheila Peterson, OMB: (1:05:00) Gave justification for 6 positions.

Chairman Skarphol: (1:10:22) Committee, what do you think of the idea of taking the coordinator person out in order to try and get it to be a point of discussion in the conference committee to try and ensure we have a discussion that does provide some logic to the concern about providing an employee without the tools to do the work.

Chairman Skarphol: Let's make sure it's part of the discussion in the conference committee. Do you want to leave it and just try to remember it or take it out?

Rep.Strylee: I move that we pull the coordinator out.

Chairman Skarphol: We have a motion to remove the technology coordinator position, second Rep. Grande voice vote Rep. Martinson votes no motion carries

Chairman Skarphol: Sheila can you comment on part 2 of celebration?

Sheila Peterson: (1:14:01) Gave explanation to Rep. Grande's question.

Chairman Skarphol: (1:14:35) clarified the figures on coordinator. Discussion follows on coordinator.

Rep. Grande: I make a motion to cut 50 from that line.

Chairman Skarphol: To reduce the 125 on line 4 of the green sheet? To reduce it from 150 to 100. We have a motion to reduce a one-time funding for the state's 125th Celebration from 150,000 to 100,000, second Rep. Streyle. Roll call vote, 6-1-1

Rep. Streyle: What is the committee's thought on putting a dollar figure on that web content piece or just leave it as far as including a line item for 125 or 150 or just since we pulled the coordinator out now we can talk about it.

Chairman Skarphol: I'm sure the conference committee can talk about it.

Becky Keller: Went over the amendments that have been proposed for us on this one.

We are adding funding into the cultural grants line of 150.000

Remove funding for compensation or housing allowances in the oil impacted areas- 50,000

Remove funding for traveling exhibits 250.000

Reduce funding for historic site exhibits to 50,000 so a 15,000 reduction.

Remove the technology coordinator position

Remove 50,000 from the state celebration money

The only one that doesn't have passed by it is the add funding into the cultural grants line and I wasn't here so I don't know if you approved that.

Rep. Martinson: I move to add 150,000 in, Rep. Boe seconds the motion. Voice vote all I motion carries

Becky Keller: You want the amendment drafted for this and we had no changes to any of the other sections in the bill?

Rep Grande: In what department is this coordinator work?

Joe: It is a temp position funded in OMB so technically they would report to Pam Sharp but is housed at the Historical Society.

Rep Grande: I think we should coordinate this under one area like facility management.

Rep Williams: When it is all said and done, this budget is at 817,000 below the Govenors?

Joe: For the general fund portion of these amendments you are correct, it is a reduction of 817,725 of the general fund from the Governors recommendation.

Chairman Delzer: What do they grant to?

Rep. Williams: Outside entities. I have a complete listing.

Chairman Delzer: What kind of entities?

Rep. Williams: Other historical areas, like the Bagg Bonanza Historical Farm, for example, in Wahpeton, and other historical entities.

Chairman Delzer: What about county museums? Are they included too?

Rep. Williams: Some of them are included in here.

Rep. Delzer: Is there a limit to how much they grant?

Rep. Williams: They are usually small grants, and many are matching grants.

Rep. Williams continued his presentation of the amendment.

Rep. Williams moved the amendment, seconded by Rep. Skarphol.

Chairman Delzer: How much did they spend in grants last biennium?

Rep. Williams: They spent \$504,000, and they actually ran short. So, we added \$150,000 more.

Chairman Delzer: These are requests from other entities?

Rep. Williams: Yes.

Rep. Delzer: What kind of vetting process do they use, or is it first come first serve?

Rep. Williams: They know how much money they have in the foundation, and the historic board decides.

Chairman Delzer: Is it basically a continuing appropriation of the grant, year after year, or does it change?

Rep. Williams: I don't know what it was previously.

Chairman Delzer: Are they on time and on schedule on the building?

Rep. Williams: When this process started, in 2009 when we funded the building, there was some controversy. Some people did not want the expansion on the current grounds; they wanted it elsewhere. Also, the historical society wanted us to commit as a state allotting so much money to the project to help with the fundraising. In the 2009 session we appropriated \$39.7 million towards the Historical Society. The kicker was that before they could access any of it, they had to come up with \$6 million. When it becomes finished, this fall, they will have in brick and motor about \$51 million in the structure. \$12 million came from the foundation itself in the form of donations. At the present time they have pledges for another \$10 to \$12 million. They also have \$4,444 in hand. They have filled their part of the bargain. It is a 6 year program, and some portions will be open this spring and fall, but the grand opening will be November 2014. From start to finish it will be about five years.

Chairman Delzer: Will they be after us for the internal stuff, or is that part of the cost?

Rep. Williams: Those are what they refer to as soft costs. They feel they can raise the money for the soft costs of the infrastructure.

Rep. Bellew: When this expansion is completed, how many more employees they will need to operate?

Rep. Williams: Ideally, they would like 22 employees. We're going to give them 5. In the future we will have a request for more employees.

Chairman Delzer: How much of the soft costs will be implemented by opening date in 2014?

Rep. Williams: I'm assuming what they have in there by 2014 will be paid for by the foundation or by charitable funds. They have carried over a substantial amount of funds from the last biennium that they will use to complete it. For example, going into this biennium they had \$34 million for Heritage Center expansion. Some of that was from the 2009 session. They have \$78,000 for security, and \$274,000 for maintenance and upkeep of the building.

Chairman Delzer: Did they use any of their own money for the grants, or match the state money?

Rep. Williams: I do not know.

Rep. Skarphol: It's all general funds.

Rep. Kempenich: On their change package, they only asked for \$100,000, so I was wondering if there was something else they had in mind.

Rep. Skarphol: It was a motion on the part of Rep. Martinson, who is very familiar with the grant program. He felt that it was an appropriate number, and the committee did not dispute it. We took actions elsewhere that we felt offset that. The money gets distributed out to small communities that get grants. We are still down by \$817,000.

I would like to comment on the building. The project is on time and on budget. The fundraising is running a little slow on the tail end. I believe that before their November 2014 deadline they will be in good shape with the project.

A voice vote was taken on HB 1018 amendment .01002. All aye. The motion carried.

Rep. Skarphol: They have some real concerns about the security over there. The security people for the capitol grounds are now located over there. So, I hope during conference committee, we can make some adjustments with regard to that. We at least need to get a better evaluation of their needs versus what we already have.

Rep. Williams moved DO PASS as amended on HB 1018. Rep Skarphol seconded the motion.
A roll call vote was taken. Aye 20 Nay 1 Absent 1 The motion carried.
Rep. Williams will carry HB 1018.

Chairman Holmberg called the committee to order on Thursday, March 07, 2013 in regards to HB 1018. All committee members were present. Brady Larson, Legislative Council and Joe Morrissette, OMB was also present.

Merle Paverud, Director of ND State Historical Society: Testified in favor of HB 1018 and provided written Testimony attached # 1. (:20-12:47)

Chairman Holmberg: We will also have a subcommittee; Senator Krebsbach, Senator Grindberg and Senator Mathern.

Senator Robinson: A couple of weeks ago I had some friends from my district out and they were in the facility and were pretty impressed on what is going on. The question they came back with regarded the store; do you see the store expanding in terms of offerings?

Merle Paverud: Yes, have you seen the space for the new store, it is quite a bit larger and near the entry point. We will have more space and North Dakota products are always a big item and we are excited about being able to increase that and books.

Senator Mathern: On the staff issue, what are the operational consequences on the new part between 22 staff and 6 staff and 0 staff, what is the actual outcome of those options?

Merle Paverud: It is big; security is our biggest concern, having 4 people in our exhibit halls. Right now we usually have one person who goes into the exhibit halls but we are going to have to have people who go into all of those. We have visitor

services also to answer questions. Our technology issues are very concerning. We have big video walls and the touch screen.

Senator Mathern: The main consequences are the operation of the facility?

Merle Paverud: Yes, it's right there. The building is going to be great but the people will make it that way. We need to have the right people on the job to provide the services that people will expect. But that will also help our historic sites as well because those people will be able to give the information on our sites. We have a hub of history, right in the middle where you can touch screens and get information about things all over North Dakota. We are working with North Dakota tourism and some other partners to focus on that.

Senator Warner: Did you make a way to distinguish between the financial responsibility of those of the society and those of the foundation?

Merle Paverud: Our financial responsibilities are based on our appropriations from the state of North Dakota. Our foundation is our nonprofit fund raising arm; they go out and raise money that can support things like expanding the North Dakota Heritage Center. They go out and lobby for us and promote. It is necessary for us to grow and get the job done.

Senator Warner: Are they capital projects?

Merle Paverud: Yes capital has been a big part of it. We have done work on the interruptive centers around the state. They helped us raise funds for that. The majority of their work has been for that but also for promotional efforts, working with donors, finding new folks, helping with collection issues, so they have connections and we use them to our best ability.

Vice Chairman Grindberg: Are we going to see an update on the fund raising and foundation?

Merle Paverud: Yes, we would be happy to do that.

Vice Chairman Grindberg: I think that would be very important and if you could give us a brief overview of what started with the capitol construction.

Merle Paverud: Dave can bring that forward.

Senator Carlisle: I assume you will have cameras in all these sensitive areas. Why wouldn't you tie those into the capitol security system and have the 24/7 people put a couple more panels in to monitor some of your sensitive areas?

Merle Paverud: We have the Highway Patrol office in the Heritage Center, which is a new addition. They do cover the capitol and that is done 24/7. We are across the hall from them and have all our cameras hooked up there. Not only in the Heritage Center but we have cameras out on the historic sites that monitor our resources there. One of the issues was they wanted to find a place outside the capitol that they could reside and have as a support for the capitol incase anything might happen. They are in now and monitoring everything that goes on here.

Senator Carlisle: You asked for FTE's for security but it sounds like you have a system potentially in place.

Merle Paverud: They don't provide security in the Heritage Center, on floor security. Their system is separate but in the building. They aren't capable of providing that security for us.

David Skalsky, Assistant Director of the State Historical Society of North Dakota: Presented Testimony attached # 2. (22:42-30:15)

Chairman Holmberg: What is the 8th grade curriculum?

David Skalsky: In the current budget we have money and have started on the eighth grade curriculum project and this would finish that project

Vice Chairman Grindberg: Can you briefly describe the estimated income that is projected in the Governor's budget, where that comes from and a basic overview. The House cut forty nine thousand in income for the legislative counsel sheets here.

David Skalsky: The income piece is related to the staff cuts that they made. The compensation package and we do have some federal money we used to pay some of our staff and our archeology and the stork preservation division. I think that forty nine thousand was related to those people.

Vice Chairman Grindberg: The income you collect is all grants or fees?

David Skalsky: It is a grant we get for our federal program. We are allotted so much per biennium and we use that to pay for our federal staff and also use it to provide

grants to entities throughout the state for historic preservation projects. Those projects have to be listed on the federal registrar to qualify for that money.

Vice Chairman Grindberg: Do we charge a fee when the new expansion opens up for entrance?

David Skalsky: By law we cannot charge a fee that is where the donation boxes come in. The traveling gallery we could do that to help support it if we get block buster exhibits in we could charge a fee.

Vice Chairman Grindberg: Is the statute, we could change the statute. Is this similar to what other states provide with their state museums, there is no fee charged?

Merle Paverud: Some states do. We looked at that a number of times and decided in order to have that system and to have a person to take care of that would probably neutralize what we would make. We do charge at our state historic sites. As Dave said in statute we cannot charge for the North Dakota Heritage Center that is the peoples place. That is so people can come in and see what they have .We do take donations and the foundation helps. The ND people appreciate that, we abide at what the statute says.

Vice Chairman Grindberg: That will be one of the things a member of the subcommittee will want to talk about.

Claudia Berg, Expansion & New Initiative Coordinator: Provided Testimony attached # 4. (33:45-35:36)

Chairman Holmberg: I hope that in your design of your café, that it is a little more attractive.

Claudia Berg: We worked on it a great deal and I think we have a good plan in place. Continues with testimony ((36:21-37:19)

Marlo Sveen, Director of Development for the State Historical Society of North Dakota Foundation: Testimony attached # 5. (37:45-40:39)

Chet Nelson, State Historical Board: We are close with the expansion and it is an exceptional project. Its first class and I would hope that we would be able to complete it, so the whole project is 1st class. The number 1 need is the staffing. I am concerned about the information technology, from a technology prospective things change. Not having any increase in the budget at this time is going to be a problem. It became

apparent to me the surveillance, we need visible security. I think things could happen from mischief to whatever. In the House it was disclosed the staff needs at the time we were looking at the construction. (41:00-44:50)

Vice Chairman Bowman: Has anyone done an economic study on what the impact will be for the city of Bismarck?

Chet Nelson: That is a good point that you bring out. This will bring in tourism and end up on a lot of lists in terms of packages here and there. It will affect the whole state and the economy of those towns. That's not saying we don't have a lot of that activity now, because we do. (45:10-46:44)

Chairman Krebsbach called the subcommittee together. All conferees are present, Senators Grindberg and Mathern and Mr. Paaverud and Dave Skalsky from the Historical Society are here. The salary issue is a non-issue. Sheila M. Sandness from Legislative Council and Joe Morrissette from OMB were also present

Merlen E. Paaverud, Director of the State Historical Society of North Dakota: I guess our biggest issue is staffing for the Heritage Center. We are hoping, because we are going to be opening up here soon we have been working on this for 5 years and this is the last big piece, we need the people to make it what we hope for. Several other things that we have, our historic sites exhibits that was cut by \$15,000, a very important outreach part of our work. The states 125th, there is a coordinator that has been hired for that now and we have \$50,000 in our budget for this biennium and then we had asked for \$150,000 and that was cut back to \$100,000. Right now there is a committee that is going to be set up by the governor to work on that and our Lieutenant Governor would be the chair because to try to get something organized in the state to recognize 125th, we are excited about that too because part of our grand opening will be on November 2, 2014. Our 8th grade curriculum we had funding for that this session and now this will be implementation of the curriculum. (2:51)

Chairman Krebsbach: Is that something that will continue?

Merlen E. Paaverud: That will be ongoing service to the schools throughout the state.

Chairman Krebsbach: That is not a one-time then that is something that will continue.

Merlen E. Paaverud: It is one-time it's completion of that project. Two of the things we were concerned about were capital improvements money and Fort Totten Hospital building. We had funding for that, this past session we did some stabilization on the biggest building at Fort Totten Hospital which is kind of a rare building to find on military historic sites. It's

also where the pioneer daughters have their museum. Then Stutsman County Courthouse we are hoping we can continue with that.

Senator Grindberg: What is the level in that?

Merlen E. Paaverud: What we are doing is just making getting it ready for use. The exterior has been completed. We did some stabilization and some cleaning this past biennium and so we just want to keep on with that. We've got a good support group now in Jamestown that is helping us out and we would like to keep that going forward. This past year they put in \$80,000.

Senator Grindberg: If we put in \$250,000 what would they put in?

Merlen E. Paaverud: I think they will put in as much as they can but I don't know what exactly what that would be.

Senator Mathern: For the hospital project, Stutsman County project, let's stay the Welk homestead project, where would this all be in your budget? Are they in the same part of the budget?

Dave Skalsky, Assistant Director of SHS: This would go into our capital project line item. It would be one-time money.

Senator Mathern: Where would it be on HB 1018?

Joe Morrissette: Section 1 line 14.

Senator Mathern: Would they be done in such a way where you would want discretion? Like a certain amount of money to take on projects like this or do you want a specific appropriation for specific projects?

Merlen E. Paaverud: What we have done in the past is specify particular projects on Fort Totten or on other historic sites that we would focus on and what this is, is a phasing in of projects to complete the buildings. (8:03)

Senator Mathern: Would this be reflected on an internal priority list or something? Do you have a list of projects around the state that you want to address?

Merlen E. Paaverud: This would be prioritized. We are in pretty good shape as far as our capital projects go. These are 2 of the last ones that are pretty big and pretty important. If the Welk homestead would come up there would probably be some needed capital repairs on that one too. I am not sure what the amount would be. We have a plan put together, and will get that for you.

Senator Erbele: The house, the shingles are wood and they are starting to peel up and the barn needs some foundation work. It could go for a while, but couldn't let people walk in. Tom from NDSU has volunteered to come out and shingle the house if we can find a way to house him and do that sort of thing so we could cut the costs down for just the materials.

Our quantity is finding the purchase price and how do we incorporate that into an amendment so we can successfully ask for it.

Sheila M. Sandness: That is Becky's budget, you can visit with her.

Chairman Krebsbach: I have great confidence they can handle the amendment.

Senator Erbele: Last session we gave the Pioneer Heritage Foundation operating money with the intent of Mr. Paaverud and the staff going out and seeing if they could obtain the properties. They aren't willing to give it, they want money because they feel its part of their inheritance and they want to cash out on it. (12:15)

Chairman Krebsbach: Who owns the property at this time?

Senator Erbele: It's owned by 2 cousins of Lawrence Welk, the Schwab sisters and it is being run on a 99 year lease by the Pioneer Heritage Foundation. At a sale they need to sign off. What happened with the Pioneer Heritage Foundation, the started 20 years ago but they never refreshed themselves and with the same people and now they have hit their mid 80's and they are tired, they want out and can't do it. (13:56)

Merlen E. Paaverud: The tri-county alliance has really put some steam in the tourism effort down there. They run tours around the tri-county area to look at the churches and have some food and different things. (14:38)

Senator Mathern: Let's say we negotiated purchasing the place, let's say the price is half way between where we are at now and we operated the place for a biennium what would be the price tag?

Merlen E. Paaverud: About \$130,000 that would include a seasonal person to operate the place, mow the lawn, get some volunteers, do some work on the buildings and put in a security system.

Senator Mathern: Let's say it was \$75,000 to purchase or \$80,000 so you would need about \$210,000?

Merlen E. Paaverud: That would be a good guess. The purchase price is really the issue here. When we got involved with it we thought they would want to donate the site to the state but that is not the case. It caught us by surprise, it is only 6 acres.

Senator Grindberg: How many tours annually?

Merlen E. Paaverud: They have gotten a couple thousand people and that would be open for the summer months. Recently it's been dwindling because they haven't been able to be as open as they could because of age and lagging interest.

Senator Erbele: They do have some count numbers out there but I the last couple years they have gone to appointment only. After last session they did increase the count

significantly with that \$25,000 we gave them and they operated 2 biennium's and still have about \$4,000 of that money left over. (18:30)

Chairman Krebsbach: It is quite a historical place. Every Sunday night is the Lawrence Welk show. I have been involved in some entities like this where by they sell probably so many square feet of land that you get titled for or something. I'm just dreaming here but he was so popular even if they just had a fund drive on Prairie Public for that place, it may bring in some money.

Senator Erbele: That is why I'm hesitant to bring in a bill that says lets buy it for \$100,000 because I think there are options of doing some of exactly what you said.

Senator Mathern: I am wondering if we should put together an amendment that addresses the needs that the Fort Totten Hospital, the Stutsman County Courthouse and the Welk Homestead project kind of together as a funding mechanism understanding kind of what's needed for each but giving the agency some room to actually do this in a manner that doesn't negotiate a selling or buying price right here in the committee.

Chairman Krebsbach: I don't know if it is best to put them in one lump or divide them out.

Merlen E. Paaverud: We've had both ways, either way we can make it work. It would give us some flexibility to deal with this project.

Senator Grindberg: Of these 3 projects what do they total?

Merlen E. Paaverud: \$250,000 each for Stutsman and Fort Totten and then this would be \$210,000 or so.

Senator Grindberg: We could put language in that said for these 3 projects the state will match \$1 for every dollar raised and then we could have the contingent amount.

Merlen E. Paaverud: It's worked before. We want a chance to do this stuff.

Senator Grindberg: This isn't big money. Just a thought.

Chairman Krebsbach: We can work on that. Senator Wanzek left an amendment for me that he would like to address to the subcommittee at some time and it's for \$250,000 for the courthouse so I'm not even going to pass it out because we may deal with it within committee. (25:09)

Merlen E. Paaverud: Also we lost our marketing money, \$75,000 but we got a lot of bang for the buck on that and marketing is really critical especially with our opening of the new center and if we do the Welk thing. The FTE's are critical; this is the last big piece of the expansion of the Heritage Center. This involves 22 FTE's. Our biggest concern is security and visitor services, you've got to have people out there to help the visitor. (26:11)

Chairman Krebsbach: The governor had included 6 new FTE's did those House leave those?

Merlen E. Paaverud: The House took out 1.

Chairman Krebsbach: If we were to bring you to a total of 12, and I'm just throwing this out, could you prioritize those positions that you have and we could look at another 10 in the next session if whatever your needs are going to be? Some of this is a year down the road before you are going to need those.

Merlen E. Paaverud: Yes we've looked at that and have got kind of a plan for how we could do that. (29:40)

Senator Mathern: What would be the actual implementation plan if we funded the whole works with staff?

Merlen E. Paaverud: Right away in July we'd get 12 and then the next 6 months we get 6 more and the end of the biennium we get 6 more.

Senator Mathern: If that were the case, what would be the actual implementation in terms of FTE's for the biennium?

Merlen E. Paaverud: 22

Senator Mathern: Is the amount of money that you projected for the 22 for the total biennium, what is the dollar amount?

Dave Skalsky: The dollar amount assumes they would all start working on July 1.

Senator Mathern: Why don't we get the whole dollar amount.

Senator Grindberg: I would suggest one at one of our next subcommittee meeting that we hold it over in the new expansion area. (32:32)

Chairman Krebsbach: That is a wise suggestion and we can.

Merlen E. Paaverud: Submitted a brochure Testimony attached # 1 - North Dakota Heritage Center Expansion (Exhibit Planning Update)

Senator Krebsbach: I would imagine there is a certain amount of training that has to go in for the new staff as well.

Senator Grindberg: When we got this project funded I really thought there would be part of North Dakota's history to have a legislative section.

Merlen E. Paaverud: The legislature hall of fame is right where you come in.

Dave Skalsky: When we put the staffing thing together, do you want us to look at all the 22, how would you bring them on board?

Chairman Krebsbach called the subcommittee to order on Wednesday, April 03, 2013 at 10:00 am in the Harvest Room. Let the record show all conferees are present. Vice Chairman Grindberg, Senator Mathern and Senator Krebsbach. Present were Mere Paavarud, Director and Dave Skalsy, Assistant Director of the State Historical Society. Senator Erbele was also present.

Becky J. Keller- Legislative Council Joe Morrissette- OMB

Senator Krebsbach this document #1.

Senator Mathern I am wondering does this list what it does in terms of the staffing requests for the operation of the new addition. If you could explain that Mr. Paavarud.

Senator Kresbach The staffing is one, the Welk homestead to discuss, the Stutsman County issue.

Merle Paavarud The other capital project was Fort Totten at \$250,000 as well; this would be phase two of the hospital cafeteria building restoration. This courthouse in Stutsman county is phase 2 as well.

Senator Mathern The staff, what were your last projections. One of the things we talked about was recognizing that the implementation is a little different than the original bill. So the number of staff needed was a little bit less than your original bill. What is that staff number?

Merle Paavarud We started out with 22 that we had requested and we were asked to put together some projections for 10 and 12, and we had also had provided a way to phase in the staffing of our biennium, starting with the number up front and then part ways in the

biennium, adding a few and then finally at the end adding the last ones which would work really well for us, because that is when we will need them.

Senator Mathern Do you have that written that you could give to the subcommittee right now? So, what is the dollar amounts to this proposal in terms of staffing? What dollar amount would have to be put in this bill to accomplish this purpose?

Dave Skalsy I did bring it over earlier. To put in all 22 positions, it shows \$2.8M, and down below you can see at the bottom of the schedule there, where I had it earmarked out if there was just 10 positions added, 12 positions added and that price tag would show on the second page at the bottom.

Senator Mathern Would that include the staged in ratios? **Dave** replied yes it would. For ten positions, it would show a price of \$1.5 M for the biennium, and that would show that 7 positions would come on July 13, additional two positions would come on in August and then the remaining of the top positions would come on in September. We would be looking at bringing them on as soon as possible.

Senator Krebsbach The executive budget gave you 6, and the House left those, did they not? **Dave** the House left 5 in there and they pulled one out and your proposed amendments here you add back in the technology coordinator so it looks like you're adding back that position they had pulled out. So the Exec Budget had included 6 positions already.

Senator Kresbach If we were to look at adding another 6 or 7 positions, could you make it work until the next biennium?

Merle Paavarud replied that would help tremendously. In an ideal situation we've looked at this and 22 are what we really, really need, and what you give us will help make it work. It is going to be harder and we're just concerned about the delivery of services and things that we promised to the public. 22 people would answer that quite well. Again we've taken great time and effort to try and put those together. Actually we had started out with more. What we have is what we really need, 22. But if we get say 13-14, we could give it a good run. That's for sure.

Senator Kresbach Do you have any thoughts on this idea?

Senator Mathern I think we ought to go with 10 positions that they have outlined under lowest proposal here. It is still a lot shorter than the 22. I imagine there will be fewer hours? It would be sad that when we open this deal that we aren't going to have the 22. I would rather we open with the 23, and go down to 12 in 5 years, versus start it at a lower amount and then go up. I think once you open a brand new deal, I imagine that is where the biggest impact is going to be. Everybody is going to want come the first couple of years and it might level off a little bit. I would encourage us to try and do the 10 based on their minimum proposal and that would be my view.

Merle Paarvarud One of our biggest concerns is security and so we are going to have to dedicate whatever we get right off the top to security issues. With three new exhibit halls,

and the big hallway, doubling our space that is where we're going to have to go, but we do need to professional staff to do the web services. We're going to have a lot of technology that is going to have to put in and then updated periodically. Our behind the scenes staff that develops all the materials that go into our programming and education.

Vice Chairman Grindberg I certainly am inclined to support the Governors recommendation at 6, and maybe adjust your operating line so you could contract for some of this work. You certainly could contract for security that is not uncommon for many agencies to contact for services. Even with some of the web work, if you have a large project or things need to done over the next 10-12 months, some of that could be contracted rather than a permanent position.

Senator Krebsbach Same line of thinking to contract for security. The entire complex will not be open until November 2014, correct?

Merle Paavarud replied, the entire complex will be open before that, but that will be the Grand Opening. We will have all of the places open prior to that time, October 2013, we'll have a Grand Opening of one of the galleries; several months later, the First People's, than the North Dakota Gallery. But ultimately, the Grand Opening is November 2, 2014. We will be open as soon as we can be with multiple openings.

Senator Krebsbach It takes some time as well to train these new people. With only 6 I have some trepidation, that you may not be handling it as well as you should be, so that is why I am looking at a few more bodies for you. Our committee will have to confer on that as we have real extremes within the committee.

Senator Mathern We have this list, let's put in the Fort Totten deal, let's put in the Welk deal, and let's cut the difference here on this staff and move ahead.

Senator Krebsbach The first three items are covered, that has to do with compensation and restoring the governor's package. The next issue the traveling exhibits and coordinator position. Can we go along with those? What about the additional dollars for the state celebration #7, 4 to 7 we agree upon. The courthouse repairs at Stutsman County. I had heard that there could be an adjustment on that figure.

Merle Paavarud That is our best figure for the 2nd phase. **Senator Kresbach** Are there matching dollars on that? Merle replied yes, from local money.

Vice Chairman Grindberg Is this unique situation because of Stutsman County or is this something that could blossom at other county courthouses around the state?

Merle Paavarud: We've had this for about 30 years.

Vice Chairman Grindberg No other court houses that are in this situation where we've been having a discussion?

Merle Paavarud Yes, this is a unique situation. Right in the middle of a large town, we've had it for 30 years, and actually this is one of the first projects I worked on when I was pulled in from Fort Totten into Bismarck and we did the cleaning, and we did stabilization of the exterior over the years and now we need to do the interior. **Vice Chairman Grindberg** Part of ND heritage involves Senator Nething's influence on that?

Merle Paavarud replied before we had some of our statehood meetings and that sort of thing. It's got a great space for community events, office spaces and a beautiful collection of steel interior and pretty unique place, very nice. **Senator Kresbach** # 8 we will adopt.

Senator Krebsbach # 9 = restoring the funds for traveling exhibits, language needs to be there.

Senator Krebsbach Funding for the Lawrence Welk property.

Senator Erbele: Amendments for us to consider. One will buy the property outright. The purchase price was at \$125,000 and they've agreed on \$100,000. Just as a fact the year runs, most of the summer will be gone until is going into effect. So the foundation that is running it will maintain it for this summer yet. So I've included a purchase price of \$100,000 and then \$85,000 to run it for one year for one year of the biennium. That \$85,000 would include \$25,000 for operating, about \$40,000 for staff, being that is at a remote site want two people there; printing up brochures, the total includes purchasing a lawn mower; that would eat up the \$85,000. The other amendment for the committee to consider is that we would require a match the state would come up with \$65,000 local \$35,000. And then the \$85,000 would remain the same. I am offering both for the committee's consideration. It would be cleaner in my view just to buy it, and then encourage the locals still do some match money and do some of the repairs necessary on the place this summer, before the state takes over, they could do a lot of that foundation work, put the shingles on, get all that stuff done and not to hassle about the hoops that a state property needs to jump through.

Senator Krebsbach you are saying \$100,000 authority, \$65,000 from the state \$35,000 locally raised. **Senator Erberle** replied yes.

Senator Erbele I have one amendment to that, and then one that would just appropriate the \$100,000 to buy it outright and I almost preferred to buy it and encourage the locals to get the projects done before the state takes ownership.

Vice Chairman Grindberg that said, the intent that Senator Erbele shared, could Merle do a purchase agreement as a responsible entity to make sure that prior to signing the papers that those items would be listed, what would be repaired, that way we know it's clear. If we accept the first amendment, and it goes through then OMB or SHS would need direction on the list of items that need to be completed before purchase can be. Clear the intent of the subcommittee. Senator Erbele I offered both because we may need one or the other in conference. This will go to conference because it was not put on in the House.

Merle Paavarud: We are just looking at the second year of biennium so this is in the future, increasing this so that we can do a full two years, but, the on the one part with the \$65,000/\$35,000 like that is our intent too that we would have to have that \$35,000 prior

to. That would be the trigger to purchase and then we wouldn't do anything until that was met, so that would put a little incentive in that.

Senator Krebsbach Either, to require them to match \$35,000 or for them to provide the repairs to the property that we speaking of, the barn, and foundation and things of that nature. That is not spelled in here, so if that is the case, we should have some intent from the committee. **Senator Erberle** it is a work in progress.

Senator Kresbach What do you think about this? I think it's time we come to some conclusion on it. First of all are we interested in obtaining this for the state; that is the main question we have to ask?

Vice Chairman Grindberg I like the idea. I think the first proposal Senator Erberle just shared. I mean we're talking \$35,000, and if they are going to repair the property and we can define what that is, then I think we should just expedite the process. Chairman Kresbach So that would be your suggestion, that we do it in that fashion and that would be for the state of ours to pay the \$100,000 for the property. Vice Chairman Grindberg Yes. I don't know how we work that so that we can assure ourselves that if it's a foundation and shingles and whatever items that are required that it gets repaired. That might cost them \$15,000-\$25,000 to repair it.

Becky J. Keller We can put in a section of legislative intent and maybe Mr. Paavarud could come up with some items that we should include in there that they have to take care of before the purchase can be made.

Senator Krebsbach I would like to have something spelled out so that all parties know where we are coming from.

Senator Mathern Thinking of the rest of the steps for the House we should maybe have a dollar amount for the entire project that approximates the Stutsman County project, the Fort Totten project and that leaves room for the state agency to negotiate some of this. I don't know if we really know that the selling price is, certainly the intent is here. I think if you get we are negotiating a lot of things on this level that don't always come to fruition on the local level, I would be concerned if someone rejects the bid and it would change the decision if we want the property, we need more room to be sure it's done correctly.

Senator Krebsbach I wonder if that couldn't be stated in the intent that it should be done in the fashion of approval from SHS. Merle, that is what we'd have to do, spec it out and detail that for them so, they know what we're looking for. With the NDSU group they are very easy to work with on that. The local folks will have to be informed as well. We can definitely define that more precisely and help them out as well so they know what they are getting into with donated labor and things that would go on the front end that would help a lot. So we could walk in there and have an operation that we wouldn't have to be working on right away.

Senator Krebsbach Is there any action that would like to be taken on the two amendments that were proposed by Senator Erberle?

Senator Kresbach You would like the outright purchase of \$100,000 with the wording that we have discussed about the intent on the balance of the buildings. **Vice Chairman Grindberg** moved the 2nd amendment that explains that gives us some kind of a basis of the expectation is there.

Senator Kresbach Is that okay with you Senator? We will consider that issue covered. Now, # 3 The Brady collections of military artifacts, we can scratch that, it has nothing to do with this bill.

Senator Krebsbach Fort Totten situation of the \$250,000 request; that was for a hospital or an infirmary was it not, that needs repair and needs to be brought up to standards.

Merle Paavarud Very rare building military hospital on the post. It is a military hospital with two wings on it, the biggest building on the post and it was used in the Indian school period. It has a cafeteria, and now it's being used with Pioneer Daughters Museum, the Lake Region Pioneer Daughters Museum is there museum space and it needs stabilizations so that they can continue to use but again it is a unique structure that has a varied history and offers a great space for a working in partnership with that group.

Senator Mathern I made a motion to add that. He moved to add this. It would be one of the OAR's that we are adding.

Vice Chairman Grindberg It is a quarter of a million dollars. I am still not clear where we are at, with the Governor's Executive recommendation, what we are proposing above that? In particular the FTE issue whether we are going to provide some operating dollars for contracting it. I am a little uncomfortable with jumping into another chunk without knowing without knowing overall.

Senator Mathern We act on all of these items in terms of the intent. Then we add with a list of all of the items with the dollar amounts that we have verbally talked about and then we act with a formal motion.

Senator Krebsbach My only concern, if we don't address it some way here, is it going to be harder to deal with in conference.

Vice Chairman Grindberg Where would the funding come, the SIFF fund, or the General fund?

Chairman Kresbach I don't have the answer to that. We would have to figure that out.

Merle Paavarud All been general fund. It is a major part of our outreach. It is just like parks, we have them all over the place and we're finally getting into the end at Fort Totten restoration. This is one of the last big challenges that we have out there.

Senator Krebsbach Can it be done in phases, part of it this biennium and part of it the next biennium?

Merle Paavarud The whole building was a little over \$1 M and so we just we just did \$250,00 last biennium and now we are asking for Phase 2 with this one \$250,000. It is being operated now, but the floor is bad we had to redo the foundation, moving up to do the rest of the building.

Vice Chairman Grindberg Why wasn't this included in the budget?

Joe Morrissette As we prioritized it was a lower priority, the funding for the travelling exhibits and those kinds of things that related to the opening of the expanded Heritage Center. To continue, it is not a lack of support for that project, because there had been recommendations in the past to include funding for some of those repairs at Fort Totten, but just in the timing of this biennium, and other needs it was not prioritized.

Senator Krebsbach What is your wishes on that particular request?

Senator Mathern What if we address this staff issue that is a bigger issue. Should we move to your suggestion that we add the 6 staff?

Senator Krebsbach It gives us something to debate the House with. What would the cost be on adding 6? What amass is needed?

Vice Chairman Grindberg Through your process of identifying need for FTE's, did your team have discussions on contract services?

Merle Paavarud, Yes, we did. The problem is with so many of these position, they need to be trained positions that would be for ongoing needs for web services; with our security officers, they need to know all of our systems; again just providing the best services as well as services for the public. They would in interacting with the people, telling them what the services are, where they can get materials and then working with them that way. The web service people would be redoing some of our programming, our big screens on the wall that we have in our theater presentations, the touch tables, interactive web kiosks that we'll have that will be in the middle for people to find out the hub of history. Each tells about everything in the state promotion and that sort of thing for on-going up grades.

Vice Chairman Grindberg The two web development positions that is 4000 hours a year. I have a hard time understanding that that is going to be that kind of demand; that is a lot of time with 2 people.

Merle Paavarud It's a lot but we've got a lot. It think it is just we're taking a huge step forward with all of the, this and again this technology is such an issue. It is not going to be just but for out material but also for our website, for providing services for our archives, for A & HP for the whole agency. The museum part will be a big part of it, but again for services, all of that will have to done as well. We're getting more and more requests for information at times. It is just that people demand it to have this stuff put on the web to have it right there at their fingertips. We just put the Bismarck Tribune on line along with the Minnesota State Historical Society so people go on and their Bismarck Tribune. Now we're looking at down the road at putting more newspapers on line. That is the kind of thing that goes on and on. It is just a growing monster.

Vice Chairman Grindberg I am going with the Governor's recommendation.

Senator Krebsbach Back to the Fort Totten, it seems to me as I am perusing the sheet labeled, attachment 1, \$327,000 House amended that down to \$150,000 or am I looking at the wrong line, they took it out completely. It wasn't included at all. They didn't take it out. We just have to decide whether we're going to add it or not.

Senator Mathern How did you go from \$327,000 to \$250,000? Did you estimate too high at the beginning or you're not fixing something with \$250,000?

Merle Paavarud The \$327,000, \$228,000 was what we had originally looked at but \$250,000 would give us the opportunity to stay with the project and stay at the same amount that we got this past biennium.

Senator Mathern I hope we can include it. It is finishing a phase and I understand its building up in the matter in tourism, and event similar to the Renaissance Fair in Minneapolis.

Merle Paavarud We have various events, for schools, we set up stations throughout the site where the kids can go around and see how different things were done. We have everything from hide tanning, to makings soap and blacksmithing and actually getting them into the buildings and seeing what it was like as far as the military goes, plus in order to see the Indian school, very important to the local economy there to understand that part of their history. We've had some bumps up there again with the high water and everything, but now that is stabilized, so we're getting our theater group to come back out and use one of the buildings. We have an inn there for people to stay overnight. The Pioneer Daughters Museum, brand new Interpretative Center display, all buildings are open so the people can go through them and see them

Senator Krebsbach We have to move here. We have agreed on most of this. We have two items to discuss and work on, staffing and the Fort Totten Project. Then to I would just like to clarify for the clerk's benefit that the amendment adopted that we're looking at for the Welk property is that of #02002, because there were two presented.

Senator Krebsbach We'll call one more meeting. We are now recessed.

Chairman Holmberg called the committee to order on Monday, April 08, 2013 at 3:45 pm on HB 1018.

Becky J. Keller- Legislative Council Joe Morrissette- OMB

Senator Krebsbach explained the amendment # 13.8147.02005. Attached testimony # 1. On page 3 numbers 1, 2, and 3 are the return to governor's budget for salaries. We restored it back to the governor's recommendation. # 4, the House removed a lot of the things we thought were important. We restored the funding for the travelling exhibits and the historic sight exhibits. They had taken out the funding for the coordinator position; we felt that was important so we returned that. We added back \$50,000 that they had removed for the 125th celebration next year. The next is the funding for Stutsman County courthouse and the Lawrence Welk homestead.

Senator Erbele explained the projects that are needed at the Lawrence Welk homestead before the state takes ownership - new cedar shingles on the house, some foundation work on the barn, and restoring an old bandshell.

Senator Krebsbach continued explaining the amendment. The Fort Totten Infirmary is a project that has been worked on for several years. Not too many as old as this that are being restored or being taken care of by the state. Let's get that done, the longer you let it go, the more expensive it is to do the repairs. In respect to the staffing, the committee decided to give flexibility and allow \$300,000 for hiring temporary or for contracting.

Senator Krebsbach moved the adoption of Amendment # 13.8147.02005.

Seconded by Senator Erbele.

Chairman Holmberg: The FTE's are exactly as they came from the executive branch, with flexibility.

Senator Mathern: I served on the subcommittee. I support this. I am concerned about the staff of the new facility opening. I feel it is unfortunate, at the time when there will be the greatest interest, may not be fully staffed here. I am hoping we can still do more. I just want the senators to be aware of that. Essentially we are having a grand opening, but we don't have the staff that the operators of the facility think we need to make it a real grand opening.

Chairman Holmberg: You will be on that conference committee, Senator Mathern.

Amendment adopted on a voice vote.

Senator Krebsbach moved Do Pass as Amended on HB 1018.

Seconded by Senator Erbele.

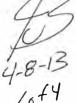

Sen. Mathern: This is a historic building on the national register. It has been a state project because the nature of this court house is very different that rest of our court houses. Elaborated. To find the right match and to bring the proposal before us to the Historical Society did not get done before the bill introduction deadline. They got the material ready by the time the bill came to the Senate.

Rep. Streyle: That was in their list. It was not funded in the Executive budget. The same with Fort Totten hospital repairs and the cultural heritage grants. It was a request, but not funded.

Rep. Williams: I do not remember that it was part of the bill.

5:55 **Sen. Krebsbach**: Now that I think back, it was a request that was not funded. Continued with explaining the changes, resuming with information regarding funding for the Lawrence Welk historic site.

Sen. Krebsbach: There is a valuation of 125 listed here. The figure of \$100,000 has been negotiated on that. In addition to that, there is a caveat whereby the historical society manager will negotiate with the owners to have repairs made. Detailed the repairs which must be completed before the purchase of the homestead is completed.

Rep. Streyle: This is an agreed upon thing should this falls into place? The repairs you listed could be quite costly. Was there a discussion what the cost of that would be?

Sen. Krebsbach: There has been a certain amount done. They're working with someone from NDSU.

9:18 **Sen. Mathern:** The group of history students at NDSU indicated they would like to do volunteer work on this project. The concern is that the work be done before the state purchases it. If purchased, then there are other requirements that go into effect regarding engineering and architectural requirements of state operations. Parties felt that some of that work could be done before the purchase in order to save some money from being spent.

Rep. Streyle: And it says that the Historical Society shall determine the repairs that must be completed. That's pretty wide open. They could determine now to make minimal repairs and then come back next session and ask for money for repairs.

Sen. Mathern: We heard it that the Historical Society would be more demanding to restore it, in terms of it being repaired correctly. That's why we have them that responsibility.

11:08 **Sen. Krebsbach:** I have a sheet that spells out the repairs that would be needed.

Rep. Streyle: The main issue that I have was with the operating expenses. Where did the number come from?

Sen. Krebsbach: That was spelled out in the document. If not, Mr. Paverud can get those numbers for you. The figures are available on a breakdown. Elaborated.

Sen. Mathern: It's a location on the prairie, and security was a concern. Elaborated.

Sen. Krebsbach: What we found there is that the Historical Society had requested twenty-two FTEs because of the expansion of the facility. The Governor's budget had given them six. You had cut it back; we reinstated one. They are now up to six, but that still leaves them short. We were not comfortable funding more FTEs at this time because we are not convinced of where or how they're going to need them. When the building gets completed, there is little doubt that they will need additional bodies. But we decided that we would give them a pool of money whereby they could contract or hire temporary staff during the time when the new part opens. The building will be complete in September of this year, but the final exhibits will be completed intermittently, and the grand opening will be in November of 2014 to coincide with our state's 125th anniversary. We cannot leave them completely shorthanded; we have to give them some flexibility and allowance to do something. We thought temporary or contracting would be the way to go. Then they can convert and convince us in the next session how and where they need the additional personnel.

15:40 **Rep. Williams:** I do not have a lot of problems with the infrastructure parts where we're dealing with wages and operating. When I take a look at the options that were not funded by the Governor, they add up to over a million dollars.

Sen. Krebsbach: I'm not finding over a million dollars. Maybe I'm adding wrong.

Rep. Williams: Highlighted dollar amounts for Fort Totten, Stutsman courthouse....

Representative Grande: To review where we are at, the Senate's proposal had come in about \$1.3M above the House; the Senate has offered a proposal and the House has offered a counterproposal which is a pooling project at \$750,000, half of where the Senate's proposal was, not including the pay package of which is another \$919,000 difference. That is the proposal on the table today.

1:49 Senator Krebsbach: We have a new facility here. The proposal we offered is \$532,000 over the governor's budget. I can easily justify the additional dollars for the \$500,000 that we are above the executive budget. They had requested 22 new FTEs. The executive budget put in 6, the House reduced that to 5, which reduced it about \$200,000. In addition to that, the Senate put in a pool of about \$300,000 for them to hire temporary or contract employees for the next two years to see where this goes. That puts us \$400,000 difference.

Representative Grande: In light of that, we saw that there was possibly the need for these employees; the House was willing to go to that pooling project where we also have the contingency full time equivalent position in the wording so that that position can be filled if need be, would need to, or like to do as was suggested by the House side, a technology person that would help them to design the programming. We also included in the pooling project enough money to bring in the temps and do what they wanted to do. The full flexibility to get the new facility up and running the way they would want to do it. Coming in \$142,000 above what the governor had recommended.

4:40 Senator Krebsbach: I'm not objecting to pooling it or whatever we need to get through this. My objection is we're shorting them by \$400,000 to get all the work done that has been requested to be done.

I'm not willing to support going beyond what the House's position is.

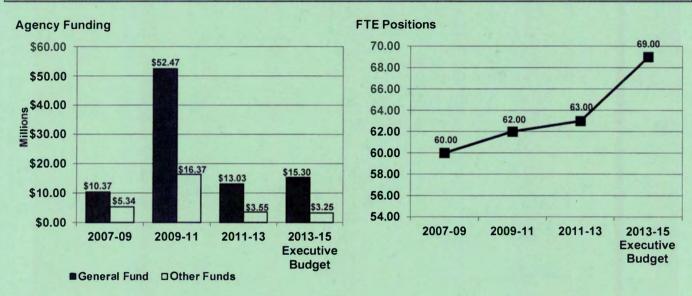

Testimony by Merlan E. Paaverud Jr., Director State Historical Society of North Dakota

Chairman Skarphol and members of the Education and Environmental Division of the House Appropriations Committee, my name is Merl Paaverud and I am the Director of the State Historical Society of North Dakota. I am here today to provide an overview of the Society's 2011-13 accomplishments and introduce testimony regarding House Bill 1018.

2011-13 Statistics

State Historic Sites Visitors to date -134,667.

- Total archeological artifacts in collections: 14 million from 2,195 sites representing 12,000 years of prehistory.
- Number of SHPO reviews: 6,144
- Number of new sites input into the GIS: 2,194.
- 1,453 cultural resource surveys digitized into the GIS system.
- Usage of site files and cultural resource reports by cultural resource specialists: Total amount of Historic Preservation for grants: \$354,000
- Total amount of cultural heritage grants made to total number of recipients: \$449,000 for 55 projects. In addition, \$30,000 was expended on 3 museum assessment grants and \$28,300 on training scholarships.
- Provided 11,125 responses to the State Archives inquiries for information.
 Digitized 204 photographs and other materials related to the North Dakota History 8th Grade Curriculum.
- Averaged 20,427 users who accessed the State Historical Society webpage per month.
- Provided 88 SEND (Suitcase Exhibits in North Dakota) schools, libraries and public venues.

2011-13 Accomplishments

- A new gun carriage was purchased for the 12 Pounder Gun, Model 1857 (Napoleon). The cannon will be included in the new exhibits in the ND Heritage Center.
- Installed the new orientation exhibit Encountering Fort Totten at the Fort Totten State Historic Site visitor center.
- Installed a new temporary exhibit entitled How does your Garden Grown in the Pembina State Museum.
- Installed National Park Service traveling exhibit "Lincoln: The Constitution and the Civil War" and The Art of Einar Olstad in the Missouri Yellowstone Confluence Interpretive Center at Fort Buford State Historic Site.
- Installed "Beyond the Boundaries: The History of Fort Abercrombie" exhibit in the Fort Abercrombie Interpretive Center.
- Installed new exhibit panels and a new artifact case at Gingras Trading Post State Historic Site.
- The Society's Archaeology and Historic Preservation Division continued incorporating recorded archaeological, historical, and architectural sites in North Dakota into an access database and a multi-layered digital mapping format, the Geographic Information System (GIS).

Continuing Appropriations Narrative:

Concession Fund

This continuing appropriation authority has been provided for the operation of the Historical Society Museum Store operation at the North Dakota Heritage Center and State Historic Sites. The Heritage Center Museum Store is operated as an extension of the State Historical Society education program. The store provides a forum through which museum exhibits and other aspects of North Dakota's culture and history can be expanded on for the benefit of the general public.

Although a profit margin is associated with all museum store items and is established by the director, profits from sales are used to repurchase inventory and conduct other special educational projects through the production of materials or publications for sale through the store. The emphasis of the store is not oriented toward large profits, but the profits many publications and reproductions of exhibit related items to be produced. All funds derived from the operation of the museum store are used for the purpose from which they were derived, namely the store operation and to supplement the publications activity of the State Historical Society. The museum store aims to select quality items that meet specific criteria. Quality of work, whether in publications or crafts, must be of professional quality. All items about North Dakota, its history and cultures of its people and its geography should be as accurate as possible. Emphasis is given to selling items produced in North Dakota though exceptions are made. All items should pertain to North Dakota and the surrounding area. Items sold in the museum store cannot be derogatory to race, creed, sex or religion. All items, which are reproductions of artifacts, will be labeled "reproduction" or "replica. The museum store will not sell any items made of or containing fossils.

The other aspect of the concession fund relates to fees that are collected for the use of the facilities of the agency, admissions fees and use charges for services provided. All these funds are used to offset the direct costs associated with providing these services and include supplies, materials, equipment and temporary staff for seasonal historic sites.

Gifts and Bequests

Historically, museum operations have depended on the generosity of supporters for their continued existence. The authority provided for the acceptance of gifts and bequest stems from this desired support. All funds are maintained in the state treasury. Most gifts are given for specific purposes either to support a specific exhibit, collections or programs and such gifts are restricted to the purpose for which they were given. Most gifts are small and come through the agency's donation

boxes. There has never been a large enough donation to establish a trust that could produce significant income on a continuing basis.

Archeological Permits

An individual, organization, institution or company engaged on one's own behalf or on behalf of another to identify, evaluate, or mitigate adverse affects on cultural resources, historic buildings, structures, or objects on any lands in North Dakota must obtain an annual permit from the director of the State Historical Society. Such fees are deposited in the revolving fund and must be used by the director for making investigations of permit applicants and for management and analysis of records and artifacts submitted to the director under sections 55-03-01, 55-03-01.1 and 55-03-02.

Testimony by David Skalsky, Assistant Director State Historical Society of North Dakota

Chairman Skarphol and members of the committee, my name is David Skalsky and I am the Assistant Director of the State Historical Society of North Dakota. I am here today to present testimony regarding funds carried over from the 2009-11 biennium to the 2011-13 biennium, provide an update on the 2011-13 biennium budget and to go over the optional adjustment requests included in the executive budget for 2013-15.

Capital Asset Funding Carried Over to the 2011-13 Biennium:

NDCC Chapter 54-44.1.11 states, in part, that "... the state historical society shall report on the amounts and uses of funds carried over from one biennium to the appropriations committee of the next subsequent legislative assembly."

- North Dakota Heritage Center Expansion \$34,373,466 in state funds was carried over for the completion of the North Dakota Heritage Center Expansion.
- Site maintenance and security equipment \$78,454 was carried over to purchase grounds maintenance and security equipment for the historic sites and heritage center.
- Building Maintenance and Repairs \$274,092 was carried over to complete repairs and maintenance on buildings located on our historic sites. \$228,293 of this funding has been used to stabilize the floor and foundation on the hospital building located at the Fort Totten State Historic Site.

- Compact Shelving \$345,386 was carried over to complete the installation of the compact shelving in the State Archives Addition.
- Exhibits \$38,548 was used for installation and repairs costs associate with exhibits located at the State Historic Sites.

State Historical Society's 2011-13 biennium budget update:

Salaries, wages, and operating expenses for the 2011-13 biennium are being expended as projected. The cultural heritage grant program has been very successful in helping local historical societies and other entities throughout the state to complete projects in their communities. Cultural Heritage grant application requests for dollar-for-dollar matching funds has exceeded the amount \$504,000 appropriated by the legislature. One-time funding was also appropriated for several projects. The status of those items, as of November 30, 2012, is provided below.

One Time Funding 2011-13 Biennium

- Exhibits \$90,000 These funds are being used for new exhibits in the commissary building at the Fort Totten State Historic Site, for the restoration and preservation of the cannon at the Fort Rice State Historic Site, and for display panels at the Whitestone Hill State Historic Sites. Approximately \$8,600 has been spent to date.
- Historic Site Repairs \$475,000 \$350,000 of these funds were used to match an additional \$650,000 in Federal funds needed for the stabilization of the riverbank at the Fort Abercrombie State Historic Site. This project has been substantially completed. An additional \$100,667 has been spent on repairs to various buildings and grounds located at various historic sites.
- Database Migration \$30,900 Funding was provided to the Society to contract with ITD to migrate years of data from our access databases to MS SQL which is a more stable database. This project is currently in progress.

- Security Staff Funding \$59,800 Funding was provided for additional security coverage during the Heritage Center expansion. Approximately \$53,000 has been spent to date and the remaining funds will be spent by June 30, 2013.
- ITD Detailed Business Analysis \$10,000 The amount included in the executive budget for a detailed IT business analysis was \$145,410. This analysis would have helped the Society to determine how to more efficiently keep records and provide more and better public access to collections through technology. This amount was reduced to \$10,000. Since funding was not sufficient to do the analysis, this project has not moved forward.
- North Dakota eighth grade curriculum development \$125,000 This funding
 was provided for the development of a new eighth grade curriculum. This
 project is moving forward and will continue into the 2013-15 biennium.
 Additional funding of \$150,000 was included in the executive budget for the
 2013-15 biennium to complete this project.
- North Dakota's 125th Celebration of Statehood \$50,000 This funding is to be used for operating and other expenses related to the planning of North Dakota's 125'th celebration of statehood. An additional \$50,000 for salaries was included in OMB's budget for a temporary staff person to oversee these activities. It is our understanding that this is moving forward as OMB and the Governor's office has hired someone. As of November 30, 2012, the Society has not spent any of \$50,000.

Opportunities & Expectations

Introduction

The building expansion to the North Dakota Heritage Center is projected to be completed in the spring of 2013, with the exhibits finished by the fall of 2014. While the building will be beautiful, the quality of visitors' experiences will be dictated by the level of services provided by the State Historical Society staff. In order for the Heritage Center Expansion project to be successful, services provided in the new facility must meet or exceed public expectations.

North Dakota has a marvelous opportunity to make the North Dakota Heritage Center a national and international destination and events center. It is important that we understand what the public demands of this project and avoid the disappointment that resulted when the original Heritage Center building was opened in 1981 without the completed exhibits and programming that the public believed would be there.

This document is therefore designed to identify public expectations and determine the levels of staffing it will take to meet them.

Expectations

Visitors to the North Dakota Heritage Center expect to experience and explore the entire history and heritage of North Dakota, including the geology, paleontology, natural history, archaeology, and the history of all the state's people. The Heritage Center is unique among the museums of this region in the broad range of disciplines and subject areas covered in one institution.

Visitors expect the Heritage Center to house high-quality exhibits. They expect the center to present and deliver public and educational programs related to the new and expanded exhibits. The public assumes that technology will be integrated into the exhibits and programs, delivering new educational programs to audiences across the state.

Public expectations can be categorized as follows:

- **Grand Opening** The public will expect to see a finished, fully-staffed facility. To avoid public disappointment, sufficient, well-trained staff need to be in place and ready to go when the facility opens.
- **Technology** People have incorporated technologies such as computers, telecommunications, and multimedia into their daily lives. The public expects such technology to be incorporated into the expansion, where it will improve the visitor experience and increase access to the collections and further information.

- **Exhibits** Although new exhibits will be installed when the building is completed, the public will look for new features on return visits. The Governors Gallery (a rotating gallery) and other exhibits need to be changed and updated constantly.
- Event Center The public, businesses, state agencies, and others will want to host programs, conferences, receptions, weddings, and other events at this new state-of-the-art facility. This facility will be a regional events center.
- Education and Interpretation The public expects educational and interpretive programming that tells the stories behind the objects, allowing visitors to dig deeper into the who, why, and how of the artifacts they view. The State Historical Society is also responsible for providing North Dakota Studies curriculum to the state's students.
- Access to Collections The public has expressed a desire for more access to collections, both physically in the museum and through remote use of technology. They also expect people to be available to answer questions and provide information.
- **Protection of the State's Collections** The public expects the state's collections (including artifacts on exhibit) and museum visitors to remain safe and secure despite the increase in the building's size and in visitation.
- The Hub of History/Support for State-Wide Organizations Communities, organizations, and institutions across the state expect the Hub of History to direct visitors to history and tourism sites across the state. Local historical groups and organizations also anticipate that the Society will provide technical support for their activities.

Staff Recommendations

The quality of the visitor experience will be dictated by the level of services provided by the staff. In order for the Heritage Center expansion project to be truly successful, services provided in this new facility must meet or exceed public expectations. Additional staff needs, and a brief explanation of those needs, are as follows:

- One Technology Coordinator and Three Multimedia/Web Developers

 Enhance the visitor experience and provide access to collections through the Hub of History,
 Great Plains Theater, exhibit interactives, website, online access and museum stores, social
 media networks, interpretive and educational programs, and mobile media outreach.
- Three Museum Exhibit and Collections Specialists and one Conservator
 Preserve the collections of the state of North Dakota; create and maintain exhibits; provide materials and information for educational and interpretative programs, media, and publications; and provide professional advice on conservation repair and treatment to museums throughout the state and the general public.
- Three Visitor Services and Security Officers and Two Control Room Security Officers Meet expectations and mandates for the protection of state and federal archives and collections and assure the security of visitors. Visitor service security officers will also provide personal response to public questions and concerns.
- One Electronic Records Archivist and two Archives Specialists
 Preserve vital government electronic and paper records and make them available to the public, as legally mandated. Provide collections and content for exhibits, educational and interpretative programs, researchers, media, and publications. Provide professional assistance on preserving collections to visitors, local and county museums, and state and federal agencies.
- One Archaeology Collections Specialist

Provide documentation and preservation of archaeology collections and maximize the research and educational potential of the collections. Develop, update, and maintain a master collections catalog database. Assist archaeological collections manager with online content and outreach projects.

Education Programs Developer

Develop educational and public programming in conjunction with the exhibits, Great Plains Theater, auditorium, and gallery interactives, as well as provide educational programming to student audiences statewide through distance learning programs.

Graphic Artist

Produce custom-made maps, graphics, drawings, exhibit panels, brochures, program flyers, and gallery activity sheets for the Heritage Center, historic sites, and for the Traveling Interpretive Exhibit Service (TIES) Program, which provides traveling exhibits to county and local historical societies, libraries, and other institutions.

Marketing Specialist

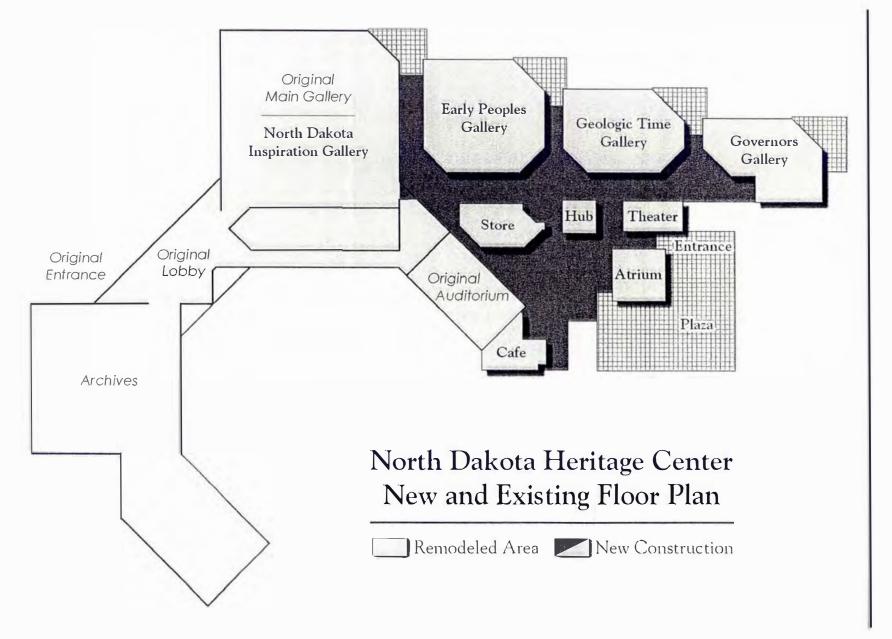
Market and promote the SHSND and its resources, including historic sites, the expanded North Dakota Heritage Center and its expanded exhibits and public programs, as well as related agency activities, events, and products. Efforts would also include further marketing partnerships with the North Dakota Tourism Division, the North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department, and other agencies and organizations.

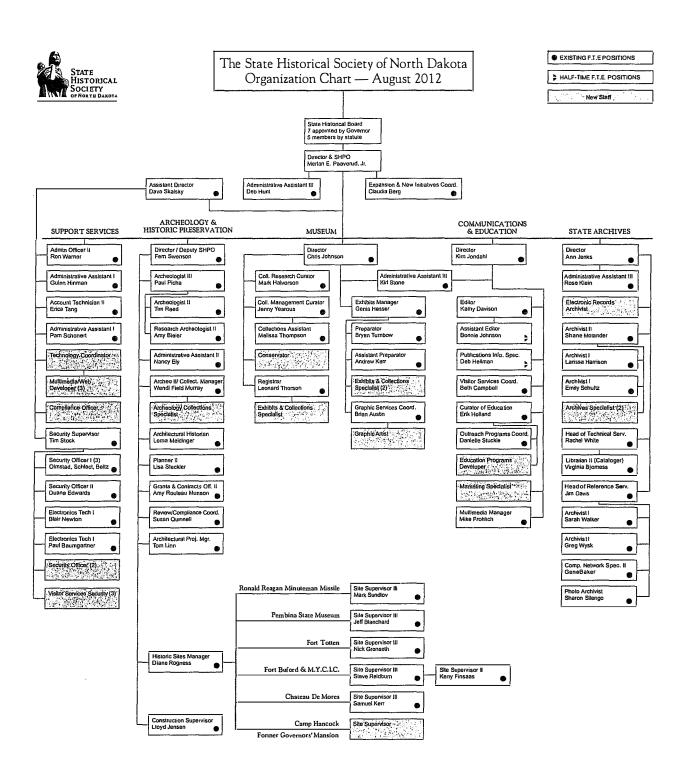
Compliance Officer

Ensure compliance with state and federal laws concerning bids, contracts, purchasing, hiring procedures, audit recommendations, and requirements.

• Site Supervisor – Former Governors' Mansion and Camp Hancock

Develop public programming and interpretive information, provide tours, conduct special events, and maintain the grounds and buildings at these two state historic sites.

Technology Coordinator

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$96,779 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

The State Historical Society lacks the staff knowledge and resources to address its technology needs and data challenges. The technology coordinator will work closely with ITD to determine the Society's current and future business needs and implement and maintain the technology systems needed to meet those needs.

The Society is not meeting public demand for electronic services or addressing issues like the stabilization of electronic databases, which are at risk, and the need to archive electronic government records, which is mandated by state law.

Society and state resources would be better utilized if a technology coordinator was hired to identify, address, and resolve technology-related challenges.

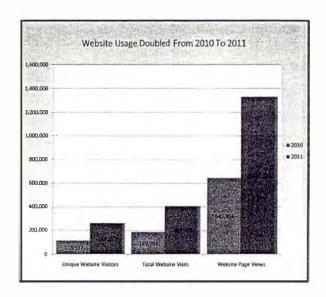
Who Benefits:

An improved website will allow **teachers** to more quickly identify and accumulate material for their classes; **researchers** will be able to conduct quicker, more thorough research.

State agencies will be assured their significant records are secure and will benefit from increased accessibility.

Potential **visitors** to museums and historic sites will be able to research their visits in advance.

Local historical groups will also receive technological support and experience increased visitation through the Hub of History.



- Create a technology plan and review committee to enhance new media effectiveness and oversee the implementation to include online, mobile, and on-site technologies.
- Coordinate with the State's IT Division to address future agency needs and oversee implementation of backend technology development, data management systems, and digital initiatives.
- Maximize social media efforts to increase online presence, for the purpose of sharing collections and historical content online.
- Supervise multimedia staff and oversee technical aspects of the Hub of History, Great Plains Theater, and other public components.

Multimedia/Web Developer (Three Positions)

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$71,999 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

The Society is limited in its ability to meet current public demands and expectations created with the expansion of the Heritage Center.

Without additional staff the technical skills required to meet and maintain the needs of the society and public demands are simply too large to handle. With current agency staff we can provide only very limited online and on-site access to our collections through technology, and have a great need to expand access via mobile technology.



Integration of online resources is a high priority to create increased access collections collections for the general public and education professionals while creating a cohesive and secure platform.

Who Benefits:

Educators will have increased access to exhibits and primary source materials.

Researchers and genealogists will be able to find additional materials not currently available online.

The general public will benefit from increased awareness of exhibits, increased access to collections, and increased educational opportunities.

- Development and maintenance of SHSND's online presence, including website and social media, as well as participating in development of backend technologies, data management systems, and new media initiatives.
- Develop and maintain new media and video productions for the Hub of History, Great Plains Theater, and exhibit interactives/ media.
- Integrate the technology plan into new media initiatives to increase access to collections and programming content.
- Create and integrate graphic designs, video production scripts, and storyboards for use in presentations, web sites, brochures, publications, and other projects, including at the statewide network of historic sites.

Museum Exhibit and Collections Specialist (Three Positions)

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

Exhibit and collections specialists will prepare and install objects in the exhibits and maintain exhibit components and systems. They will document and care for objects on exhibit or in storage in the Heritage Center or at historic sites. Their work is essential to preserving and presenting the artifacts that illustrate the stories of the people of North Dakota.

Most people will come to the expanded Heritage Center to see the objects that are on display in the exhibits. Others will come because they want to donate an object or want advice on how to care for something that has been passed down through their family.

In all of these instances, staff with the knowledge of how to care for the collections and exhibit them properly will play an important role.



Who Benefits:

Students and the general public will learn about the state's history through exhibits, or receive answers to questions about their family heirlooms when coming to the Heritage Center.

The **state's citizens** will have their history told and preserved through the artifacts and exhibits in the Heritage Center and State Historic Sites.

Visitors to the North Dakota Heritage Center will be able to learn more about individual pieces in the Heritage Center's collections.

County and local museums, as well as other state agencies will have improved access to information and technical assistance on the best ways to exhibit and care for collections they hold.

- Document, monitor, and care for objects on exhibit or in storage at the Heritage Center and at historic sites throughout the state.
- Locate, retrieve, and prepare objects to go on exhibit in the Heritage Center, at historic sites throughout the state, or loaned to county and local museums.
- Construct and maintiane exhibit components and exhibit lighting systems.
- Provide behind-the-scenes access to anyone who has questions about objects that are on exhibit or in storage.
- Consult with private individuals who are interested in donating objects to the State Historical Society.
- Advise individuals, local museums, and other organizations interested in how to best care for and exhibit their own collections.

Visitor Services and Security Officer (Three Positions)

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$62,559 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

The Heritage Center will see a significant increase in visitation and number of public and educational programs. A quality visitor experience includes meeting expectations with good customer service, personal interaction in the exhibits with informed and enthusiastic guides. Three additional staff are needed to interact and provide assistance to the public, oversee special events, assist with programming and tours, supervise volunteers, and in a more invisible way also enforce occupancy and fire codes, assist with emergencies, and provide additional floor security.



Who Benefits:

Tourists who visit North Dakota and leave with a new appreciation and respect for our state.

Adult North Dakotans and taxpayers who, through a safe, memorable and enjoyable experience, leave with a high level of satisfaction and a new appreciation for our state's history.

North Dakota children who experience those WOW! moments and leave with a new enthusiasm and excitement about their state and role they can play in its future.

- Patrol 75,000 square feet of public spaces, seven days a week, to provide quality learning opportunities and experiences.
- Focus the operations and activities around individual visitor needs; have the ability to manage challenging situations.
- Handle large groups of people during special events and emergencies to ensure public safety.
- Assist Information Desk, Museum Store, volunteer and agency staff with way finding, medical emergencies, tourist information and visitor needs as required.
- Ensure that exhibits are secure for collections and visitor safety.

Public Control Room Security Officer (Two Positions)

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$51,939 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

Security is present at the Heritage Center 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Security staff also monitor cameras at the historic sites across the state. When the Heritage Center expansion is completed, the number of statewide surveillance cameras will have increased by 614% since the 1981 opening. Security staffing levels, however, have remained unchanged for more than thirty years.



Two additional officers are required to staff the new, second public security control room that will monitor the public areas. This location provides for immediate response to emergency and public safety situations.

Who Benefits:

Visitors – families, school groups, and tourists to the Heritage Center will be in a safe and secure environment.

Historians and **scientists** have access to state and federal collections and records for research.

State agencies have their records accessible in a safe and secure building.

Collection donors know that their family heirlooms are protected from loss.

- Monitor 75 surveillance cameras covering entrances/exits, exhibit galleries, and public and educational program spaces for visitor safety.
- As front-line staff, be informed and knowledgeable to meet customer needs and expectations.
- Monitor and assist with crowd control, enforcing occupancy and fire codes, and emergency medical situations.
- Monitor areas where vandalism or theft is a primary concern, such as the exhibit galleries, Museum Store, and James River Café.
- Monitor central communications networks as the hub for internal and external response procedures.

Electronic Records Archivist

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$80,259 (general funds)

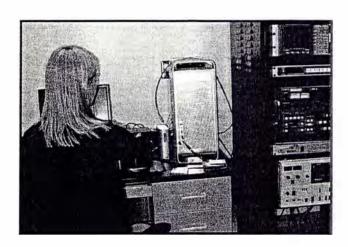
Why This Position Is Needed:

While the number of records that are "born digital" grows every year, the State Archives has no means of accepting and safely storing such records. An electronic records archivist is needed to develop the means of preserving digital records so that they are readable decades from now. Archives must provide long-term preservation and access, in formats compatible with ITD requirements, for government records.

The State Archives is legally required to preserve state and local government



One example of the need for preservation of digital records arose from the historic statewide flooding experienced in North Dakota this year. Enormous amounts of digital records, including aerial photographs of the flooding, have been created by a number of state agencies and need to be preserved. These agencies rely on the Archives to provide long-term storage of, and access to, this historic information.



Who Benefits:

The state and local government agencies, researchers, and others who need to capture, preserve, and access historic records created in impermanent formats will be able to do so.

The privacy of **individuals** will be better protected.

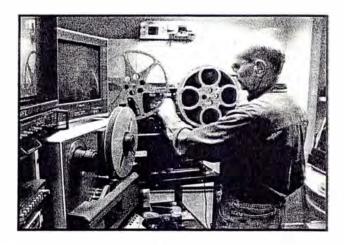
- Oversee transfer, maintenance, and migration of electronic records from government offices using established best practices to be sure records are accessible into the future.
- Determine the best cross-agency solutions for storing and maintaining electronic records, and identify methods of funding them.
- Ensure public records laws are followed, confidential records protected, and unnecessary records destroyed.
- Identify and implement cost-effective tools and formats useful in preservation and access.

Archives Specialist (Two Positions)

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

State Archives collections include manuscripts, state and local government records, maps, audio tapes, film and video, books and periodicals, and newspapers. The staff can manage incoming collections, but is unable to make much headway on thousands of feet of material that has been collected since 1905 and never inventoried. The public expectation to find information online continues to increase, but without additional staff the ability to make that information available is extremely limited.



Much of the 3.5 million feet of audio tape and film and video collection documenting state history is at a high risk of loss as these formats are rapidly deteriorating. Some breakage of North Dakota Bicentennial oral history interviews on reel-to-reel and cassette and Legislative Committee hearings has resulted in losing portions of recordings. Video news footage from five North Dakota television stations going back to 1952 is at the highest risk of loss.

We have the equipment to digitize film, video and audio but no staff is dedicated to the AV collection. An archivist dedicated to this work is necessary to assure long-term preservation and access of the collections and to fulfill exhibit design needs.

Who Benefits:

Visitors to the Heritage Center will have an enhanced experience in the galleries.

Teachers will have more engaging material for **students**, who will learn more about their state.

State agencies and local historical groups will be able to access audio and video material about their activities or localities.

State citizens will be able to find video images of their families and communities online as well as by visiting the Heritage Center.

- Assess audio and film/video collections: prioritize what needs to be digitized, protect original materials, create preservation masters, and provide reference copies of materials at risk of loss through deterioration.
- Arrange and describe backlog of manuscripts, state and local government records, and moving image and sound recording holdings for cataloging and access by the public.
- Select and prepare historically significant clips for exhibits in museum galleries.
 Digitize photographs and documents for online access.
- Improve public access outreach and educational activities.

Archaeology Collections Specialist

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

This position will assist the archaeological collections manager with the proper documentation and preservation of the collections, ensure that the agency's curatorial practices are in accordance with professional museum standards, and maximize the research and educational potential of the collections.

The Society curates some 13 million archaeological artifacts, as well as records, from approximately 950 prehistoric and historic archaeological sites in North Dakota. These objects and records represent 12,000 years of history and culture. The collections continue to expand as a result of legal requirements that sites be documented before they are disturbed by development.

These collections are used for exhibits, education programs, academic research, publications, and illustrations for various venues including the web and other multimedia forums. The vast majority have not been accessioned due to a lack of staff.



Who Benefits:

Visitors to the Heritage Center will have greater access to the collection.

Local, national, and international scholars will be able to capture its immense research potential through scientific analysis and publication, benefiting teachers, students, and the scientific community

Our enhanced ability to meet high curatorial standards will benefit **North Dakota** citizens and the American public at large, by ensuring that the state's archaeological heritage is preserved for future generations.

- Catalog archaeological artifacts and archive associated documents.
- Develop, update, and maintain a master collections catalog database.
- Clean, label, and prepare archaeological artifacts for storage.
- Re-house older collections in archivally stable materials.
- Digitize archaeological objects and associated documents to minimize handling fragile items.
- Assist archaeological collections manager with the development of online content and outreach projects.
- Perform database queries for agency inventories and federal and state audits.

Education Programs Developer

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

An education programs developer is needed to create the public activities that explain how or why objects on display were made, as well as the stories of the people who used them. This will include the learning labs in the new galleries, where visitors, in person or online, can research or experiment with exhibit materials or themes.

The program developer will also provide materials to meet the North Dakota Studies requirements for primary and secondary schools.

The Hub of History near the entrance to the Heritage Center will connect statewide historical groups and organizations and encourage visitors to also explore these other sites. Technical support in programming will also be provided to these groups.



Visitors to the North Dakota Heritage Center, historic sites, and the website will gain a better understanding of where we came from, how we got here, and what ideas, influences, and challenges have made us who we are today.

Teachers will have available effective and engaging educational material about North Dakota and **students** will learn more about their state.

Local historical groups and organizations will improve their ability to tell their own local history and experience increased visitation.



- Create educational and interpretive programs for the expansion's galleries and the rotating Governors Gallery; establish a docent program; and create podcasts that visitors can select depending upon their individual interests.
- Coordinate National History Day in North Dakota; an annual event (grades 6-12).
- Develop and deliver distance learning programs to student audiences, providing experts in classrooms that would otherwise not be able to access such information.
- Deliver workshops, provide training, advice, and support for local and county historic groups.
- Develop Hub of History programming to encourage statewide visitation of historic sites.

Graphic Artist

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$55,479 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

An additional graphic artist is required to support the exhibits and related printed materials, as well as other publications such as brochures and educational resources. Visually stimulating material can trigger an interest in learning.

Today's patrons of the North Dakota Heritage Center and state historic sites have come to expect quality exhibits and printed materials when they visit. The days of typing out exhibit labels on a typewriter and pasting a few things on a panel and calling it an exhibit are long gone. The general public also expects traveling exhibits and publications that have visual appeal and a professional look.

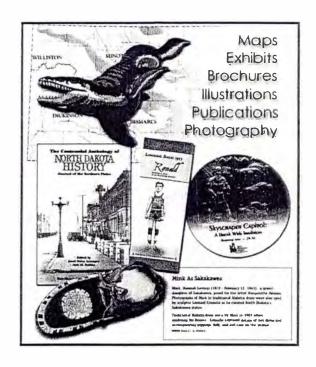
This expectation will only increase when the expansion of the North Dakota Heritage Center is complete.

Who Benefits:

Visitors to the North Dakota Heritage Center will gain a clearer understanding of where we came from, how we got here, and what ideas, influences, and challenges have made us who we are today.

Teachers will have available effective and engaging educational materials about North Dakota and students will learn more about their state.

Local historical groups and organizations will improve their ability to tell their own local history and experience increased visitation.



- Produce custom-made maps, drawings, exhibit panels, and other printed exhibit graphics for long-term and temporary exhibits at the North Dakota Heritage Center and state historic sites.
- Provide custom-made graphics for traveling exhibits that go out to county and local historical societies, libraries, and other institutions.
- Develop and update printed materials such as the flyers for educational programs, brochures, and activity sheets used in the exhibit galleries.
- Produce publication designs that reflect the State Historical Society of North Dakota in a professional and visually appealing manner.

Marketing Specialist

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)



Why This Position Is Needed:

Marketing is an essential tool for the State Historical Society's mission. A beautiful new museum with state-of-the-art exhibits and educational activities will have fewer visitors if the public is unaware of what is available. The educational materials that can enrich classrooms will remain on the shelf unless teachers know about them. Word-of-mouth is no longer enough to break through the communications clutter.

Who Benefits:

Visitors from out of state will become aware of the opportunities offered at the State Museum and state historic sites.

North Dakotans will be encouraged to return to the Heritage Center and other sites for additional visits.

Teachers will be aware of the availability of educational material about North Dakota, and students will learn more about their state.

Heritage tourism partners, including local historic organizations, businesses, museums, and others will benefit for increased public awareness.

- Market the expanded North Dakota
 Heritage Center and the State Historical
 Society's activities to the public in North
 Dakota and to visitors from out of state
 through such means as electronic and
 print advertising, internet resources,
 and media relations. It is particularly
 important to market the rotating exhibits
 in the Governors Gallery to increase
 return visits.
- Market the museum stores. Income from the stores supports agency publications and statewide education programming. The stores also support North Dakota artisans.
- Reach teachers to make them aware of the North Dakota Studies resources that are available through the Society.
- Promote visitation at local historical organizations across the state.
- Promote customer service and improve feedback to the SHSND about the value and quality of its programs and services. This includes using customer research data to better assess what the public is interested in, measuring the effectiveness of Society programs, and assessing economic impacts.

Conservator

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

The State Historical Society has several curators, who have very basic training in preserving historical objects, but no one with the specialized and scientific skills of a conservator. Therefore, any conservation or restoration work that needs to be done on the collections at the Heritage Center has to be sent to the Midwest Art Conservation Center in Minneapolis. We have used conservators frequently, including to clean Mink's (the model for the Sakakawea statue) dress, clean and preserve paintings, Audubon prints, and clothing, including historic wedding dresses.



Society staff are frequently asked by smaller

museums and the general public for suggestions or assistance in the repair and treatment of objects that go beyond their training as curators. A good example of when a trained conservator would be useful is after the recent flood in Minot that caused severe damage to the collections of the Ward County Historical Society. A conservator could provide immediate assistance.

Who Benefits:

The collectors among the **general public** would benefit by having a trained conservator who could offer recommendations and care for objects and materials they hold.

County and local museums and state agencies would have access to a trained conservator that could offer technical assistance for care and treatment of priceless objects in their collections. In the case of disasters such as floods or fire, the conservator could assess the damage done to collections at the affected museum and help to prioritize the recovery process.

- Recommend ways to care for museum objects. If more intense treatment is required, a conservator can perform repairs or stabilize an object to prevent further deterioration and improve aesthetics.
- Clean and preserve items made of paper, wood, textiles, leather, or other materials.
- Repair surfaces, reassemble objects with broken parts, and construct copies if necessary.
- Use chemistry, physics, biology, etc. to do treatments correctly and keep other staff up-to-date and meeting current standards.
- Determine the correct climate-control measures that are suitable for a given object's preservation.

Compliance Officer

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

The creation of one position with responsibility for handling the compliance process agencywide would help the agency to address audit findings, save time, and improve results.

State laws and regulations regarding procurement, risk management, and hiring/ employee management continue to increase in number and complexity. The agency has grown larger, with more sites and staff across the state. Furthermore, the North Dakota Heritage Center



expansion will substantially increase the effort required in these areas.

At present, a number of different staff across the agency do their best to deal with these issues as they arise.

Who Benefits:

The greater efficiency of one person managing compliance processes will be beneficial to the **State of North Dakota**, improving compliance results and decreasing the total amount of time spent on these efforts.

The **public** will also benefit because other staff will be able to concentrate on their primary professional responsibilities.

- Review requests for proposals and standards for evaluating proposals; provide technical assistance for other procurement issues.
- Review contract language prior to bid awards to ensure risk management issues have been addressed; provide technical assistance in other contract management issues.
- Work with state auditors to address audit findings and to assure practices of the Society are in compliance with state rules and procedures.
- Implement and maintain a centralized hiring process and procedures for the agency, in compliance with state law and regulations.
- Provide training to department personnel to ensure compliance with state law concerning bids, contracts, purchasing, hiring procedures, and other appropriate agency-wide requirements; maintain and update agency policy manual.
- Implement and manage annual agency training program to include: discrimination, sexual harassment, drug-free workplace, workplace violence, and equal employment opportunities and diversity.

Former Governors' Mansion and Camp Hancock Site Supervisor

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

A full-time, permanent site supervisor at the Former Governors' Mansion and Camp Hancock would provide the public with increased year-round access, develop additional programming, enhance online and onsite exhibits, and improve preservation of the resources.

Two elements are key to the visitor's enjoyment of a state historic site: the realization that the visitor is encountering an authentic place of history and a site supervisor who can help the visitor make the connections between the place and its history. The supervisor can also provide the daily attention that will help preserve the site for future generations.



These are two of the major sites maintained by the State Historical Society of North Dakota. They are currently managed by a part-time, temporary site supervisor with reduced hours between November and March of each year.

Who Benefits:

Visitors to these sites are the beneficiaries. Closer attention to education and preservation benefits all of us.

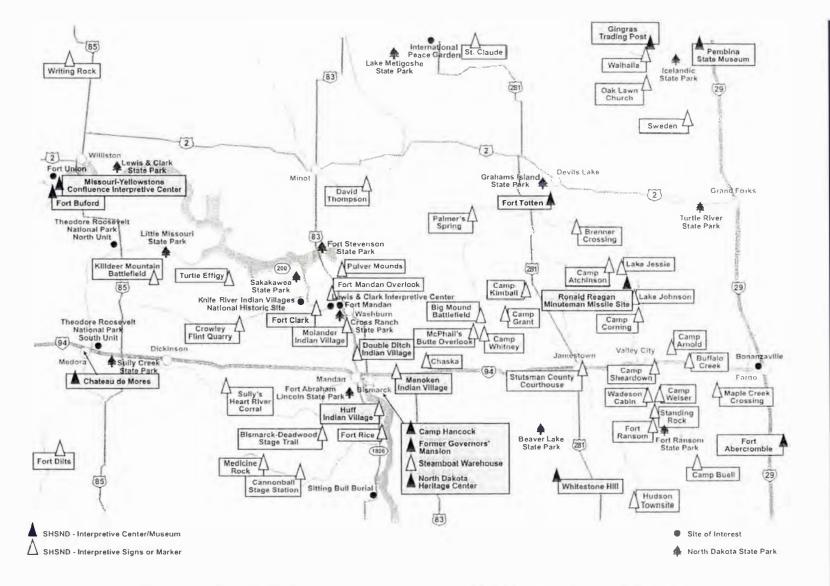
Whether our visitors are tourists, local residents, students, or teachers, the sites provide venues for a variety of experiences, including meetings and gatherings as well as special programs and memory-making events.

- Develop and implement programming and interpretive information.
- Arrange for booked meetings, weddings, or events, and provide staffing for them.
- Actively engage in public relations marketingnetworks.
- Provide tours to visitors.
- Recruit and train temporary staff, interns, and volunteers to provide professional site care, interpretation, and customer service.
- Manage the sites' budgets.
- Provide for the care and maintenance of furnishings and other artifacts, the historic structures, and the sites' grounds.

State Historical Society of North Dakota Background Information

The State Historical Society of North Dakota (SHSND) was founded in 1895. It oversees the North Dakota Heritage Center, the Pembina State Museum, and 55 historic sites located throughout the state. The Society consists of five divisions, which provide a wide variety of unique services. The divisions are as follows:

- 1. Support Services Division supports and coordinates all functions of the agency through budgeting, accounting, purchasing, human resource management, inventory control, concession sales, communications services, building and site security, and general supervision.
- 2. Archeology & Historic Preservation Division evaluates architectural and archaeological properties, assists historic property owners, provides information about historic preservation and restoration, nominates properties to the National Register of Historic Places and State Historic Sites Registry, administers the Preservation Tax Credit Program, reviews the impact of federally-related projects on historic properties, and manages the archaeological collections from approximately 950 prehistoric and historic sites in North Dakota. This division also provides for the management, maintenance, repair, and operation of all Historical Society land and buildings other than the North Dakota Heritage Center.
- 3. Museum Division presents the history of North Dakota through exhibits in the North Dakota Heritage Center, at the Pembina State Museum, and at several state historic sites. In addition, it produces traveling exhibits that are shown at libraries, county and local historical societies, and other venues throughout North Dakota. The Museum Division is also responsible for preserving more than 63,000 artifacts in the history, ethnology, and natural history collections. Museum Division staff provide graphic design for the agency and technical assistance on collection care and exhibit design to the people of North Dakota and to other museums in the state.
- 4. Communication and Education Division is responsible for the agency's communications, media relations, and marketing program, produces agency publications, including newsletters, a history journal, and occasional books. It offers a wide variety of educational and interpretive programs for the Heritage Center and other sites and acts as the state provider of classroom materials and curriculum, meeting the North Dakota studies requirements for fourth graders, eighth graders, and high school students. It provides outreach services statewide through educational services and technical assistance and manages the agency volunteer program.
- 5. State Archives Division preserves records of North Dakota government and makes them accessible to the public. It also makes available the collections of books, microfilm, newspapers, maps, photographs, manuscripts, and other two-dimensional historical materials to both staff and public through reference services and programs of preservation.

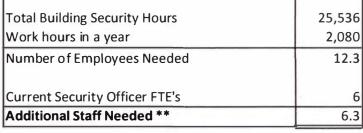


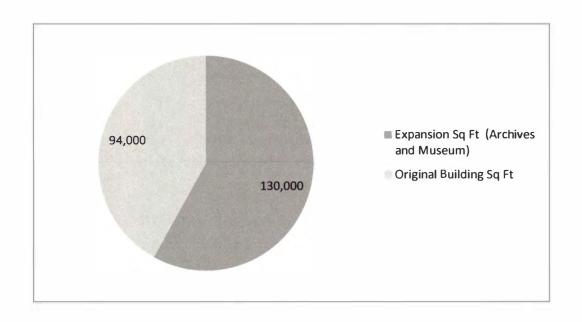

On behalf of the North Dakota Association of Rural Electric Cooperatives, I'm submitting this testimony in support of increased funding for the State Historical Society of North Dakota as it prepares for the opening of the new Heritage Center in the next biennium. It would be the position of NDAREC that the funding contained in HB 1018 is not sufficient to do justice to the impressive expansion project that will soon be our state's new Heritage Center.

NDAREC, along with Touchstone Energy Cooperative partners Basin Electric Power Cooperative, Great River Energy and Minnkota Power Cooperative, made an early decision and commitment to support the expansion of the Heritage Center with a combined gift of about \$1.5 million. Recently, several Touchstone Energy Cooperative partners had the chance to tour the Heritage Center expansion. From this visit, it's clear that this project is shaping up to be a first class, world class, showcase of our state's history and heritage.

In reviewing the additional needs request prepared by the State Historical Society and presented to this committee, we would concur that a project of this magnitude will need to be fully staffed with professionals who are able to design, develop, market and maintain the Center's exhibits in a way that exceeds the public's expectations. This expansion has every chance of making our Heritage Center into what some have called a "Smithsonian on the prairie" in its portrayal of our rich history and heritage. It would be unfortunate if we left the 63rd legislative assembly without fully funding the need request of the Historical Society to employ a staff of professionals who'll be the caretakers of this impressive new Heritage Center.

When we made our commitment to the Heritage Center expansion, we did so with the expectation that it would properly portray the contribution we have made to the state's economic vitality along with the contributions of so many others. As we head into the final years of making this project a reality, we strongly encourage our legislative partners to fully fund and support the needs request of the State Historical Society to make our new Heritage Center a first class portrayal of who we are as a state and its people.

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, my name is Mike Eggl, Sr. Vice President of Communications and Administration at Basin Electric Power Cooperative. I am here to testify in support of House Bill 1018, a bill to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the State Historical Society.

In 2009 when Basin Electric committed support and resources to the preservation of North Dakota history through monetary and in-kind contributions to assist in the North Dakota Heritage Center expansion project, we had a vision for the Center to become a national and international destination and events center. A place where visitors to the Center could experience and explore the entire history and heritage of North Dakota, including geology, paleontology, natural history, archaeology and the history of all the state's people.

At that time, only a portion of North Dakota's heritage and history were on display for the public, even though the expansion of the Heritage Center had been proposed for more than 25 years. Now that the Heritage Center will have the space for 70 more years of our state history and new exhibit spaces will be in place to tell the story of North Dakota's emerging industries - coal, gas, wind power, agriculture processing, manufacturing and technology - the Society will need new history professionals to tell the story. The last of seven recommendations issued by the 18-member State Historical Society of North Dakota Commission in 2003 was to put in place additional history professionals. The other recommendations have been funded and are about to be fulfilled and this final recommendation will bring to fruition the vision those leaders had for the Center and the State Historical Society.

The result of the Heritage Center's expansion and its growing requests for services to museum visitors, schools, historic sites and communities is that the Historical Society will need more history professionals. If our goal is to showcase the accomplishments and endeavors of North Dakotans, we should invest in historians to bring these accomplishments to visitors at the newly expanded Center. These individuals will provide the living link between our historical treasures housed in the Society's collections and the public owners of those treasures.

It has been said that "all good things come to those who wait;" now is the time to fulfill the expectations and needs of those who have been patiently awaiting the finalization of this wonderful expansion by providing the means to add new history professionals to the staff of the State Historical Society.

Chairman Skarphol and members of the Committee, my name is Scott J. Davis; I am member of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe and a descendent of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa. I serve the great state of North Dakota as the Executive Director of the North Dakota Indian Affairs Commission, appointed by our Governor. I joined the Commission in May of 2009.

The purpose of this testimony is to extend support from the North Dakota Indian Affairs Commission for the North Dakota Heritage Center expansion project --- along with its needs. This is a very important project for both our Great State, and also for our five Tribal Nations.

The vision of the Heritage Center "to showcase the world-class accomplishments of North Dakotans," Is something (I believe) we as leaders should all support. Recognizing and honoring the contributions of our fellow North Dakota citizens is a fundamental component to embracing the rich history of our State. What better way to accomplish this, but with a world-class facility.

This expansion project will greatly benefit not only our state, but also our tribal nations. Tourism is the third largest industry in North Dakota bringing in \$ 4.6 billion a year (2010). This influx of revenue greatly affects our tribal nations as well. Take for instance, the United Tribes International Pow Wow, in this once-a-year, four-day September event alone, brings in \$4.6 million to our Bismarck community, with most of this revenue coming from external sources. With such an influx of tourism revenue and activity, I believe it's only sensible to meet the public's expectations --- both of our citizens and those visiting North Dakota.

This Heritage Center has always played an important role in educating the public about our tribal history's and culture. With this new expansion it will also embody another important role as well --- The Native American Hall of Honor. This is one of the most groundbreaking and innovative events that has ever happened between the State and our Tribal Nations. This is an extremely important opportunity in recognizing and honoring those North Dakota Tribal Members who have contributed with great sacrifice to the benefit our North Dakota Community. So, this expansion and its success mean a great deal to our Tribal Nations.

In closing: when I think of North Dakota --- being a proud citizen of this great state, the first word that comes to mind is excellence. This new Heritage Center also embodies this word. I hope that this committee supports whatever the needs of this expansion are, (whether that be funding for staff or for marketing purposes), to ensure that the quality of the North Dakota experience meets all expectations.

Greetings, Representative Brandenburg. I write in regard to a matter important to economic development in the south-central part of the state. The following resolution was adopted at a meeting of the Tri-County (Emmons, Logan, & McIntosh counties) Tourism Alliance.

The Lawrence Welk Homestead has recently been placed for public sale. The Tri-County Tourism Alliance of Logan, McIntosh and Emmons counties voted on January 18 in support of state purchase of this property located at 845 88th St. SE, Strasburg, ND and inclusion of its annual operating expense in the State Historical Society budget.

The property referred to is the one commonly known as the Welk Homestead, birthplace of the great entertainer and North Dakota Roughrider, Lawrence Welk. I understand that funding for its purchase has been proposed as an amendment to the budget of the State Historical Society of North Dakota.

I meet frequently with the alliance in its efforts to establish and promote German-Russian Country as a heritage tourism destination. The Welk Homestead is vital to these efforts. It is significant, and of value to heritage tourism, for reasons that go far beyond its specific association with Lawrence Welk. It is a property that represents and documents the settlement culture of the Germans from Russia, the largest ethnic culture in North Dakota, comprising an excellent collection of heritage buildings in a compelling site.

The map reveals that there is <u>not one state historic site in all of Emmons, Logan, and McIntosh counties</u>. It does not seem out of line to ask that with a roster of 56 state historic sites, we might consider one in German-Russian Country.

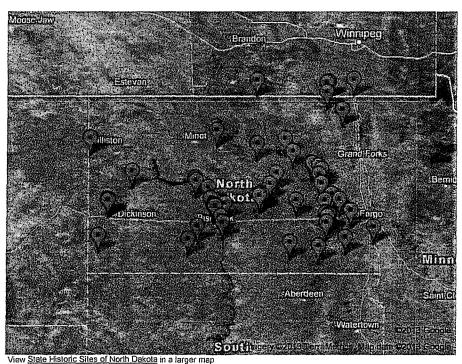

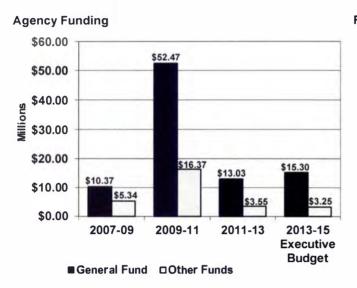

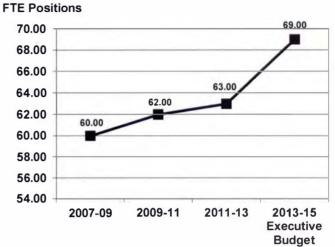

Testimony by Merlan E. Paaverud Jr., Director State Historical Society of North Dakota

Mr. Chairman and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee, my name is Merl Paaverud and I am the Director of the State Historical Society of North Dakota. I am here today to provide an overview of the Society's 2011-13 accomplishments and introduce testimony related to House Bill 1018.

2011-13 Statistics

State Historic Sites Visitors to date -134,667.

- Total archeological artifacts in collections: 14 million from 2,195 sites representing 12,000 years of prehistory.
- Number of SHPO reviews: 6,144
- Number of new sites input into the GIS: 2,194.
- 1,453 cultural resource surveys digitized into the GIS system.
- Usage of site files and cultural resource reports by cultural resource specialists: Total amount of Historic Preservation for grants: \$354,000
- Total amount of cultural heritage grants made to total number of recipients: \$449,000 for 55 projects. In addition, \$30,000 was expended on 3 museum assessment grants and \$28,300 on training scholarships.
- Provided 11,125 responses to the State Archives inquiries for information.
 Digitized 204 photographs and other materials related to the North Dakota History 8th Grade Curriculum.
- Averaged 20,427 users who accessed the State Historical Society webpage per month.
- Provided 88 SEND (Suitcase Exhibits in North Dakota) schools, libraries and public venues.

2011-13 Accomplishments

- A new gun carriage was purchased for the 12 Pounder Gun, Model 1857 (Napoleon). The cannon will be included in the new exhibits in the ND Heritage Center.
- Installed the new orientation exhibit *Encountering Fort Totten at the Fort*Totten State Historic Site visitor center.
- Installed a new temporary exhibit entitled 'How does your Garden Grown' in the Pembina State Museum.
- Installed National Park Service traveling exhibit "Lincoln: The Constitution and the Civil War" and The Art of Einar Olstad in the Missouri Yellowstone Confluence Interpretive Center at Fort Buford State Historic Site.
- Installed "Beyond the Boundaries: The History of Fort Abercrombie" exhibit in the Fort Abercrombie Interpretive Center.
- Installed new exhibit panels and a new artifact case at Gingras Trading Post State Historic Site.
- The Society's Archaeology and Historic Preservation Division continued incorporating recorded archaeological, historical, and architectural sites in North Dakota into an access database and a multi-layered digital mapping format, the Geographic Information System (GIS).

Continuing Appropriations Narrative:

Concession Fund

This continuing appropriation authority has been provided for the operation of the Historical Society Museum Store operation at the North Dakota Heritage Center and State Historic Sites. The Heritage Center Museum Store is operated as an extension of the State Historical Society education program. The store provides a forum through which museum exhibits and other aspects of North Dakota's culture and history can be expanded on for the benefit of the general public.

Although a profit margin is associated with all museum store items and is established by the director, profits from sales are used to repurchase inventory and

conduct other special educational projects through the production of materials or publications for sale through the store. The emphasis of the store is not oriented toward large profits, but the profits many publications and reproductions of exhibit related items to be produced. All funds derived from the operation of the museum store are used for the purpose from which they were derived, namely the store operation and to supplement the publications activity of the State Historical Society. The museum store aims to select quality items that meet specific criteria. Quality of work, whether in publications or crafts, must be of professional quality. All items about North Dakota, its history and cultures of its people and its geography should be as accurate as possible. Emphasis is given to selling items produced in North Dakota though exceptions are made. All items should pertain to North Dakota and the surrounding area. Items sold in the museum store cannot be derogatory to race, creed, sex or religion. All items, which are reproductions of artifacts, will be labeled "reproduction" or "replica. The museum store will not sell any items made of or containing fossils.

The other aspect of the concession fund relates to fees that are collected for the use of the facilities of the agency, admissions fees and use charges for services provided. All these funds are used to offset the direct costs associated with providing these services and include supplies, materials, equipment and temporary staff for seasonal historic sites.

Gifts and Bequests

Historically, museum operations have depended on the generosity of supporters for their continued existence. The authority provided for the acceptance of gifts and bequest stems from this desired support. All funds are maintained in the state treasury. Most gifts are given for specific purposes either to support a specific exhibit, collections or programs and such gifts are restricted to the purpose for which they were given. Most gifts are small and come through the agency's donation boxes. There has never been a large enough donation to establish a trust that could produce significant income on a continuing basis.

Archeological Permits

An individual, organization, institution or company engaged on one's own behalf or on behalf of another to identify, evaluate, or mitigate adverse affects on cultural resources, historic buildings, structures, or objects on any lands in North Dakota must obtain an annual permit from the director of the State Historical Society. Such fees are deposited in the revolving fund and must be used by the director for making investigations of permit applicants and for management and analysis of records and artifacts submitted to the director under sections 55-03-01, 55-03-01.1 and 55-03-02.

Additional Budget Items

I ask that the Committee consider additional budget items that were not included in our Executive Budget and several that were taken out by amendment in the House. While the Executive Budget included 6 new FTE's we had asked for 22. Our top priority is for staff positions that are necessary to the operation of the expanded North Dakota Heritage Center. High priority capital improvement projects at Fort Totten and Stutsman County Courthouse State Historic were not included as well as funding for marketing and the content management system.

In addition, the House Amendments removed \$250,000 that would be used to fund traveling exhibits for the new Governor's Gallery. We are also concerned about the funds to address a housing issue that we have in the western part of the state. Our funding for celebration of the 125th Anniversary of North Dakota was also reduced from \$150,000 to \$100,000.

This concludes my introductory remarks. I would be happy to answer any questions you may have. I would now like to introduce Dave Skalsky, Assistant Director who will present additional information regarding the Society's 2011-13 budget and the 2013-15 budget request.



House Bill 1018 Senate Appropriations Committee (March 7, 2013)

Testimony by David Skalsky, Assistant Director State Historical Society of North Dakota

Chairman Holmberg and members of the committee, my name is David Skalsky and I am the Assistant Director of the State Historical Society of North Dakota. I am here today to present testimony regarding funds carried over to the 2011-13 biennium, provide an update on the 2011-13 biennium budget and to go over the 2013-15 optional adjustments and House amendments.

Capital Asset Funding Carried Over to the 2011-13 Biennium:

NDCC Chapter 54-44.1.11 states, in part, that "... the State Historical Society shall report on the amounts and uses of funds carried over from one biennium to the appropriations committee of the next subsequent legislative assembly."

- North Dakota Heritage Center Expansion \$34,373,466 in state funds was carried over for the completion of the North Dakota Heritage Center Expansion. The building and one exhibit gallery should be completed and opened to the public by September 2013 with the remaining exhibits being completed through November 2014.
- Site maintenance and security equipment \$78,454 was carried over to purchase grounds maintenance equipment and security equipment for the historic sites and heritage center. The remaining January 31, 2013 balance of \$18,634 will be spent on maintenance equipment for the historic sites.
- Building Maintenance and Repairs \$274,092 was carried over to complete repairs and maintenance on buildings located on our historic sites. The majority of this funding has been used to stabilize the floor and foundation on

the hospital building located at the Fort Totten State Historic Site. The January 31, 2013 balance of \$8,473 will be spent on additional site repairs.

- Compact Shelving \$345,386 was carried over to complete the installation of the compact shelving in the State Archives Addition. This project has been completed.
- Exhibits \$38,548 was used for installation and maintenance of exhibits located at the State Historic Sites.

State Historical Society's 2011-13 biennium budget update:

Salaries, wages, and operating expenses for the 2011-13 biennium are being expended as projected. The cultural heritage grant program has been very successful in helping local historical societies and other entities throughout the state to complete projects in their communities. One-time funding was also appropriated for several projects. The status of those items, as of January 31, 2013, is provided below.

One Time Funding 2011-13 Biennium

- Exhibits \$90,000 These funds are being used for new exhibits in the commissary building at the Fort Totten State Historic Site, for the restoration and preservation of the cannon at the Fort Rice State Historic Site, and for display panels at the Whitestone Hill State Historic Sites. Approximately \$8,600 has been spent to date. Additional work will be completed during the spring and summer of 2013.
- Fort Abercrombie Riverbank Stabilization \$350,000 These funds were used to match an additional \$650,000 in Federal funds needed for the stabilization of the riverbank at the Fort Abercrombie State Historic Site. This project has been substantially completed.

- Historic Site Repairs and Maintenance Projects \$125,000 These funds have been spent for various repair and maintenance projects at the historic sites.
- Database Migration \$30,900 Funding was provided to the Society to contract with ITD to migrate years of data from our access databases to MS SQL which is a more stable database. This project is currently in progress.
- Security Staff Funding \$59,800 Funding was provided for additional security coverage during the Heritage Center expansion.
- ITD Detailed Business Analysis \$10,000 The amount included in the executive budget for a detailed IT business analysis was \$145,410. This analysis would have helped the Society to determine how to more efficiently keep records and provide more and better public access to collections through technology. This amount was reduced to \$10,000. Since funding was not sufficient to do the analysis, this project has not moved forward.
- North Dakota eighth grade curriculum development \$125,000 This funding
 was provided for the development of a new eighth grade curriculum and
 should be spent by June 30, 2013. This project is moving forward and will
 continue into the 2013-15 biennium. Additional funding of \$150,000 was
 included in the executive budget for the 2013-15 biennium to complete this
 project.
- North Dakota's 125th Celebration of Statehood \$50,000 This funding is to be used for operating and other expenses related to the planning of North Dakota's 125th celebration of statehood. An additional \$50,000 for salaries was included in OMB's budget for a temporary staff person to oversee these activities. The planning process has begun as someone was recently hired by OMB and the Governor's office. As of January 31, 2013, the Society has not spent any of \$50,000.

2013-15 Optional Request Summary and House Amendments (Attachment 1)

Attachment 1 shows the optional adjustment amounts included in the executive budget as well as the amendments made by the House. We are asking the Senate to reconsider the House amendments and to consider provide additional funding for staff, marketing, a content management system, and for the two historic site building repair projects that are already in progress.

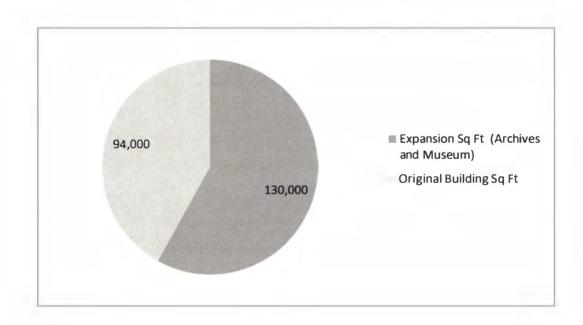

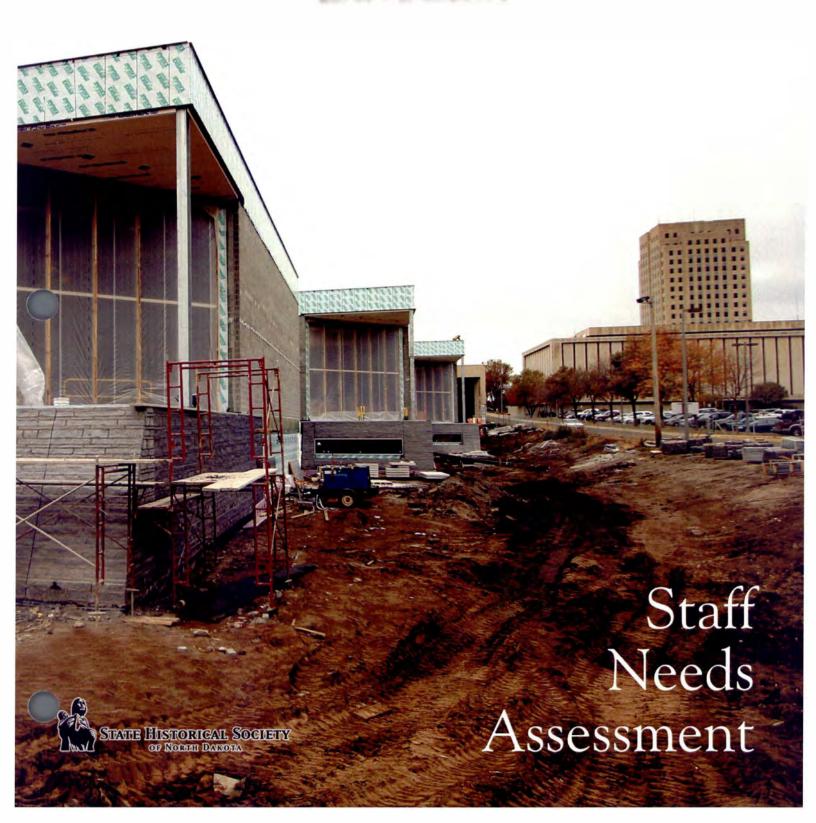

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To identify, preserve, interpret, and promote the heritage of North Dakota and its people.

Opportunities & Expectations

Introduction

The building expansion to the North Dakota Heritage Center is projected to be completed in the spring of 2013, with the exhibits finished by the fall of 2014. While the building will be beautiful, the quality of visitors' experiences will be dictated by the level of services provided by the State Historical Society staff. In order for the Heritage Center Expansion project to be successful, services provided in the new facility must meet or exceed public expectations.

North Dakota has a marvelous opportunity to make the North Dakota Heritage Center a national and international destination and events center. It is important that we understand what the public demands of this project and avoid the disappointment that resulted when the original Heritage Center building was opened in 1981 without the completed exhibits and programming that the public believed would be there.

This document is therefore designed to identify public expectations and determine the levels of staffing it will take to meet them.

Expectations

Visitors to the North Dakota Heritage Center expect to experience and explore the entire history and heritage of North Dakota, including the geology, paleontology, natural history, archaeology, and the history of all the state's people. The Heritage Center is unique among the museums of this region in the broad range of disciplines and subject areas covered in one institution.

Visitors expect the Heritage Center to house high-quality exhibits. They expect the center to present and deliver public and educational programs related to the new and expanded exhibits. The public assumes that technology will be integrated into the exhibits and programs, delivering new educational programs to audiences across the state.

Public expectations can be categorized as follows:

- **Grand Opening** The public will expect to see a finished, fully-staffed facility. To avoid public disappointment, sufficient, well-trained staff need to be in place and ready to go when the facility opens.
- **Technology** People have incorporated technologies such as computers, telecommunications, and multimedia into their daily lives. The public expects such technology to be incorporated into the expansion, where it will improve the visitor experience and increase access to the collections and further information.

- **Exhibits** Although new exhibits will be installed when the building is completed, the public will look for new features on return visits. The Governors Gallery (a rotating gallery) and other exhibits need to be changed and updated constantly.
- **Event Center** The public, businesses, state agencies, and others will want to host programs, conferences, receptions, weddings, and other events at this new state-of-the-art facility. This facility will be a regional events center.
- Education and Interpretation The public expects educational and interpretive programming that tells the stories behind the objects, allowing visitors to dig deeper into the who, why, and how of the artifacts they view. The State Historical Society is also responsible for providing North Dakota Studies curriculum to the state's students.
- Access to Collections The public has expressed a desire for more access to collections, both physically in the museum and through remote use of technology. They also expect people to be available to answer questions and provide information.
- **Protection of the State's Collections** The public expects the state's collections (including artifacts on exhibit) and museum visitors to remain safe and secure despite the increase in the building's size and in visitation.
- The Hub of History/Support for State-Wide Organizations Communities, organizations, and institutions across the state expect the Hub of History to direct visitors to history and tourism sites across the state. Local historical groups and organizations also anticipate that the Society will provide technical support for their activities.

Staff Recommendations

The quality of the visitor experience will be dictated by the level of services provided by the staff. In order for the Heritage Center expansion project to be truly successful, services provided in this new facility must meet or exceed public expectations. Additional staff needs, and a brief explanation of those needs, are as follows:

- One Technology Coordinator and Three Multimedia/Web Developers
 Enhance the visitor experience and provide access to collections through the Hub of History,
 Great Plains Theater, exhibit interactives, website, online access and museum stores, social media networks, interpretive and educational programs, and mobile media outreach.
- Three Museum Exhibit and Collections Specialists and one Conservator
 Preserve the collections of the state of North Dakota; create and maintain exhibits; provide materials and information for educational and interpretative programs, media, and publications; and provide professional advice on conservation repair and treatment to museums throughout the state and the general public.
- Three Visitor Services and Security Officers and Two Control Room Security Officers Meet expectations and mandates for the protection of state and federal archives and collections and assure the security of visitors. Visitor service security officers will also provide personal response to public questions and concerns.
- One Electronic Records Archivist and two Archives Specialists
 Preserve vital government electronic and paper records and make them available to the public, as legally mandated. Provide collections and content for exhibits, educational and interpretative programs, researchers, media, and publications. Provide professional assistance on preserving collections to visitors, local and county museums, and state and federal agencies.
- One Archaeology Collections Specialist

Provide documentation and preservation of archaeology collections and maximize the research and educational potential of the collections. Develop, update, and maintain a master collections catalog database. Assist archaeological collections manager with online content and outreach projects.

Education Programs Developer

Develop educational and public programming in conjunction with the exhibits, Great Plains Theater, auditorium, and gallery interactives, as well as provide educational programming to student audiences statewide through distance learning programs.

Graphic Artist

Produce custom-made maps, graphics, drawings, exhibit panels, brochures, program flyers, and gallery activity sheets for the Heritage Center, historic sites, and for the Traveling Interpretive Exhibit Service (TIES) Program, which provides traveling exhibits to county and local historical societies, libraries, and other institutions.

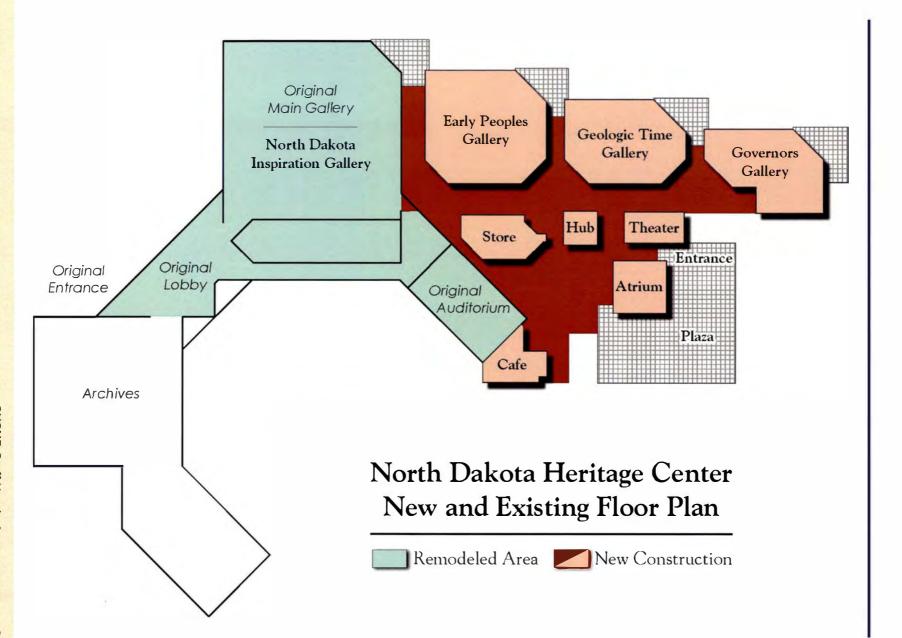
Marketing Specialist

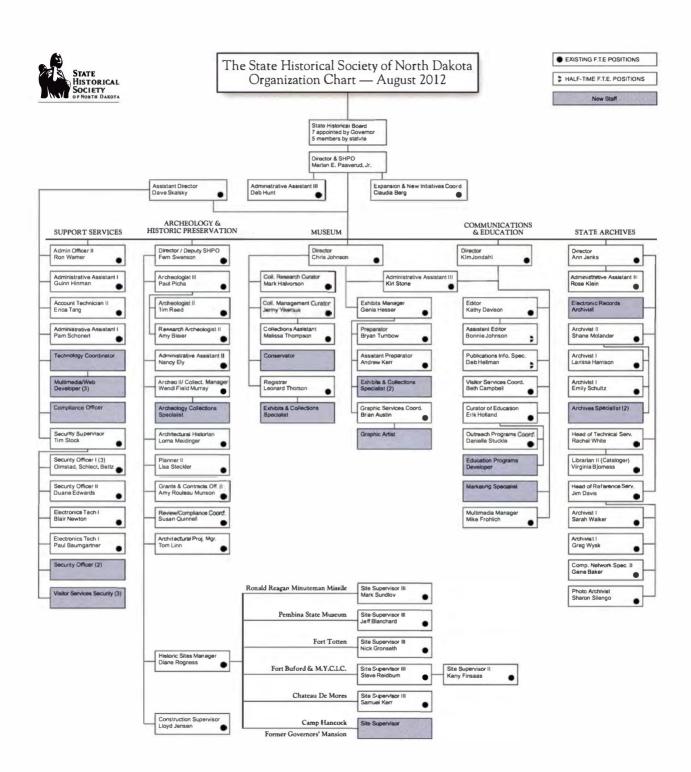
Market and promote the SHSND and its resources, including historic sites, the expanded North Dakota Heritage Center and its expanded exhibits and public programs, as well as related agency activities, events, and products. Efforts would also include further marketing partnerships with the North Dakota Tourism Division, the North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department, and other agencies and organizations.

Compliance Officer

Ensure compliance with state and federal laws concerning bids, contracts, purchasing, hiring procedures, audit recommendations, and requirements.

• Site Supervisor – Former Governors' Mansion and Camp Hancock
Develop public programming and interpretive information, provide tours, conduct special events, and maintain the grounds and buildings at these two state historic sites.

Technology Coordinator

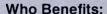
Projected Salary and Benefits: \$96,779 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

The State Historical Society lacks the staff knowledge and resources to address its technology needs and data challenges. The technology coordinator will work closely with ITD to determine the Society's current and future business needs and implement and maintain the technology systems needed to meet those needs.

The Society is not meeting public demand for electronic services or addressing issues like the stabilization of electronic databases, which are at risk, and the need to archive electronic government records, which is mandated by state law.

Society and state resources would be better utilized if a technology coordinator was hired to identify, address, and resolve technology-related challenges.

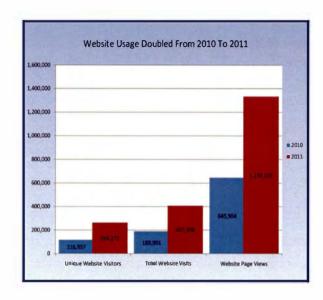


An improved website will allow **teachers** to more quickly identify and accumulate material for their classes; **researchers** will be able to conduct quicker, more thorough research.

State agencies will be assured their significant records are secure and will benefit from increased accessibility.

Potential **visitors** to museums and historic sites will be able to research their visits in advance.

Local historical groups will also receive technological support and experience increased visitation through the Hub of History.



- Create a technology plan and review committee to enhance new media effectiveness and oversee the implementation to include online, mobile, and on-site technologies.
- Coordinate with the State's IT Division to address future agency needs and oversee implementation of backend technology development, data management systems, and digital initiatives.
- Maximize social media efforts to increase online presence, for the purpose of sharing collections and historical content online.
- Supervise multimedia staff and oversee technical aspects of the Hub of History, Great Plains Theater, and other public components.

Multimedia/Web Developer (Three Positions)

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$71,999 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

The Society is limited in its ability to meet current public demands and expectations created with the expansion of the Heritage Center.

Without additional staff the technical skills required to meet and maintain the needs of the society and public demands are simply too large to handle. With current agency staff we can provide only very limited online and on-site access to our collections through technology, and have a great need to expand access via mobile technology.



Integration of online resources is a high priority to create increased access collections collections for the general public and education professionals while creating a cohesive and secure platform.

Who Benefits:

Educators will have increased access to exhibits and primary source materials.

Researchers and genealogists will be able to find additional materials not currently available online.

The general public will benefit from increased awareness of exhibits, increased access to collections, and increased educational opportunities.

- Development and maintenance of SHSND's online presence, including website and social media, as well as participating in development of backend technologies, data management systems, and new media initiatives.
- Develop and maintain new media and video productions for the Hub of History, Great Plains Theater, and exhibit interactives/ media.
- Integrate the technology plan into new media initiatives to increase access to collections and programming content.
- Create and integrate graphic designs, video production scripts, and storyboards for use in presentations, web sites, brochures, publications, and other projects, including at the statewide network of historic sites.

Museum Exhibit and Collections Specialist (Three Positions)

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

Exhibit and collections specialists will prepare and install objects in the exhibits and maintain exhibit components and systems. They will document and care for objects on exhibit or in storage in the Heritage Center or at historic sites. Their work is essential to preserving and presenting the artifacts that illustrate the stories of the people of North Dakota.

Most people will come to the expanded Heritage Center to see the objects that are on display in the exhibits. Others will come because they want to donate an object or want advice on how to care for something that has been passed down through their family.

In all of these instances, staff with the knowledge of how to care for the collections and exhibit them properly will play an important role.



Who Benefits:

Students and the general public will learn about the state's history through exhibits, or receive answers to questions about their family heirlooms when coming to the Heritage Center.

The **state's citizens** will have their history told and preserved through the artifacts and exhibits in the Heritage Center and State Historic Sites.

Visitors to the North Dakota Heritage Center will be able to learn more about individual pieces in the Heritage Center's collections.

County and local museums, as well as other state agencies will have improved access to information and technical assistance on the best ways to exhibit and care for collections they hold.

- Document, monitor, and care for objects on exhibit or in storage at the Heritage Center and at historic sites throughout the state.
- Locate, retrieve, and prepare objects to go on exhibit in the Heritage Center, at historic sites throughout the state, or loaned to county and local museums.
- Construct and maintiane exhibit components and exhibit lighting systems.
- Provide behind-the-scenes access to anyone who has questions about objects that are on exhibit or in storage.
- Consult with private individuals who are interested in donating objects to the State Historical Society.
- Advise individuals, local museums, and other organizations interested in how to best care for and exhibit their own collections.

Visitor Services and Security Officer (Three Positions)

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$62,559 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

The Heritage Center will see a significant increase in visitation and number of public and educational programs. A quality visitor experience includes meeting expectations with good customer service, personal interaction in the exhibits with informed and enthusiastic guides. Three additional staff are needed to interact and provide assistance to the public, oversee special events, assist with programming and tours, supervise volunteers, and in a more invisible way also enforce occupancy and fire codes, assist with emergencies, and provide additional floor security.



Who Benefits:

Tourists who visit North Dakota and leave with a new appreciation and respect for our state.

Adult North Dakotans and **taxpayers** who, through a safe, memorable and enjoyable experience, leave with a high level of satisfaction and a new appreciation for our state's history.

North Dakota children who experience those WOW! moments and leave with a new enthusiasm and excitement about their state and role they can play in its future.

- Patrol 75,000 square feet of public spaces, seven days a week, to provide quality learning opportunities and experiences.
- Focus the operations and activities around individual visitor needs; have the ability to manage challenging situations.
- Handle large groups of people during special events and emergencies to ensure public safety.
- Assist Information Desk, Museum Store, volunteer and agency staff with way finding, medical emergencies, tourist information and visitor needs as required.
- Ensure that exhibits are secure for collections and visitor safety.

Public Control Room Security Officer (Two Positions)

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$51,939 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

Security is present at the Heritage Center 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Security staff also monitor cameras at the historic sites across the state. When the Heritage Center expansion is completed, the number of statewide surveillance cameras will have increased by 614% since the 1981 opening. Security staffing levels, however, have remained unchanged for more than thirty years.



The Heritage Center currently meets the national standards for state and federal repositories and for American Association of Museums accreditation. When the facility doubles in size, additional resources will be needed to maintain those standards

Two additional officers are required to staff the new, second public security control room that will monitor the public areas. This location provides for immediate response to emergency and public safety situations.

Who Benefits:

Visitors – families, school groups, and tourists to the Heritage Center will be in a safe and secure environment.

Historians and **scientists** have access to state and federal collections and records for research.

State agencies have their records accessible in a safe and secure building.

Collection donors know that their family heirlooms are protected from loss.

- Monitor 75 surveillance cameras covering entrances/exits, exhibit galleries, and public and educational program spaces for visitor safety.
- As front-line staff, be informed and knowledgeable to meet customer needs and expectations.
- Monitor and assist with crowd control, enforcing occupancy and fire codes, and emergency medical situations.
- Monitor areas where vandalism or theft is a primary concern, such as the exhibit galleries, Museum Store, and James River Café.
- Monitor central communications networks as the hub for internal and external response procedures.

Electronic Records Archivist

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$80,259 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

While the number of records that are "born digital" grows every year, the State Archives has no means of accepting and safely storing such records. An electronic records archivist is needed to develop the means of preserving digital records so that they are readable decades from now. Archives must provide long-term preservation and access, in formats compatible with ITD requirements, for government records.

The State Archives is legally required to preserve state and local government



One example of the need for preservation of digital records arose from the historic statewide flooding experienced in North Dakota this year. Enormous amounts of digital records, including aerial photographs of the flooding, have been created by a number of state agencies and need to be preserved. These agencies rely on the Archives to provide long-term storage of, and access to, this historic information.



Who Benefits:

The state and local government agencies, researchers, and others who need to capture, preserve, and access historic records created in impermanent formats will be able to do so.

The privacy of **individuals** will be better protected.

- Oversee transfer, maintenance, and migration of electronic records from government offices using established best practices to be sure records are accessible into the future.
- Determine the best cross-agency solutions for storing and maintaining electronic records, and identify methods of funding them.
- Ensure public records laws are followed, confidential records protected, and unnecessary records destroyed.
- Identify and implement cost-effective tools and formats useful in preservation and access.

Archives Specialist (Two Positions)

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

State Archives collections include manuscripts, state and local government records, maps, audio tapes, film and video, books and periodicals, and newspapers. The staff can manage incoming collections, but is unable to make much headway on thousands of feet of material that has been collected since 1905 and never inventoried. The public expectation to find information online continues to increase, but without additional staff the ability to make that information available is extremely limited.



Much of the 3.5 million feet of audio tape and film and video collection documenting state history is at a high risk of loss as these formats are rapidly deteriorating. Some breakage of North Dakota Bicentennial oral history interviews on reel-to-reel and cassette and Legislative Committee hearings has resulted in losing portions of recordings. Video news footage from five North Dakota television stations going back to 1952 is at the highest risk of loss.

We have the equipment to digitize film, video and audio but no staff is dedicated to the AV collection. An archivist dedicated to this work is necessary to assure long-term preservation and access of the collections and to fulfill exhibit design needs.

Who Benefits:

Visitors to the Heritage Center will have an enhanced experience in the galleries.

Teachers will have more engaging material for **students**, who will learn more about their state.

State agencies and local historical groups will be able to access audio and video material about their activities or localities.

State citizens will be able to find video images of their families and communities online as well as by visiting the Heritage Center.

- Assess audio and film/video collections: prioritize what needs to be digitized, protect original materials, create preservation masters, and provide reference copies of materials at risk of loss through deterioration.
- Arrange and describe backlog of manuscripts, state and local government records, and moving image and sound recording holdings for cataloging and access by the public.
- Select and prepare historically significant clips for exhibits in museum galleries.
 Digitize photographs and documents for online access.
- Improve public access outreach and educational activities.

Archaeology Collections Specialist

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

This position will assist the archaeological collections manager with the proper documentation and preservation of the collections, ensure that the agency's curatorial practices are in accordance with professional museum standards, and maximize the research and educational potential of the collections.

The Society curates some 13 million archaeological artifacts, as well as records, from approximately 950 prehistoric and historic archaeological sites in North Dakota. These objects and records represent 12,000 years of history and culture. The collections continue to expand as a result of legal requirements that sites be documented before they are disturbed by development.





Who Benefits:

Visitors to the Heritage Center will have greater access to the collection.

Local, national, and international scholars will be able to capture its immense research potential through scientific analysis and publication, benefiting teachers, students, and the scientific community.

Our enhanced ability to meet high curatorial standards will benefit **North Dakota citizens and the American public** at large, by ensuring that the state's archaeological heritage is preserved for future generations.

- Catalog archaeological artifacts and archive associated documents.
- Develop, update, and maintain a master collections catalog database.
- Clean, label, and prepare archaeological artifacts for storage.
- Re-house older collections in archivally stable materials.
- Digitize archaeological objects and associated documents to minimize handling fragile items.
- Assist archaeological collections manager with the development of online content and outreach projects.
- Perform database queries for agency inventories and federal and state audits.

Education Programs Developer

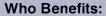
Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

An education programs developer is needed to create the public activities that explain how or why objects on display were made, as well as the stories of the people who used them. This will include the learning labs in the new galleries, where visitors, in person or online, can research or experiment with exhibit materials or themes.

The program developer will also provide materials to meet the North Dakota Studies requirements for primary and secondary schools.

The Hub of History near the entrance to the Heritage Center will connect statewide historical groups and organizations and encourage visitors to also explore these other sites. Technical support in programming will also be provided to these groups.



Visitors to the North Dakota Heritage Center, historic sites, and the website will gain a better understanding of where we came from, how we got here, and what ideas, influences, and challenges have made us who we are today.

Teachers will have available effective and engaging educational material about North Dakota and **students** will learn more about their state.

Local historical groups and organizations will improve their ability to tell their own local history and experience increased visitation.



- Create educational and interpretive programs for the expansion's galleries and the rotating Governors Gallery; establish a docent program; and create podcasts that visitors can select depending upon their individual interests.
- Coordinate National History Day in North Dakota; an annual event (grades 6-12).
- Develop and deliver distance learning programs to student audiences, providing experts in classrooms that would otherwise not be able to access such information.
- Deliver workshops, provide training, advice, and support for local and county historic groups.
- Develop Hub of History programming to encourage statewide visitation of historic sites.

Graphic Artist

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$55,479 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

An additional graphic artist is required to support the exhibits and related printed materials, as well as other publications such as brochures and educational resources. Visually stimulating material can trigger an interest in learning.

Today's patrons of the North Dakota Heritage Center and state historic sites have come to expect quality exhibits and printed materials when they visit. The days of typing out exhibit labels on a typewriter and pasting a few things on a panel and calling it an exhibit are long gone. The general public also expects traveling exhibits and publications that have visual appeal and a professional look.

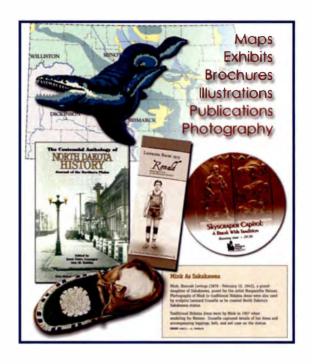
This expectation will only increase when the expansion of the North Dakota Heritage Center is complete.

Who Benefits:

Visitors to the North Dakota Heritage Center will gain a clearer understanding of where we came from, how we got here, and what ideas, influences, and challenges have made us who we are today.

Teachers will have available effective and engaging educational materials about North Dakota and students will learn more about their state.

Local historical groups and organizations will improve their ability to tell their own local history and experience increased visitation.



- Produce custom-made maps, drawings, exhibit panels, and other printed exhibit graphics for long-term and temporary exhibits at the North Dakota Heritage Center and state historic sites.
- Provide custom-made graphics for traveling exhibits that go out to county and local historical societies, libraries, and other institutions.
- Develop and update printed materials such as the flyers for educational programs, brochures, and activity sheets used in the exhibit galleries.
- Produce publication designs that reflect the State Historical Society of North Dakota in a professional and visually appealing manner.

Marketing Specialist

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)



Why This Position Is Needed:

Marketing is an essential tool for the State Historical Society's mission. A beautiful new museum with state-of-the-art exhibits and educational activities will have fewer visitors if the public is unaware of what is available. The educational materials that can enrich classrooms will remain on the shelf unless teachers know about them. Word-of-mouth is no longer enough to break through the communications clutter.

Who Benefits:

Visitors from out of state will become aware of the opportunities offered at the State Museum and state historic sites.

North Dakotans will be encouraged to return to the Heritage Center and other sites for additional visits.

Teachers will be aware of the availability of educational material about North Dakota, and students will learn more about their state.

Heritage tourism partners, including local historic organizations, businesses, museums, and others will benefit for increased public awareness.

- Market the expanded North Dakota
 Heritage Center and the State Historical
 Society's activities to the public in North
 Dakota and to visitors from out of state
 through such means as electronic and
 print advertising, internet resources,
 and media relations. It is particularly
 important to market the rotating exhibits
 in the Governors Gallery to increase
 return visits.
- Market the museum stores. Income from the stores supports agency publications and statewide education programming. The stores also support North Dakota artisans.
- Reach teachers to make them aware of the North Dakota Studies resources that are available through the Society.
- Promote visitation at local historical organizations across the state.
- Promote customer service and improve feedback to the SHSND about the value and quality of its programs and services. This includes using customer research data to better assess what the public is interested in, measuring the effectiveness of Society programs, and assessing economic impacts.

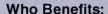
Conservator

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

The State Historical Society has several curators, who have very basic training in preserving historical objects, but no one with the specialized and scientific skills of a conservator. Therefore, any conservation or restoration work that needs to be done on the collections at the Heritage Center has to be sent to the Midwest Art Conservation Center in Minneapolis. We have used conservators frequently, including to clean Mink's (the model for the Sakakawea statue) dress, clean and preserve paintings, Audubon prints, and clothing, including historic wedding dresses.





The collectors among the **general public** would benefit by having a trained conservator who could offer recommendations and care for objects and materials they hold.

County and local museums and state agencies would have access to a trained conservator that could offer technical assistance for care and treatment of priceless objects in their collections. In the case of disasters such as floods or fire, the conservator could assess the damage done to collections at the affected museum and help to prioritize the recovery process.

- Recommend ways to care for museum objects. If more intense treatment is required, a conservator can perform repairs or stabilize an object to prevent further deterioration and improve aesthetics.
- Clean and preserve items made of paper, wood, textiles, leather, or other materials.
- Repair surfaces, reassemble objects with broken parts, and construct copies if necessary.
- Use chemistry, physics, biology, etc. to do treatments correctly and keep other staff up-to-date and meeting current standards.
- Determine the correct climate-control measures that are suitable for a given object's preservation.

Compliance Officer

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

The creation of one position with responsibility for handling the compliance process agencywide would help the agency to address audit findings, save time, and improve results.

State laws and regulations regarding procurement, risk management, and hiring/ employee management continue to increase in number and complexity. The agency has grown larger, with more sites and staff across the state. Furthermore, the North Dakota Heritage Center



expansion will substantially increase the effort required in these areas.

At present, a number of different staff across the agency do their best to deal with these issues as they arise.

Who Benefits:

The greater efficiency of one person managing compliance processes will be beneficial to the **State of North Dakota**, improving compliance results and decreasing the total amount of time spent on these efforts.

The **public** will also benefit because other staff will be able to concentrate on their primary professional responsibilities.

- Review requests for proposals and standards for evaluating proposals; provide technical assistance for other procurement issues.
- Review contract language prior to bid awards to ensure risk management issues have been addressed; provide technical assistance in other contract management issues.
- Work with state auditors to address audit findings and to assure practices of the Society are in compliance with state rules and procedures.
- Implement and maintain a centralized hiring process and procedures for the agency, in compliance with state law and regulations.
- Provide training to department personnel to ensure compliance with state law concerning bids, contracts, purchasing, hiring procedures, and other appropriate agency-wide requirements; maintain and update agency policy manual.
- Implement and manage annual agency training program to include: discrimination, sexual harassment, drug-free workplace, workplace violence, and equal employment opportunities and diversity.

Former Governors' Mansion and Camp Hancock Site Supervisor

Projected Salary and Benefits: \$68,459 (general funds)

Why This Position Is Needed:

A full-time, permanent site supervisor at the Former Governors' Mansion and Camp Hancock would provide the public with increased year-round access, develop additional programming, enhance online and onsite exhibits, and improve preservation of the resources.

Two elements are key to the visitor's enjoyment of a state historic site: the realization that the visitor is encountering an authentic place of history and a site supervisor who can help the visitor make the connections between the place and its history. The supervisor can also provide the daily attention that will help preserve the site for future generations.



These are two of the major sites maintained by the State Historical Society of North Dakota. They are currently managed by a part-time, temporary site supervisor with reduced hours between November and March of each year.

Who Benefits:

Visitors to these sites are the beneficiaries. Closer attention to education and preservation benefits all of us.

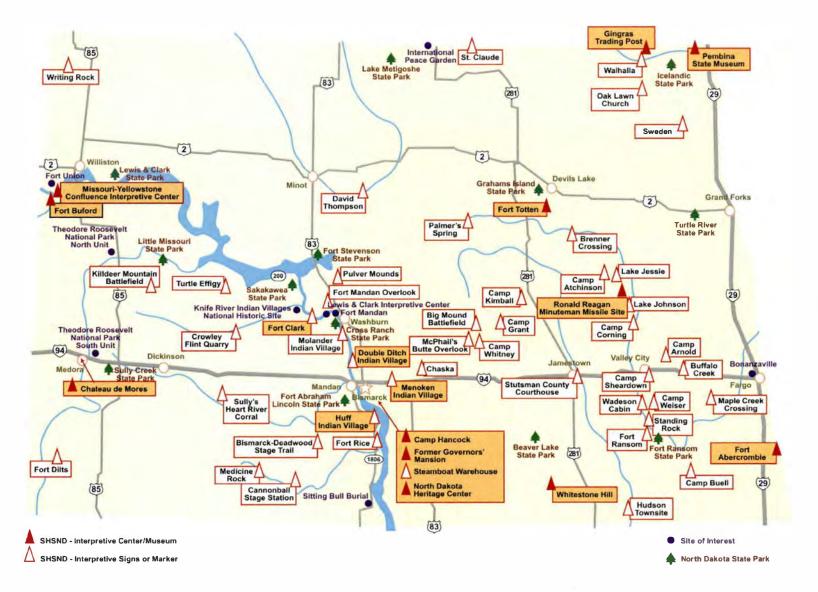
Whether our visitors are **tourists**, **local residents**, **students**, **or teachers**, the sites provide venues for a variety of experiences, including meetings and gatherings as well as special programs and memory-making events.

- Develop and implement programming and interpretive information.
- Arrange for booked meetings, weddings, or events, and provide staffing for them.
- Actively engage in public relations marketingnetworks.
- Provide tours to visitors.
- Recruit and train temporary staff, interns, and volunteers to provide professional site care, interpretation, and customer service.
- Manage the sites' budgets.
- Provide for the care and maintenance of furnishings and other artifacts, the historic structures, and the sites' grounds.

State Historical Society of North Dakota Background Information

The State Historical Society of North Dakota (SHSND) was founded in 1895. It oversees the North Dakota Heritage Center, the Pembina State Museum, and 55 historic sites located throughout the state. The Society consists of five divisions, which provide a wide variety of unique services. The divisions are as follows:

- 1. **Support Services Division** supports and coordinates all functions of the agency through budgeting, accounting, purchasing, human resource management, inventory control, concession sales, communications services, building and site security, and general supervision.
- 2. Archeology & Historic Preservation Division evaluates architectural and archaeological properties, assists historic property owners, provides information about historic preservation and restoration, nominates properties to the National Register of Historic Places and State Historic Sites Registry, administers the Preservation Tax Credit Program, reviews the impact of federally-related projects on historic properties, and manages the archaeological collections from approximately 950 prehistoric and historic sites in North Dakota. This division also provides for the management, maintenance, repair, and operation of all Historical Society land and buildings other than the North Dakota Heritage Center.
- 3. Museum Division presents the history of North Dakota through exhibits in the North Dakota Heritage Center, at the Pembina State Museum, and at several state historic sites. In addition, it produces traveling exhibits that are shown at libraries, county and local historical societies, and other venues throughout North Dakota. The Museum Division is also responsible for preserving more than 63,000 artifacts in the history, ethnology, and natural history collections. Museum Division staff provide graphic design for the agency and technical assistance on collection care and exhibit design to the people of North Dakota and to other museums in the state.
- 4. Communication and Education Division is responsible for the agency's communications, media relations, and marketing program, produces agency publications, including newsletters, a history journal, and occasional books. It offers a wide variety of educational and interpretive programs for the Heritage Center and other sites and acts as the state provider of classroom materials and curriculum, meeting the North Dakota studies requirements for fourth graders, eighth graders, and high school students. It provides outreach services statewide through educational services and technical assistance and manages the agency volunteer program.
- **5. State Archives Division** preserves records of North Dakota government and makes them accessible to the public. It also makes available the collections of books, microfilm, newspapers, maps, photographs, manuscripts, and other two-dimensional historical materials to both staff and public through reference services and programs of preservation.

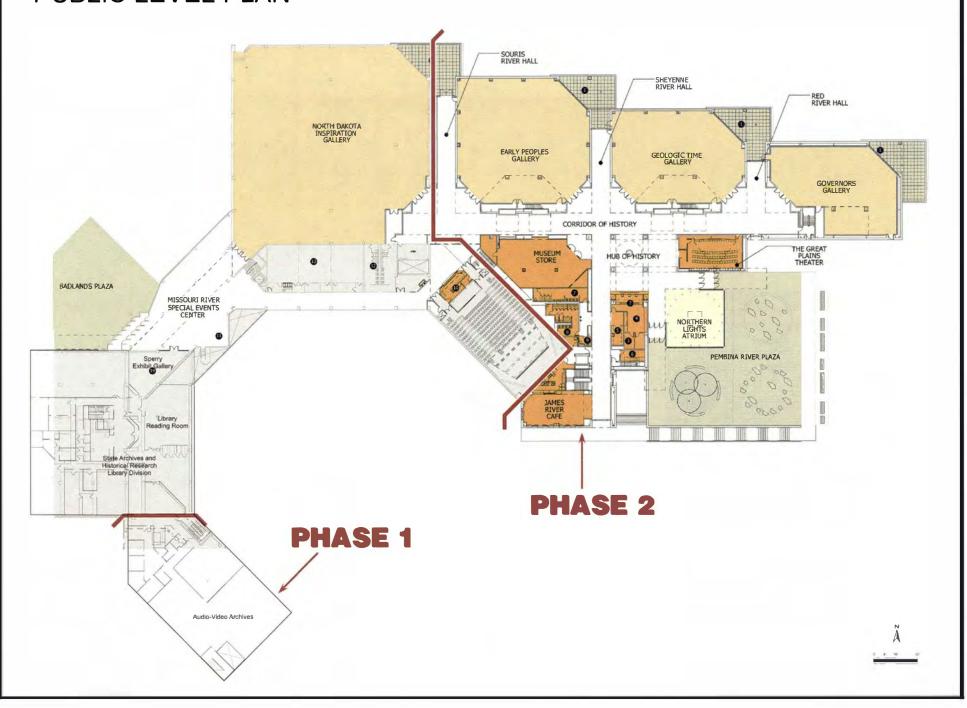

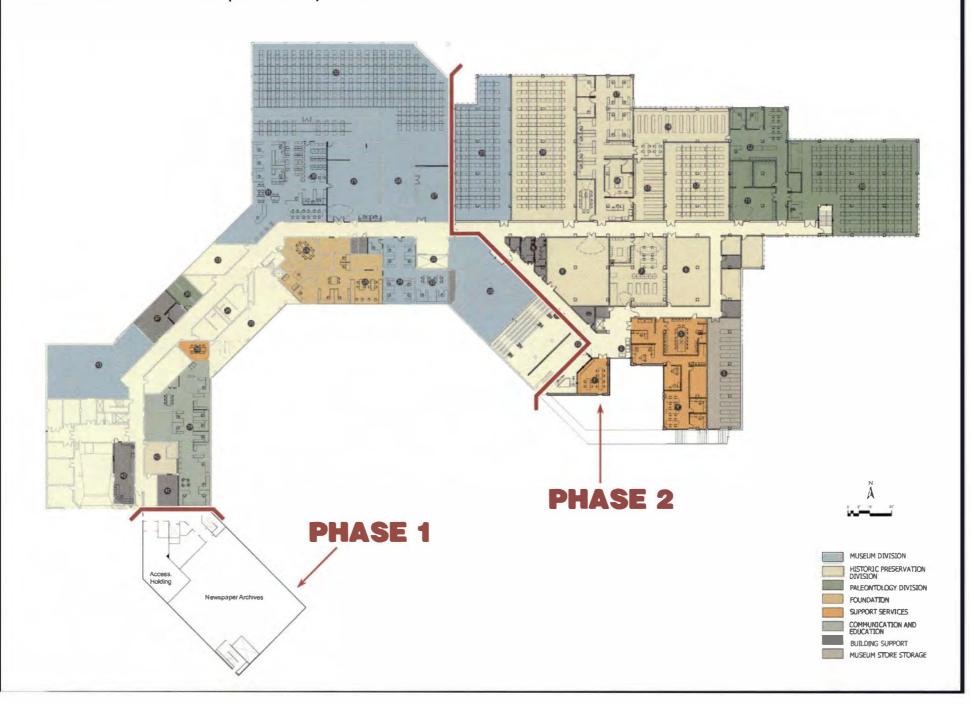
Almost half the square footage at the Heritage Center is dedicated to the collections and labs that are critical to the operations of the State Historical Society. Through MOAs and partnerships the Heritage Center also houses the North Dakota Geological Survey's paleontology lab and State Fossil Collection, along with numerous other state and federal agency collections. In our collecting mission and as the state's federal repository, the Heritage Center's trained staff, extensive security and environmental conditions meet federal standards for collections care.

The Heritage Center, since opening in 1981, has served over 2.7 million visitors. These visitors include school groups, families, life-long learners and tourist from across the country and around the world. Chairman Holmberg and members of the Committee, my name is Scott J. Davis; I am member of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe and a descendent of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa. I serve the great state of North Dakota as the Executive Director of the North Dakota Indian Affairs Commission, appointed by our Governor. I joined the Commission in May of 2009.

The purpose of this testimony is to extend support from the North Dakota Indian Affairs Commission for the North Dakota Heritage Center expansion project --- along with its needs. This is a very important project for both our Great State, and also for our five Tribal Nations.

The vision of the Heritage Center "to showcase the world-class accomplishments of North Dakotans" is something (I believe) we as leaders should all support. Recognizing and honoring the contributions of our fellow North Dakota citizens is a fundamental component to embracing the rich history of our State. What better way to accomplish this, but with a world-class facility.

This expansion project will greatly benefit not only our state, but also our tribal nations. Tourism is the third largest industry in North Dakota bringing in \$4.6 billion a year (2010). This influx of revenue greatly affects our tribal nations as well. Take, for instance, the United Tribes International Pow Wow. This once-a-year, four-day September event alone brings in \$4.6 million to our Bismarck community, with most of this revenue coming from external sources. With such an influx of tourism revenue and activity, I believe it's only sensible to meet the public's expectations --- both of our citizens and those visiting North Dakota.

This Heritage Center has always played an important role in educating the public about our tribal history's and culture. With this new expansion it will also embody another important role as well -- the Native American Hall of Honor. This is one of the most groundbreaking and innovative events that has ever happened between the State and our Tribal Nations. This is an extremely important opportunity in recognizing and honoring those North Dakota Tribal Members who have contributed with great sacrifice to the benefit of our North Dakota Community. So this expansion and its success mean a great deal to our Tribal Nations.

In closing: when I think of North Dakota, being a proud citizen of this great state, the first word that comes to mind is excellence. This new North Dakota Heritage Center also embodies this word. I hope that this committee supports whatever the needs of this expansion are (whether that be funding for staff or for marketing purposes), to ensure that the quality of the North Dakota experience meets all expectations.

On behalf of the North Dakota Association of Rural Electric Cooperatives, I'm submitting this testimony in support of increased funding for the State Historical Society of North Dakota as it prepares for the opening of the new Heritage Center in the next biennium. It would be the position of NDAREC that the funding contained in HB 1018 is not sufficient to do justice to the impressive expansion project that will soon be our state's new Heritage Center.

NDAREC, along with Touchstone Energy Cooperative partners Basin Electric Power Cooperative, Great River Energy and Minnkota Power Cooperative, made an early decision and commitment to support the expansion of the North Dakota Heritage Center with a combined gift of about \$1.5 million. Recently, several Touchstone Energy Cooperative partners had the chance to tour the Heritage Center expansion. From this visit, it's clear that this project is shaping up to be a first class, world class, showcase of our state's history and heritage.

In reviewing the additional needs request prepared by the State Historical Society and presented to this committee, we would concur that a project of this magnitude will need to be fully staffed with professionals who are able to design, develop, market and maintain the Center's exhibits in a way that exceeds the public's expectations. This expansion has every chance of making our North Dakota Heritage Center into what some have called a "Smithsonian on the prairie" in its portrayal of our rich history and heritage. It would be unfortunate if we left the 63rd Legislative Assembly without fully funding the need request of the State Historical Society to employ a staff of professionals who'll be the caretakers of this impressive new Heritage Center.

When we made our commitment to the Heritage Center expansion, we did so with the expectation that it would properly portray the contribution we have made to the state's economic vitality along with the contributions of so many others. As we head into the final years of making this project a reality, we strongly encourage our legislative partners to fully fund and support the needs request of the State Historical Society to make our new Heritage Center a first-class portrayal of who we are as a state and its people.

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, my name is Mike Eggl, Sr. Vice President of Communications and Administration at Basin Electric Power Cooperative. I am here to testify in support of House Bill 1018, a bill to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the State Historical Society.

In 2009 when Basin Electric committed support and resources to the preservation of North Dakota history through monetary and in-kind contributions to assist in the North Dakota Heritage Center expansion project, we had a vision for the Center to become a national and international destination and events center. A place where visitors to the Center could experience and explore the entire history and heritage of North Dakota, including geology, paleontology, natural history, archaeology and the history of all the state's people.

At that time, only a portion of North Dakota's heritage and history were on display for the public, even though the expansion of the Heritage Center had been proposed for more than 25 years. It had been projected that collections, space for artifacts, and exhibit spaces would be full and the Center would need more space if it were to truly represent our state's history. Now the Society is in dire need of well-qualified, educated professionals to deliver that history to those individuals who will visit the new Heritage Center, consume all that it has to offer, investigate and learn our history, and spread the news about what a wonderful history and facility we have here in the state of North Dakota.

Now that the Heritage Center will have the space for 70 more years of our state history and new exhibit spaces will be in place to tell the story of North Dakota's emerging industries - coal, gas, wind power, agriculture processing, manufacturing and technology - the Society will need new history professionals to tell the story. The last of seven recommendations issued by the 18-member State Historical Society of North Dakota Commission in 2003 was to put in place additional history professionals. The other recommendations have been funded and are about to be fulfilled and this final recommendation will bring to fruition the vision those leaders had for the Center and the State Historical Society.

The result of the Heritage Center's expansion and its growing requests for services to museum visitors, schools, historic sites and communities is that the Historical Society will need more history professionals. If our goal is to showcase the accomplishments and endeavors of North Dakotans, we should invest in historians to bring these accomplishments to visitors at the newly expanded Center. These individuals will provide the living link between our historical treasures housed in the Society's collections and the public owners of those treasures.

It has been said that "all good things come to those who wait;" now is the time to fulfill the expectations and needs of those who have been patiently awaiting the finalization of this wonderful expansion by providing the means to add new history professionals to the staff of the State Historical Society.

Thank you for giving me a bit of your time! I am Janet Esser. My interest in our state museum facilities goes back to my childhood. My Mom and Dad, both children of immigrants, made sure that we visited the old museum filled with wonderful things like the Native American displays, and made a trip to Medora and the Chateau every summer when we came to North Dakota to visit our families which had settled in the now ghost town of Sims and took up homesteads which grew and prospered over time through their hard work and can do attitude.

Deep-seated in my soul was the saga of the mass migration of Europeans during the late 1800's lured to the Dakotas by promises of opportunities and land ownership. To make this leap of faith took courage beyond what I can really comprehend but it also reflected the strength of self these people had. They came and they brought with them traditions that the Dakotas embraced -- work ethic, customs, the strength of family, integrity -- characteristics that are clearly in evidence today, and blessed by our lonesome locale, the people of North Dakota are today what their ancestors were --- people of character and honesty.

And so, now we have ventured into a new era with our museum. First and foremost it is with the goal of making our history, beginning with the geological formations of the region, earliest human occupation, the story of the Native Americans, the bond between immigration and the railroad, the settlers stories, the Dirty Thirties, up to now understandable. Once again our state is taking a giant leap forward into the prosperity and changes brought by the natural resources laid down as a bed for this state --- the oil boom. And with this oil boom will come, once again, a migration of people seeking security and a place to set down roots. The cycle begins all over again. Some day this story will be a thing of history.

This facility was a long time coming. It reflects the hopes and dreams of great leaders and an undying resolve to make it happen no matter what. They achieved what they set out to achieve, met goal after goal, found ways to keep the dream afloat when funds just weren't there, and here we are! These leaders have proven themselves over and over again. We have not found reason to be disappointed with their guidance. They sought private funds when asked to do so and met the goals placed before them.

Now it is time to give them that one leap of faith they need to see this undertaking to its fruition. Give them the people they need! How can we do anything less? There is no way we can attempt to walk in their shoes and make better calls about what is needed or not needed than the people who have lived and breathed this project for years. Let them prove once again that they know what they are doing.

You have to know where you have been in order to know where you are going!

The building expansion to the North Dakota Heritage Center is projected to be completed in the spring of 2013, with the exhibits finished by the fall of 2014. While the building will be beautiful, the quality of visitors'

Heritage Center a National and International Destination and Events Center

The Heritage Center is unique among the museums of this region in the broad range of disciplines and subject areas covered in one institution.

Visitors Expect Technology, Public Programs and High Quality Exhibits

Visitors expect the Heritage Center to house high-quality exhibits. They expect the center to present and deliver public and educational programs related to the new and expanded exhibits. The public assumes that technology will be integrated into the exhibits and programs, delivering new educational programs to audiences across the state.

Preserve the collections of the state of North Dakota; create and maintain exhibits; provide materials and information for educational and interpretive programs, media, and publications; and provide professional advice on conservation repair and treatment to museums throughout the state and the general public.

Three Visitor Services and Security Officers and Two Control Room Security Officers

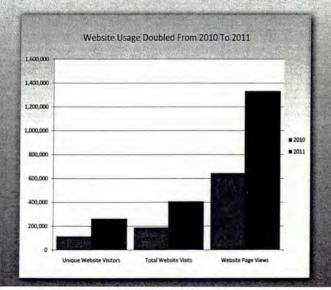
Meet expectations and mandates for the protection of state and federal archives and collections and assure the security of visitors. Visitor service security officers will also provide personal response to public questions and concerns.

One Electronic Records Archivist and Two Archives Specialists

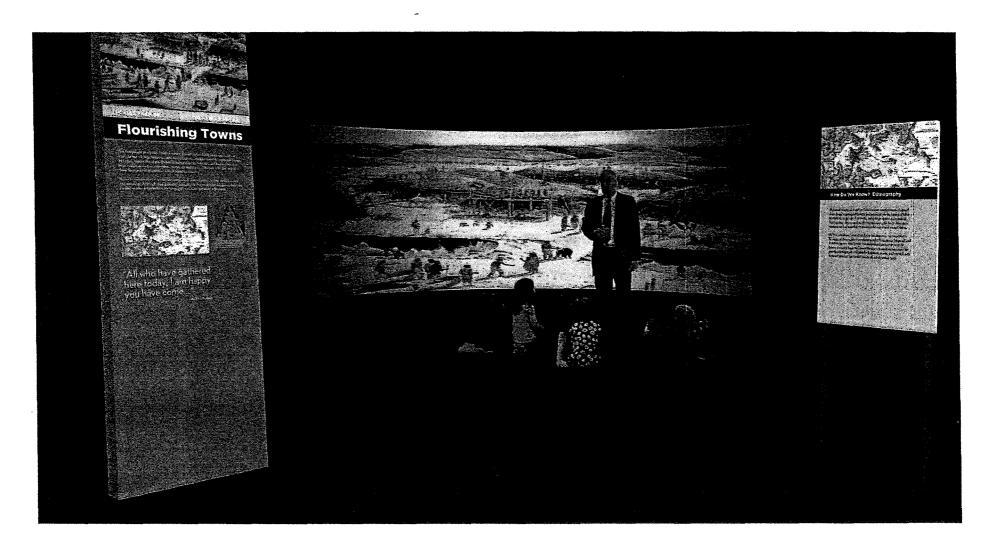

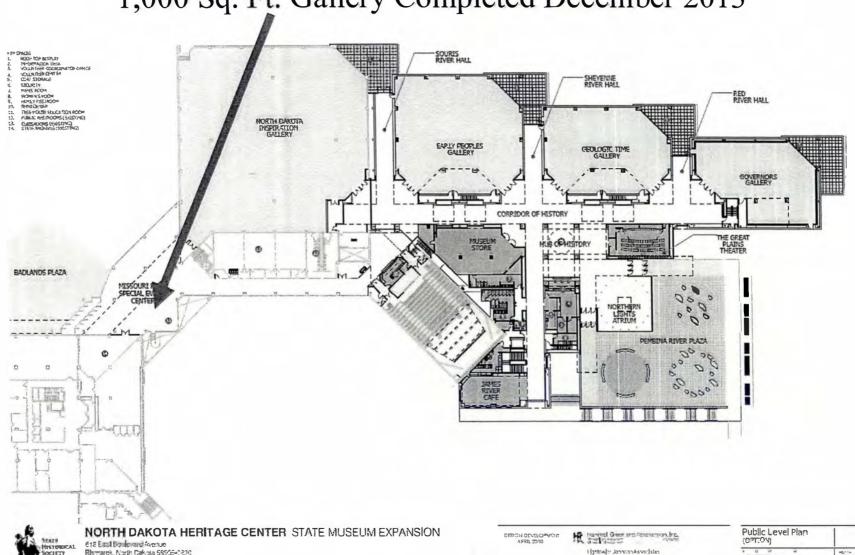

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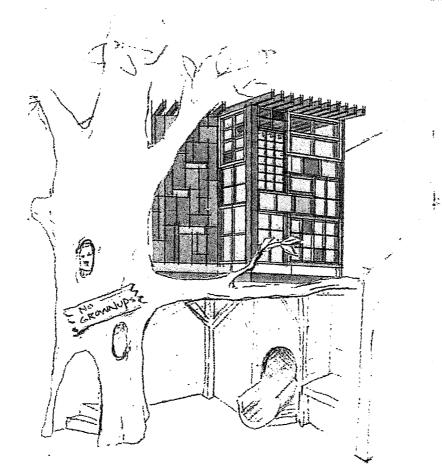
Treehouse Exhibit Concept Floor Plan

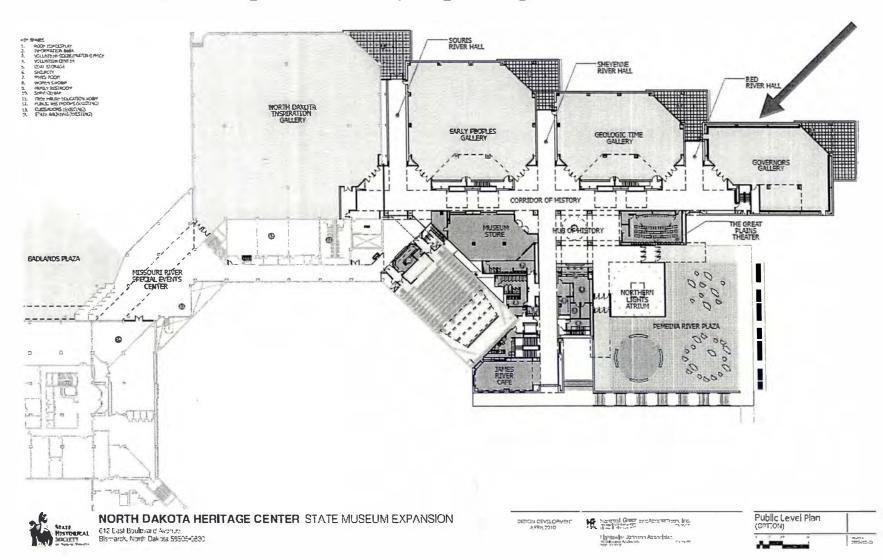

Hello Senators Krebsbach, Grindberg and Mathern.

I thought it would be helpful if I provided you with some information about past visitation figures and what we are projecting for visitation in the future.

In the recent past, we have averaged around 100,000 visitors to the Heritage Center each year. To add to this, historic sites attract 100,000 to 125,000 visitors per year. When the Heritage Center opened in 1981, we had 160,000 visitors. Over the next 32 years, we have served 2.7 million visitors.

Our estimated projections for visitors to the expanded Heritage Center could exceed 250,000 annually. We will attract additional visitors through distribution of brochures, bill boards, information on our webpage (over 20,000 hits per month) and through tourism publications. The specially designed Governor's Gallery will give us the opportunity to offer major traveling exhibits and in-house temporary exhibits in the Center. This will give us programming and promotional options to attract local, state, national and international visitors. We will also be able to generate income from exhibit entrance fees, sales of gifts and publications. We are working very hard to get visitors back to several of our historic sites (Chimney Park in Medora and Fort Totten State Historic Site) that have suffered from flooding in past few. Our total annual visitation should increase to 350,000 plus.

I hope this will help. Thanks again for your support.
