1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact chapters 4.1-01, 4.1-15, 4.1-19, 4.1-54, 4.1-55, 11-38,

2 11-39, and 15-12.1, a new section to chapter 19-02.1, and chapter 54-60.3 of the North Dakota

3 Century Code, relating to revisions of agriculture laws regarding the agriculture commissioner,

4 the northern crops institute, eggs, miscellaneous agriculture laws, the state fair association,

5 county extension agents, the county fair association, agricultural experiment stations, and the

6 agricultural products utilization commission; to amend and reenact subsection 2 of section

7 57-15-06.7 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to counties levying taxes to fund

8 extension agents; to authorize the legislative council to make certain statutory redesignations;

9 to repeal chapters 4-01, 4-02, 4-02.1, 4-05.1, 4-08, 4-11.1, 4-13.2, 4-14, 4-14.1, 4-14.2, 4-19,

10 4-21.1, 4-21.2, 4-22, 4-23, 4-24, 4-30, 4-32, 4-33, 4-35, 4-35.1, 4-35.2, 4-36, 4-37, 4-40, 4-41,

11 4-43, and 19-07 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the agriculture commissioner,

12 agricultural fair associations, the state fair association, agricultural experiment stations, county

13 agents, potato production contracts, the poultry division, unfair discrimination in the purchase of

14 farm products, the agriculturally derived fuel tax fund, the northern crops institute, forestry and

15 tree distribution, nurseries and nursery stock, the trees for North Dakota program, soil

16 conservation districts, agricultural conservation and adjustment, miscellaneous agriculture laws,

17 dairy products regulations, the interstate pest control compact, plant pests, the pesticide act,

18 chemigation regulation, pesticide and pesticide container disposal, the agricultural development

19 act, agriculture in the classroom, crop production products, industrial hemp, meatpacking plant

20 assistance, and eggs; to provide a penalty; and to provide an effective date.

### 21 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. Chapter 4.1-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted asfollows:

### 1 <u>4.1-01-01. Definitions.</u>

- 3 <u>1.</u> "Commissioner" means the agriculture commissioner or the designee or authorized
   4 representative of the commissioner.
- 5 <u>2.</u> <u>"Department" means the North Dakota department of agriculture.</u>

### 6 <u>4.1-01-02. Salary of agriculture commissioner.</u>

- 7 The annual salary of the agriculture commissioner is one hundred five thousand four
- 8 <u>hundred ninety-one dollars through June 30, 2016, and one hundred eight thousand six</u>
- 9 <u>hundred fifty-six dollars after that date.</u>

### 10 <u>4.1-01-03. Compelling attendance of witnesses and production of books and papers.</u>

- 11 The commissioner may compel the attendance of persons at hearings before the
- 12 commissioner, and the production of books and papers. The commissioner may examine
- 13 witnesses under oath and may administer oaths. The commissioner's office must file and
- 14 preserve any testimony taken by the commissioner.

### 15 <u>4.1-01-04. Exhibits at fairs.</u>

- 16 <u>The commissioner shall have charge of the exhibits of products or resources of the state</u>
- 17 which are shown at any fair or exposition in the United States. The commissioner shall
- 18 cooperate with any railroad company doing business in the state, and with any person
- 19 interested in securing an exhibit at any fair or exposition in the United States.

#### 20 <u>4.1-01-05. Cooperation with federal agencies in destruction of predatory animals,</u>

### 21 destructive birds, and injurious field rodents.

- 22 <u>1.</u> <u>The commissioner may cooperate with the United States department of agriculture,</u>
- 23 animal and plant health inspection service, or other appropriate federal agency, in the
   24 control and destruction of:
  - a. Fur-bearers and field rodents that are injurious to:
    - (1) Livestock;
    - (2) Poultry; or

1 The control and destruction of animals must be approved by the director of the game 2. 2 and fish department. The commissioner may enter written agreements with the animal 3 and plant health inspection service or other appropriate federal agency, and the 4 director of the game and fish department to determine: 5 The methods and procedures for the control and destruction of the birds and <u>a.</u> 6 animals: 7 The extent of supervision required by the commissioner and the animal and plant b. 8 health inspection service or other appropriate federal agency; and 9 The use and expenditure of the funds appropriated by the legislative assembly <u>C.</u> 10 for the control and destruction of the animals. 11 The commissioner, in cooperation with the animal and plant health inspection service <u>3.</u> 12 or other appropriate federal agency, may enter agreements with other governmental 13 agencies and with counties, associations, corporations, limited liability companies, or 14 individuals for control and destruction of birds and animals under this section. 15 4.1-01-06. Expenditures authorized - Who to approve vouchers - Qualifications of 16 hunters and trappers hired - When bounties not payable. 17 The commissioner may authorize expenditures from funds available for equipment. 18 supplies, and other expenses, including expenditures for personal services of hunters and 19 trappers, as may be necessary to execute the functions of the commissioner under section 20 4.1-01-05. Hunters and trappers employed under section 4.1-01-05 must be state residents. 21 Hunters and trappers employed under section 4.1-01-05 are not entitled to bounty provided by 22 state laws for the killing or extermination of birds and animals under that section. All vouchers 23 for expenditures made by the commissioner under this section must be approved by the duly 24 authorized agent of the animal and plant health inspection service or other appropriate federal 25 agency. 26 4.1-01-07. Disposition of proceeds of furs, skins, and specimens taken. 27 All furs, skins, and specimens taken by hunters and trappers paid out of funds appropriated 28 to carry out section 4.1-01-05 must be disposed of in a manner the commissioner determines is 29 in the best interest of the state. If furs, skins, or specimens are sold, the net proceeds of the 30 sales, up to fifteen thousand dollars per biennium, must be used by the United States

- 1 department of agriculture wildlife services to fund program activities <u>benefiting the state's</u>
- 2 <u>livestock producers.</u>

### 3 <u>4.1-01-08. Marketing bureau.</u>

- 4 The commissioner shall establish and maintain a marketing bureau to gather and
- 5 disseminate statistical information on any agricultural marketing problems of the state and to
- 6 <u>engage in marketing services of agricultural products. Any moneys received or generated by the</u>
- 7 pride of Dakota program must be deposited in the agriculture department operating fund in the

8 <u>state treasury.</u>

## 9 <u>4.1-01-09. Certified beef program.</u>

- 10 <u>The commissioner may collaborate with the state board of animal health, the North Dakota</u>
- 11 <u>stockmen's association, North Dakota state university beef systems, and the United States</u>
- 12 secretary of agriculture to develop a source-verified and process-verified beef marketing
- 13 program known as the certified beef program.

### 14 <u>4.1-01-10. Sustainably grown in North Dakota - Application - Logo - Promotion of</u>

- 22 label and market the commodity as being sustainably grown in North Dakota.
