## **ENGROSSED SENATE BILL NO. 2201**

- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact sections 15-10-55 and 15.1-19-25 of the North Dakota
- 2 Century Code, relating to the freedom of expression of student journalists.

## 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 4 **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 15-10-55 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 6 15-10-55. Student journalists Freedom of expression Civil remedy.
- 7 1. As used in this section:

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- a. "School-sponsored media" means any material that is prepared, substantially written, published, or broadcast by a student journalist at an institution under the supervision of the state boarda public institution of higher education, distributed or generally made available to members of the student body, and prepared under the direction of a student media adviser. The term does not include any media intended for distribution or transmission solely in the classroom in which the media is produced.
- b. "Student journalist" means a student of an institution under the supervision of the state boarda public institution of higher education who gathers, compiles, writes, edits, photographs, records, or prepares information for dissemination in school-sponsored media.
- c. "Student media adviser" means an individual employed, appointed, or designated by an institution under the supervision of the state boarda public institution of higher education to supervise or provide instruction relating to school-sponsored media.
- 2. Except as provided in subsection 3, a student journalist has the right to exercise freedom of speech and of the press in school-sponsored media, regardless of whether

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- 1 the media is supported financially by the institution or by use of facilities of the 2 institution or produced in conjunction with a class in which the student is enrolled. 3 Subject to subsection 3, a student journalist is responsible for determining the news, 4 opinion, feature, and advertising content of school-sponsored media. This subsection 5 may not be construed to prevent a student media adviser from teaching professional 6 standards of English and journalism to student journalists. A student media adviser 7 may not be dismissed, suspended, or disciplined for acting to protect a student 8 journalist engaged in a protected activity or for refusing to infringe on a protected 9 activity. 10
  - 3. This section does not authorize or protect expression by a student that:
    - Is libelous or slanderous:
    - b. Constitutes an unwarranted invasion of privacy;
    - Violates federal or state law; or C.
      - So incites students as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of d. an unlawful act, the violation of institution or state board of higher education policies, or the material and substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the institution.
  - <u>4.</u> An expression of free speech or freedom of the press made by a student journalist under this section may not be construed as an expression of school policy. A school official, employee, or parent or legal guardian of a student journalist may not be liable in any civil or criminal action for an expression of free speech or freedom of the press made by a student journalist, except in the case of willful or wanton misconduct by the individual.
  - **SECTION 2. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-19-25 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
    - 15.1-19-25. Student journalists Freedom of expression Civil remedy.
  - 1. As used in this section:
    - "School-sponsored media" means any material that is prepared, substantially a. written, published, or broadcast by a student journalist at a public school, distributed or generally made available to members of the student body, and prepared under the direction of a student media adviser. The term does not

1 include any media intended for distribution or transmission solely in the 2 classroom in which the media is produced. 3 b. "Student journalist" means a public school student who gathers, compiles, writes, 4 edits, photographs, records, or prepares information for dissemination in 5 school-sponsored media. 6 "Student media adviser" means an individual employed, appointed, or designated C. 7 by a school district to supervise or provide instruction relating to 8 school-sponsored media. 9 Except as provided in subsection 3, a student journalist has the right to exercise 2. 10 freedom of speech and of the press in school-sponsored media, regardless of whether 11 the media is supported financially by the school district, by use of facilities of the 12 school district, or produced in conjunction with a class in which the student is enrolled. 13 Subject to subsection 3, a student journalist is responsible for determining the news, 14 opinion, feature, and advertising content of school-sponsored media. So incites students as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of 25 an unlawful act, the violation of school district policy, or the material and 26 substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the school. 27 A school district may not authorize any prior restraint of any school-sponsored media 28 except when the media: 29 Is libelous or slanderous: a. 30 b. Constitutes an unwarranted invasion of privacy;

Violates federal or state law; or

- d. So incites students as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of
  an unlawful act, the violation of school district policies, or the material and
  substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the school.
  - 5. A school district may not sanction a student operating as an independent journalist.
  - 6. Each school district shall adopt a written student freedom of expression policy in accordance with this section. The policy must include reasonable provisions for the time, place, and manner of student expression. The policy may also include limitations to language that may be defined as profane, harassing, threatening, or intimidating. An expression of free speech or freedom of the press made by a student journalist under this section may not be construed as an expression of school policy. A school official, employee, or parent or legal guardian of a student journalist may not be liable in any civil or criminal action for an expression of free speech or freedom of the press made by a student journalist, except in the case of willful or wanton misconduct by the individual.
