

Tina Bay, Director of the Developmental Disabilities Division for the Department of Human Services introduced HB 1108 (attach #1)(time ends 3:00)

Senator Warner asked if is this consistent with change in federal legislation.

Ms. Bay stated not 100% sure if there are any federal legislation to have people listed first. This follows what other entities are doing.

Senator Howard Anderson, Jr. asked what are we accomplishing by this other than changing terminology. Are they eligible for more services?

Ms. Bay indicated it is just a terminology change.

Chairman Judy Lee offered her opinion is that it is a respectful thing to do. We are trying to do person first language. It doesn't harm anything in doing.

Senator Dever section 30, page 16, line 18, which profession is it referring to? It was answered that it is the Nurse Practice act.

Chairman Judy Lee it is changing the terminology to person first. **Ms. Bay** confirmed.

Senator Dever doesn't know how many conversations where he has first person terminology. He discussed disabled veterans terminology.

Ms. Bay is not aware of any conversation to this.

Senator Dever we have language in constitution that referred to retarded persons. **Chairman Judy Lee** indicated a lot of that language has changed. **Senator Dever**

indicated the word "moron" was the initial language. There was also a short discussion regarding the definition of ARC. **Linda Wurtz**, President of ARC, stated the definition used to the the Association for Retarded Citizens, but we do not refer to that definition any longer. We have kept the ARC brand name because it carries the reputation. So today, we are just ARC.

Chairman Weisz, and members of the House Human Services Committee, I am Tina Bay, Director of the Developmental Disabilities Division of the Department of Human Services (Department). I am here today in support of House Bill 1108, which was introduced at the request of the Department.

This bill proposes to amend language in the North Dakota Century Code (N.D.C.C.) to reflect appropriate people-first language. It also proposes to amend section 25-16-03, relating to requirements for licensing treatment or care centers for individuals with disabilities.

Sensitivity for individuals with disabilities begins with people-first language. Generally, in choosing words about individuals with disabilities, the guiding principle is to refer to the individual first, not the disability. Instead of saying "the disabled," it is preferable to say "individuals with disabilities." Changes proposed in this bill support this principle.

The Department also proposes changing the word "person" to "individual" in multiple sections. N.D.C.C. section 1-01-49 defines "individual" as a human being and "person" as an individual, organization, government, political subdivision, or government agency, or instrumentality. To be consistent with section 1-01-49, where the context for the term meant "a human being," this bill proposes to substitute the word "individual."

Subsection 3 of N.D.C.C. section 25-16-03 requires the Department to issue a license for the operation of a treatment or care center for individuals with developmental disabilities upon showing that the health, morality, safety, and well-being of the residents cared for and treated in the center will be properly safeguarded. On page 12, line 5, the Department is requesting removal of the word "morality" because "properly safeguarding" morality is not an appropriate function of licensing. Morality is an individual choice; not the responsibility of a facility that may affect whether a license is issued.
