

Chairman Schaible opened the public hearing. Denton Zubke was on hand to intro the bill.

Representative Zubke: District 39. See attachment #1. (:09-2:25)

Senator Triplett: What is chapter 55.01 is that the chapter we are putting it into?

Representative Zubke: I do not know.

Senator Murphy: Can you speak to the fiscal note?

Representative Zubke: There was \$4,000 in an account and I don't think the sections that we are repealing specifically give the governor direct control over those funds I do not know where they came from but I understand that they have been in an account and they would like to clean that up

Senator Triplett: For your information, it is in the state historical society's powers and limitations.

Senator Triplett: District 18. I can provide some background on this. My husband was on the commission from 1988-1998. The commission was very active during those years it is controlled the lieutenant governor and I am not sure why it has lapsed. During that time they met quarterly and had input into rebuilding Fort Union and Fort Buford at the confluence. It's worthiness for reactivation is worth discussing and given the level of activity that is going on around there should be opportunities to recommending land at the confluence. Before 5 years ago I think is under the control of state game and fish.

Senator Laffen: There also was a new visitor's center called the confluence center, was that the shepherded by the state Historical Society?

Senator Triplett: The Historical Society is in charge of the site and they had more of an assisting function and they never had a budget beyond the stipend for the members to attend meetings. I think that is what the \$4,000 is, if they stopped having meetings at some point I am sure that there is a small bit left for expenses. It was a pretty low cost operation but I know they put a lot of energy into it.

Jon Patch: Private Citizen. I think that it is interesting of the confluence of North Dakota. It is a little known fact that the Yellowstone River is forgotten in North Dakota if you look at water coming into our state the biggest source of water is the Yellowstone River and there is 80 miles of it before it hits the confluence with the Missouri. It is a huge resource to our state.

Senator Murphy: There is only 2-3 miles of flow of the Yellowstone before it hit the Missouri, correct?

Jon Patch: No, there is 80 miles of flow. The 2-3 miles is the distance from the state line before the Missouri hits the confluence of the Yellowstone. Those 2 rivers come together in the confluence; more annual flow comes from the Yellowstone than does from the Missouri. In the past there has been testimony from downstream waters being in the Dakotas

Senator Laffen: The flow from where they meet is greater than the Missouri?

Jon Patch: Yes, the mean annual flow from the Yellowstone is greater than the mean annual flow from the Missouri.

Senator Laffen: Any idea why it is not called the Yellowstone the whole way down?

Jon Patch: Not the flow but the length of the river and the number of tributaries that come into it.

There was no further discussion and Chairman Schaible closed the public hearing on HB 1379.

My name is Denton Zubke and I am the Representative from District 39 which constitutes the counties of Mckenzie, Billings, Golden Valley, Slope, Bowman, Adams, and part of Dunn.

House Bill 1379 would repeal chapter 55-06 of the North Dakota Century Code which provides for a Yellowstone-Missouri Rivers Confluence commission.

CHAPTER 55-06

HISTORICAL STUDY OF YELLOWSTONE AND MISSOURI RIVER CONFLUENCE

55-06-01. Yellowstone-Missouri Rivers confluence commission.

There is a Yellowstone-Missouri Rivers confluence commission. The commission is a governmental agency with the authority to exercise the powers specified herein, or which may be reasonably implied. The commission is composed of the governor as chairman, the president of the senate, the speaker of the house, the director of the state historical society, the commissioner of commerce, all ex officio, and five citizens of the state to be appointed by the governor who shall serve without compensation for the purpose of investigating, in cooperation with the state of Montana and the national park service, the historical importance and significance of the confluence area and for formulating and executing plans for the preservation of the historic sites illustrative of the history of the United States. The commission may expend its operating expenses and other funds provided by legislative appropriations and public and private grants for programs, improvements, and facilities to preserve and improve the Yellowstone-Missouri confluence area.

55-06-02. Organization of commission - Powers and duties.

Upon call of the governor, the commission shall meet and select from among its members a vice chairman and a secretary. All commission employees are entitled to be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred while attending meetings or otherwise engaged in the official business of the commission at the same rates as other state officers. The commission may establish such committees and subcommittees as it may deem desirable and necessary to carry out its purposes and adopt such rules as deemed appropriate. It may accept funds, property, and services and other assistance, financial or otherwise, from federal, state, county, municipal, and other public or private sources for the purpose of assisting and promoting its functions. It shall enlist the aid of all departments of the state and may call upon civic, patriotic, educational, fraternal, professional, and religious bodies and organizations for assistance.
