MEMORIAL ADDRESS BY C. WARNER LITTEN

Madam President, Honorable Senators, families and friends who are present here today to honor the memories of our ten recently departed former members of the North Dakota State Senate:

I am privileged to speak briefly not only on behalf of this distinguished legislative body, but also for the citizens of North Dakota to say "thank you" to an unselfish, dedicated, highly principled group of legislators for whom we and their constituents have the greatest admiration and respect.

Individually and collectively their records reveal that they served this state with distinction with the result that they reflected great credit, not only upon themselves, but also upon their families and the people they represented.

Their attainments and accomplishments exemplify the very spirit of volunteerism and the very spirit of North Dakota.

Do you remember the famous statement made by a North Dakota rancher, the 26th President of the United States, Theodore Roosevelt? It was he who said:

"Every person must devote a reasonable share of time to doing his duty in the political life of his community. If you are too timid, or too fastidious, or too careless, to do your part in the work, then you forfeit your right to be considered one of the governing and you become one of the governed instead---one of the driven cattle of the political arena."

Theodore Roosevelt also stated at one time, "Every person is, first, a citizen of some community."

He was right - and we should understand that there is a seat at the community and legislative planning table for any one of us who is inclined to take it. Our ten senators were more respected, more admired, and more understood because they took those seats at the table.

History reflects that the dedication, desire, and determination of our leadership in the past has been excellent, and we should understand today that a grateful state is thankful for the good work that has been done in an effort to improve the lives of all of us.

Peter Ubberoth was the commissioner of baseball and, as you recall, was the general chairman of the Summer Olympics held in Los Angeles, California, in 1984. At a meeting of the American Hospital Association in Toronto in 1986, he was quoted as saying, "Volunteerism is the backbone of America."

He should know because during those Olympics he recruited more than 200,000 volunteers with the result that the millions of dollars of net profit from the event, the greatest in Olympic history, were distributed to a number of needy charities throughout the United States.

Peter Ubberoth is right, of course, and we can state here today that, "Volunteerism is the backbone of the state of North Dakota."

Unfortunately, we are well aware that 1997 finds a great deal of concern over what is happening in the world of volunteerism.

We have a society that, for the most part, enjoys its leisure time as never before. We have more single parent families and families where both parents are obliged to work. Our political parties struggle to recruit candidates to run for legislative and executive positions.

However, I am confident, and I hope you are, too, that with a little more long range planning and extra effort we can develop the potential of our qualified young people, many of whom possess the attributes of the ten Senators we are honoring this afternoon.

We know from our own experience that our former colleagues overcame challenges that at times appeared to be thankless tasks and way too time-consuming. How did they do it? They surmounted many obstacles with perseverance, patience, a willingness to work, and enthusiasm.

Incidentally, it was Ralph Waldo Emerson who stated that, "Nothing great was ever accomplished without enthusiasm." The same Emerson also wrote the line, "Hitch your wagon to a star."

These are two of the common ingredients we find in community and legislative leadership - enthusiasm and imagination.

However, history will reveal that through the years there have been many more attributes prevalent in our North Dakota citizen legislature.

We have been blessed with hardworking men and women who inherited a quality from their parents and grandparents known as "work ethic".

These capitol halls and the chairs and desks in this Senate chamber have been occupied by men and women who dedicated their time and talents to help create and maintain a better North Dakota.

We can be proud of our predecessors whose honesty, friendliness, integrity, and ethical standards developed policies and passed into law rules and regulations that have resulted in an efficient state government that is second to none in these United States.

In this regard I want to tell you a story: Four weeks ago Representative Rick Berg was one of the participants in our semimonthly legislative forums in Fargo. He reported that in 1993 when he was Speaker of the House, he visited several other state legislatures during the interim to determine their modus operandi. He stated, to quote him exactly, that he was appalled at what he observed. By comparison, we truly do not know how very fortunate we are.

We, in North Dakota, can be proud and we should never forget that old saying, "Even if you are on the right track, you will get run over if you just sit there."

We should thank God that our legacy reveals that our conscientious citizen legislators have never, through fifty-four previous sessions, just "sat there", but have constantly kept us on the right track honestly and ethically and moved us forward to the position we have reached today.

To the families and friends of our recently departed Senators: George Unruh, Gil Strand, Harry Semerad, Kit Scherber, Ernie Livingston, Earl Kelly, Kent Jones, Mike Flatt, Lee Christensen, and LeRoy Erickson. Let me say this - We do thank you for sharing the time and talents of your loved ones with us for many sessions of this state Senate. They have left us with a countless number of fond memories. We respect and admire each one for the happy, productive days and months we enjoyed together in this Senate chamber. Most importantly, we thank them not only for being team players, but also, for the hundreds and thousands of hours they volunteered to help us make North Dakota a better place in which to live, in which to work, and in which to raise our children.

In conclusion, our former colleagues and distinguished Senators lived ethically and effectively the way they felt Christ said we should. To those who do that, God has but one thing to say, "Well done, good and faithful servant. Enter into the joy of Your Master." We cherish that gift for them.

We will not say goodbye to our ten public servants this afternoon - as always - let us just say, "We'll see you later." And we will!

Code of Federal Regulations, part 395, section 3, subsection b, relating to hours of service of drivers, and title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, part 395, section 8, requiring a driver's record of duty status, while exclusively engaged in the transportation of fertilizer or agricultural chemicals when the transportation is within a radius of fifty miles [80.47 kilometers] from the retailer's place of business and the employer maintains a daily record for each driver showing the time a driver reports for duty, the total number of hours a driver is on duty, and the time a driver is released from duty. The superintendent of the state highway patrol may adopt the hazardous materials regulations by reference and any adoption must be construed to incorporate amendments as may be made from time to time.
 - **SECTION 3. EMERGENCY.** This Act is declared to be an emergency measure."
