

Explanation or reason for introduction of bill/resolution:

Relating to a blue alert notice system; and to declare an emergency.

Minutes:

Vice Chairman Karls: Opened the hearing with testimony in support.

Rep. K. Koppelman: Introduced the bill. Amber alert typically alerts the public about missing children.

Rep. Lois Delmore: Is the blue alert something that is being adopted around the US?

Rep. K. Koppelman: I suspect so, but I can't say for sure.

Wayne Stenehjem, Attorney General: The blue alert system won't require any changes or additions to North Dakota's infrastructure. An individual must have threatened, engaged, attacked, or abducted a law enforcement officer. A description of the individual would be posted if available. I think there are 21 states who have adopted this now. The amendment (Attachment #1) would be on page 1 line 13. (Attachment #2)

Rep. L. Klemin: Is there something that shows up blue with this alert?

Wayne Stenehjem: Yes

Rep. Mary Johnson: What if there is an amber alert and blue alert simultaneous? Would one take precedence or could you run both?

Wayne Stenehjem: We have the capability of running both simultaneously.

Colonel Mike Gerhart Superintendent of the ND Highway Patrol: This bill would enhance the safety for both law enforcement and the public. (Attachment #3)

Dan Donalin Chief of the Bismarck Police Department: I am in support of this bill. This would notify the public which is different than what we currently have in place.

Rep. G. Paur: It is considered it is more egregious to adopt a policeman rather than firemen.

Dan Donalin: No, that is not the case. But a fireman would not be put out as a blue alert.

Rep. D. Larson: Could you tell the committee members what the blue represents in the thin blue line and thus the reason for the blue alert?

Dan Donlyn: The blue represents those men and women out there keeping us safe.

Rep. L. Klemin: I don't see anything in here about giving notice to the public?

Dan Donalyn: I did not take part in the drafting of the bill. I believe the intent was in the procedure part of the bill much like the amber alert.

Chairman K.Koppelman: This was a bill the Attorney General asked for. I see Mr. Carlson is in the audience, would you mind coming forward and answering a question?

Dallis Carlson Director of the Bureau of Criminal Investigation: The Highway Patrol is the primary agency responsible for the amber alerts. BCI (Bureau of Criminal Investigation) and State Radio Communications are assisting them. The information is reviewed before being broadcasted on the amber alert system and the blue light system would go through a similar process.

Chairman K.Koppelman: On line 9 it says upon request of a law enforcement agency that is investigating an offense against a law enforcement officer, the BCI shall activate a blue alert notice to aid in the apprehension of an individual that is a suspect in an offense. Maybe placing public in front of notice would accomplish Rep Klemin's concern.

Dallis Carlson: I have no objections on that amendment.

Rep. Lois Delmore: Are there any instances, that you wouldn't want the public notified?

Dallis Carlson: We don't want the public to get in the middle of things, there is always a disclaimer. Someone who takes action against an armed officer needs to be found as soon as possible.

Chairman K.Koppelman: This language deals with a law enforcement agency.

Dallis Carlson: Yes it is an enhancement. Silver alert is for an endangered senior citizen.

Chief Dan Donally: The information put out would absolutely focus on the individual we are looking for and the danger surrounding that person not the location of the incident. We need to contact the family members of the officer first.

Chairman K.Koppelman: I also noticed in the wording that is a shell. They are not going to question whether it rises to that level or not.

Chief Dan Donally: Absolutely, they are not going to redraft verbiage they Are going to take what was sent to them and if it meets the criteria then it will be put out to the public.

Rep Delmore: Moves to insert the word public after the word alert on line 9 of the bill. And also to adopt the amendments with the headline proposed amendments to HB 1281.



Ch. Hogue: We will open the hearing on HB 1281.

Rep. K. Koppelman: Sponsor, support. This bill was a request of the Attorney General's office and it calls for a blue alert notice system. This is like the Amber alert system that goes out when abductions of children. The idea of the blue alert is that they would deal with law enforcement officers who've been threatened with a deadly weapon and the individual has committed a bodily injury against law enforcement individual; this would be a different kind of alert but very similar to an Amber alert. Obviously it's for a different purpose. Apparently this has happened in other areas and the AG's office and BCI have requested we do something similar in ND. I am pleased to bring that forward.

Ch. Hogue: How does the system work?

Rep. Koppelman: I would recommend hearing from the AG's office. I don't know.

Ch. Hogue: Thank you. Further testimony in support.

Wayne Stenehjem, Attorney General: Support (see attached 1).

Sen. Casper: Every time the system is activated, the fiscal note said there is little or no impact; how much does it impact the state, does it cost the state or your office that covers the cost.

Wayne Stenehjem: The notification comes through state radio; the determination is made by whatever local agency because the four criteria are

met. That would start the process. It doesn't go through our office but we participate.

Sen. Luick: There are some constituents that would like a "silver alert" in ND for older adults.

Wayne Stenehjem: There is another program, this bill doesn't address that. The silver alert is designed for instances where there are missing seniors, who maybe have Alzheimer and like to wander, etc. A number of states have done that. I considered that but our focus here was to work with the Fraternal Order of Police on the blue alert. I think that perhaps by next session that might be something worthwhile to consider.

Sen. Nelson: You mentioned the blue lights on campus. We have them at NDSU for quite a few years. Could there be some confusion as to how the blue alert and the blue lights on campus could be confused.

Wayne Stenehjem: I don't think so. The blue alert uses a different system and mechanism for getting the word out. I don't think that will be a problem.

Sen. Nelson: Under the states that have it, there are no surrounding states. Other states considering it, we have Minnesota, Iowa, no Montana, and no South Dakota. Do you know where MN is in the process of passing this kind of law?

Wayne Stenehjem: No, I don't. This isn't particularly controversial. It can be very useful.

Ch. Hogue: Thank you. Further testimony in support. Testimony in opposition. Neutral testimony. We will close the hearing. What are the committee's wishes?

Sen. Armstrong: I move a Do Pass.

Sen. Casper and Sen. Nelson: Seconded the motion.

Chairman Koppelman, and members of the House Judiciary Committee, I am Attorney General Wayne Stenehjem. I am here today to provide testimony in support of House Bill 1281.

House Bill 1281 authorizes a Blue Alert System in North Dakota. The purpose of the Blue Alert System is to provide a quick response system to coordinate and speed up the apprehension of dangerous criminals who have killed, seriously injured, or abducted local, state, or federal law enforcement officers and who also present a danger to the public.

The Blue Alert System will provide immediate information to the public about dangerous suspected individuals through media broadcasts including television and radio, cell phone notification, electronic billboards, and any other available notification sources to solicit information and help from the public to safely and quickly apprehend the suspected individual or individuals.

Under the Blue Alert System, the Bureau of Criminal Investigation, in cooperation with the North Dakota Highway Patrol and the State Radio Division of the Department of Emergency Services are required to develop an operational plan to prepare for and respond to law enforcement requests for activation of the Blue Alert System. The Blue Alert System will not require any changes or additions to current infrastructure and it will utilize the same technology presently used for Amber Alerts for abducted children.

House Bill 1281 sets out four criteria that must be met in order to activate the Blue Alert System in North Dakota:

1. An individual has threatened a law enforcement officer with a deadly weapon, or has used a deadly weapon against a law enforcement officer, or has caused a law enforcement officer to suffer serious bodily injury or death, and if the proposed amendment is adopted, an officer has been abducted or is missing while on duty;

2. The individual has fled the scene of the offense and a description of the individual or the individual's vehicle is available for broadcast;
3. The law enforcement agency investigating the offense has determined the individual poses a threat to the public or other law enforcement personnel;
or
4. A determination has been made by law enforcement that dissemination of available information to the public may help avoid further harm or assist in the apprehension of the suspected individual.

The Blue Alert system was brought to our attention by the North Dakota Fraternal Order of Police and it is also a national initiative of the Fraternal Order of Police. At the present time, twenty-one states have implemented the Blue Alert system and at least nine other states besides North Dakota, are considering implementation of the Blue Alert System. ¹

The Blue Alert will provide the means to speed the apprehension of violent criminals who kill or seriously injure local, state, or federal law enforcement officers. The Blue Alert would be a cooperative effort between State Departments of Public Safety, State Departments of Transportation, the Governors' Divisions of Emergency Management, broadcasters, law enforcement agencies, and the general public. Using media broadcasts and Department of Transportation messaging signs, each Blue Alert would cover the state with information identifying a detailed description of the offender, the offender's vehicle, and license plate information which will inevitably hinder the violators ability to flee the state and facilitate a speedy capture, helping eliminate the threat they would pose on other communities and law enforcement personnel.

State Blue Alert Criteria

All four criteria must be met in order to activate the network.

A law enforcement officer must have been killed or seriously injured by an offender.

The investigating law enforcement agency must determine that the offender poses a serious risk or threat to the public and other law enforcement personnel.

A detailed description of the offender's vehicle, vehicle tag, or partial tag must be available for broadcast to the public.

The investigating law enforcement agency of jurisdiction must recommend activation of

the Blue Alert to the State Operations Center (Governors' Divisions of Emergency Management).

House Bill 1281 authorizes a Blue Alert System in North Dakota.
