A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of
public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf, and the North Dakota vision

3 services - school for the blind; to amend and reenact sections 15.1-02-02, 15.1-02-16,

4 15.1-06-19, and 15.1-27-16 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the salary of the

5 superintendent of public instruction, credentialing, school counselors, and administrative cost-

6 sharing for cooperating districts; to provide for a transfer; to provide an exemption; to provide for

7 a legislative management study; to provide for reports; to provide an expiration date; and to

8 declare an emergency.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the department of public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf, and North Dakota vision services - school for the blind for the purpose of defraying the expenses of those agencies, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023, as follows:

6 The 2021-23 biennium one-time funding amounts are not part of the entity's base budget for 7 the 2023-25 biennium. The department of public instruction, school for the deaf, and North 8 Dakota vision services - school for the blind shall report to the appropriations committees of the 9 sixty-eighth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning 10 July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION - TUITION APPORTIONMENT. The sum of \$433,020,000, included in the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, is from the state tuition fund in the state treasury. Any additional amount in the state tuition fund that becomes available for distribution to public schools is appropriated to the department of public instruction for that purpose for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

17 SECTION 4. ESTIMATED INCOME - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND. The 18 estimated income line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes the sum of 19 \$143,454,500 from the foundation aid stabilization fund for integrated formula payments. 20 SECTION 5. INTEGRATED FORMULA PAYMENTS AND SPECIAL EDUCATION 21 **CONTRACTS EXPENDITURE AUTHORITY.** The superintendent of public instruction may 22 expend funds included in the integrated formula payments and grants - special education 23 contracts line items in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act for paying grants for educational 24 services that were due in the 2019-21 biennium but which were not filed, claimed, or properly 25 supported by the education provider until after June 30, 2021. To be reimbursed under this 26 section, claims must be properly supported and filed with the superintendent of public 27 instruction by June 30, 2022.

SECTION 6. GIFTED AND TALENTED PROGRAM. The sum of \$800,000, included in the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, must be distributed to reimburse school districts or special education units for gifted and talented programs upon the submission of an application that is approved in accordance with guidelines

1 adopted by the superintendent of public instruction. The superintendent of public instruction 2 shall encourage cooperative efforts for gifted and talented programs among school districts and 3 special education units. SECTION 7. MEDICAID MATCHING FUNDING - SCHOOL APPROVAL - WITHHOLDING 4 5 AND DISTRIBUTION. 6 1. State school aid payments for special education must be reduced by the amount of 7 matching funds required to be paid by school districts or special education units for 8 students participating in the Medicaid program for the biennium beginning July 1, 9 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. Special education funds equal to the amount of the 10 matching funds required to be paid by the school district or special education unit must 11 be paid by the superintendent of public instruction to the department of human 12 services on behalf of the school district or unit. 13 2. State school aid payments for integrated formula payments must be reduced by the 14 amount of funds required to be paid by school districts for school approval for the 15 biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. 16 **SECTION 8. TRANSPORTATION GRANTS - DISTRIBUTION.** 17 1. During each year of the 2021-23 biennium, the superintendent of public instruction 18 shall calculate the payment to which each school district is entitled based on the state 19 transportation formula as it existed on June 30, 2001, except that the superintendent 20 shall provide reimbursement at the rate of: 21 One dollar and eleven cents per mile for schoolbuses having a capacity of ten or a. 22 more passengers; 23 Fifty-two cents per mile for vehicles having a capacity of nine or fewer b. 24 passengers; 25 Fifty cents per mile, provided: C. 26 The student being transported is a student with a disability, as defined in (1) 27 chapter 15.1-32; 28 The student's individualized education program plan requires that the (2) 29 student attend a public or a nonpublic school located outside the student's 30 school district of residence; 31 The student is transported by an adult member of the student's family; (3)

1			(4)	The student is transported in a vehicle furnished by the student's parents;

3			(6)	The reimbursement does not exceed two round trips daily between the

28	The inte	egrate	d for	mula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes
29	\$500,000 from the general fund for the purpose of providing annual grants to regional education			
30	associations for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. An annual			
31	grant of \$35,714 is provided to each regional education association that exists as of July 1,			

2021. Regional education associations that merge during the 2021-23 biennium are entitled to
 the annual grants that would have been paid to each of the member associations.

3 SECTION 11. POSTSECONDARY TRANSITIONAL GRANT PROGRAM FUNDING. The 4 integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes funding 5 for postsecondary transitional grants. The superintendent of public instruction shall provide 6 integrated formula payments to postsecondary transitional programs for eligible students 7 enrolled in a postsecondary transitional program within the state at the rate provided under 8 section 15.1-27-04.1. For purposes of this section, "eligible student" means a student with a 9 documented intellectual or developmental disability who is at least eighteen years of age but 10 has not reached the age of twenty-two, who has graduated from a public high school in the 11 state or obtained an equivalent degree, and who enrolls in a postsecondary transitional 12 program. By June thirtieth of each year, postsecondary transitional programs shall submit to the 13 superintendent of public instruction for the reimbursement of eligible students enrolled in the 14 program. Grant payments under this section may not exceed the per student rate under section 15 15.1-27-04.1. The superintendent of public instruction shall review and approve postsecondary 16 transitional programs and develop a system for the distribution of payments necessary to 17 implement this section. 18 SECTION 12. USE OF NEW MONEY - NONADMINISTRATIVE PERSONNEL 19 COMPENSATION INCREASES - REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT.

- During the 2021-23 biennium, the board of each school district shall use an amount
 equal to at least seventy percent of all new money received by the district, resulting
 from increases in the base integrated formula payment rate, to increase the
 compensation paid to non-administrative personnel.
- For purposes of this section, the superintendent of public instruction shall provide
 guidance to school districts regarding the calculation of the amount of new money
 resulting from increases in the base integrated formula payment rate during the
 2021-23 biennium.

28 SECTION 13. EXEMPTION - GENERAL EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT FEES AND

29 **DISPLACED HOMEMAKER DEPOSITS.** Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-15, the department

- 30 of public instruction may deposit indirect cost recoveries in its operating account. In addition,
- 31 any moneys collected by the department of public instruction for general educational

- 1 development fees and displaced homemakers deposits must be deposited in the public
- 2 instruction fund in the state treasury. Any funds deposited in the public instruction fund may only
- 3 be spent subject to appropriation by the legislative assembly.

4 SECTION 14. EXEMPTION - TRANSFER - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND.

5 Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-11, if, after the superintendent of public instruction complies

6 with all statutory payment obligations imposed for the 2019-21 biennium, any moneys remain in

- 7 the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 38 of the 2019
- 8 Session Laws, the lesser of \$23,887,064 or the remaining amount must be continued into the
- 9 2021-23 biennium and the office of management and budget shall transfer this amount into the
- 10 public instruction fund for the purpose of providing program and passthrough grants as
- 11 appropriated in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act.

12 SECTION 15. EXEMPTION - DYSLEXIA SCREENING PILOT PROGRAM.

13 Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-11, if, after the superintendent of public instruction complies

14 with all statutory payment obligations imposed for the 2019-21 biennium, any moneys remain in

- 15 the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 38 of the 2019
- 16 Session Laws, up to \$250,000 must be continued into the 2021-23 biennium for the purpose of
- 17 defraying the expenses of the dyslexia screening pilot program.

18 SECTION 16. EXEMPTION - STATE AUTOMATED REPORTING SYSTEM REWRITE. Up

19 to \$600,000 of the unexpended amount remaining from the one-time appropriation from the

20 foundation aid stabilization fund for the state automated reporting system rewrite, as authorized

21 in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 38 of the 2019 Session Laws, is not subject to the

22 provisions of section 54-44.1-11 at the end of the 2019-21 biennium, and may be continued into

- the 2021-23 biennium for the purpose of continuing the state automated reporting system
- 24 rewrite.

SECTION 17. STATE AID TO PUBLIC LIBRARIES. The grants line item in subdivision 2 of
 section 1 of this Act includes \$1,737,582 for aid to public libraries, of which no more than
 one-half may be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022.

28 SECTION 18. EXEMPTION - SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF - HIGHER EDUCATION

29 **INTERPRETER GRANT PROGRAM DISTRIBUTION.** The \$40,000 appropriated for the

30 purpose of providing grants to assist institutions under the control of the state board of higher

31 education with the cost of interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf or

1	hard of hearing in subdivision 3 of section 1 of chapter 38 of the 2019 Session Laws and any					
2	funding continued for this purpose from prior bienniums is not subject to section 54-44.1-11. Any					
3	funds remaining must be distributed pursuant to the provisions of this section:					
4	1.	The school for the deaf shall develop a formula to determine the grant amount for				
5		which an institution is eligible. The formula must be based on a uniform hourly				
6		reimbursement.				
7	2.	To obtain a grant under this section, an institution shall submit to the school for the				
8		deaf, at the time and in the manner directed by the school, invoices showing the				
9		amount expended for interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf				
10		or hard of hearing.				
11	3.	The school for the deaf may not distribute more than fifty percent of the amount				
12		appropriated during the first year of the biennium.				
13	4.	If any grant moneys remain undistributed at the end of the biennium, the school for the				
14		deaf shall provide additional prorated grants to institutions that incurred, during the				
15		biennium, hourly expenses in excess of the formula reimbursement level.

17		the school for the deaf shall consult with the institution and provide advice regarding				
18		the provision of services most appropriate to meet a student's needs.

If any school district receiving payments under this chapter or any special education 26 unit cooperates with another school district or special education unit to jointly employ. 27 both a superintendent and a business manager or to jointly employ both a special 28 education unit director and a business manager, the superintendent of public 29 instruction shall provide partial reimbursement of the combined salaries of the 30 superintendent and the business manager or partial reimbursement of the combined 31 salaries of the special education unit director and the business manager as follows:

3 SECTION 24. LEARNING LOSS, ACCELERATED LEARNING RECOVERY, AND

4 ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL EMERGENCY RELIEF FUND - REPORT TO

5 **LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT.** School districts receiving funds from the elementary and 6 secondary school emergency relief fund shall provide two narrative summary reports to the 7 superintendent of public instruction, including information regarding learning losses of students 8 identified within the district, including subgroup gaps; school district plans to accelerate learning 9 recovery for all students, including closing subgroup gaps; uses of elementary and secondary 10 school emergency relief funds, including the percentage of those funds expended in categories 11 determined by the superintendent of public instruction; and the impact elementary and 12 secondary school emergency relief fund expenditures had on accelerating the learning recovery 13 for the districts' students. The first school district report must be submitted to the superintendent 14 of public instruction by December 1, 2021. An aggregated report must be presented by the 15 superintendent of public instruction to the legislative management by June 1, 2022. The second 16 school district report must be submitted to the superintendent of public instruction by 17 December 1, 2022. An aggregated report must be presented by the superintendent of public 18 instruction to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly. 19 **SECTION 25. EXPIRATION DATE.** Section 22 of this Act is effective through June 30,

20 2024, and after that date is ineffective.

SECTION 26. EMERGENCY. The \$12,000,000 appropriated from the federal coronavirus relief fund, of which \$6,565,432 is in the operating expenses line item and \$5,434,568 is in the grants line item in section 1 and identified in sections 2 and 8 of Senate Bill No. 2018, as approved by the sixty-seventh legislative assembly, and the \$100,000 appropriated from the general fund for a motion picture production and recruitment grant in the grants line item in section 1 and identified in section 2 of Senate Bill No. 2018, as approved by the sixty-seventh legislative assembly, are declared to be an emergency measure.

28 SECTION 27. EMERGENCY. Senate Bill No. 2317, as approved by the sixty-seventh
