FIRST ENGROSSMENT with House Amendments **ENGROSSED SENATE BILL NO. 2003**

1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the North Dakota 2 university system; to create and enact a new chapter to title 15 of the North Dakota Century 3 Code, relating to a university system capital building fund; to amend and reenact subdivision c 4 of subsection 1 of section 15-10-48, subdivision k of subsection 1 of section 15-18.2-02, 5 sections 15-18.2-03, 15-18.2-05, and 54-44.1-11 of the North Dakota Century Code and 6 section 2 of chapter 53 of the 2019 Session Laws, relating to matching grants for the 7 advancement of academics, the higher education funding formula, the cancellation of 8 unexpended appropriations, and appropriations for higher education capital projects; to repeal 9 subdivision d of subsection 1 of section 15-10-48 and section 15-18.2-04 of the North Dakota 10 Century Code, relating to the eligibility of the university of North Dakota school of medicine and 11 health sciences to receive a matching grant for the advancement of academics and the 12 institutional size factor of the higher education funding formula; to provide for a transfer; to 13 provide for a report; to provide an exemption; to provide for a study; to provide a statement of 14 legislative intent; to provide a continuing appropriation; and to declare an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the state board of higher education and to the entities and institutions under the supervision of the board, for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the state board of higher education and the entities and institutions under the control of the board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023, as follows: Subdivision 1.

1 SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION - VALLEY CITY STATE UNIVERSITY - PURCHASE OF 2 LAND AUTHORIZED. The state board of higher education, acting for and through Valley City 3 state university, is authorized to purchase two parcels of land in Barnes county, described as 4 the south half of the east one-third of lot one, block four, of Andrus and Sifton's addition to the 5 city of Valley City, and the south one hundred feet of the west one-third of the east half and the 6 east one-third of the west half of lot one, block four, in Andrus and Sifton's addition to the city of 7 Valley City, from the Valley City state university foundation for the use and betterment of Valley 8 City state university. There is appropriated from other funds the sum of \$309,000, or so much of 9 the sum as may be necessary, to Valley City state university for the purposes of this section for 10 the period beginning with the effective date of this Act and ending June 30, 2023. The funding 11 provided in this section is considered a one-time funding item. 12 SECTION 4. ADDITIONAL FEDERAL, PRIVATE, AND OTHER FUNDS -13 **APPROPRIATION.** All funds, in addition to those appropriated in section 1 of this Act, from 14 federal, private, and other sources for competitive grants or other funds that the legislative 15 assembly has not indicated the intent to reject, including tuition revenue, received by the state 16 board of higher education and the institutions and entities under the control of the state board of 17 higher education, are appropriated to the board and those institutions and entities, for the 18 biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. All additional funds received under 19 the North Dakota-Minnesota reciprocity agreement during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, 20 and ending June 30, 2023, are appropriated to the state board of higher education for 21 reimbursement to institutions under the control of the board. 22 SECTION 5. TRANSFER - UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA SCHOOL OF MEDICINE 23 AND HEALTH SCIENCES OPERATIONS. The operations line item in subdivision 5 of section 1 24 of this Act includes a funding allocation from the higher education per student credit-hour 25 funding formula attributable to inflation during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending 26 June 30, 2023. Based on the recommendation of the commissioner of higher education, a 27 portion of the allocation may be transferred by the state board of higher education between the 28 university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences and the university of North 29 Dakota. 30 SECTION 6. TRANSFER - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND -31 UNIVERSITY SYSTEM CAPITAL BUILDING FUND. The office of management and budget

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- 1 shall transfer \$19,000,000 from the strategic investment and improvements fund to the
- 2 university system capital building fund during the period beginning with the effective date of this
- 3 Act, and ending June 30, 2023, as requested by the commissioner of higher education. Funding
- 4 transferred pursuant to this section is to be allocated to each institution as follows:

 - 1.15 if the number of credit-hours is at least 90,000130,000 but less than d. 120,000135,000;
 - 1.20 if the number of credit-hours is at least 80,000 120,000 but less than e. 90,000130,000:
 - 1.30 if the number of credit-hours is at least 70,000 but less than 80,000 120,000; f.

 - If the square footage of an institution, when divided by the institution's weighted credithours results in a quotient greater than 5.00, the state board of higher education shall multiply the product determined under section 15-18.2-02 by a factor of 1.00. Forpurposes of this subsection, the square footage of an institution includes real property as determined by the state board of higher education in accordance with section 15-18.2-04.
 - If the number of credit-hours completed by an institution eauseswould cause a decrease in the credit completion factor for that institution, the new credit completionfactor shall not be in effect for calculation purposes for the first two fiscal years following the change compared to the credit completion factor the institution was entitled to receive during the 2017-19 biennium, the state board of higher education shall multiply the product determined under section 15-18.2-02 by a credit growth factor of 1.0 for credits in excess of the factor the institution was entitled to receive

1 during the 2017-19 biennium. Any weighted credit-hours multiplied by a credit growth 2 factor under this section must have a weight of 1.0 under section 15-18.2-02. The 3 state board of higher education shall multiply the remaining weighted credits by the 4 credit completion factor the institution was entitled to receive during the 2017-19 5 biennium. 6 4.3. For purposes of this section, the number of credit-hours must be those determined by 7 the state board of higher education in accordance with section 15-18.2-01. 8 SECTION 13. AMENDMENT. 3	SECTION 14. A new chapter to title 15 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and

- building fund. Any institution under the control of the state board of higher education that has

 - 6. Authorized ongoing information technology projects.
 - Office of management and budget to cancel unexpended appropriations When they may continue. (Effective after July 31, 20212023) The office of management and budget, thirty days after the close of each biennial period, shall cancel all unexpended appropriations or balances of appropriations after the expiration of the biennial period during which they became available under the law. Unexpended appropriations for the state historical society are not subject to this section and the state historical society shall report on the amounts and uses of funds carried over from one biennium to the appropriations committees of the next subsequent legislative assembly. The appropriation for the agriculture products development center project must be continued into the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021, and is available only if North Dakota state university certifies to the industrial commission and the director of the office of management and budget that \$20,000,000 of local and other funds has been obtained for the project or if North Dakota state university receives approval for a change in project scope from the legislative assembly or budget section pursuant to section 48-01.2-25.

SECTION 17. REPEAL. Subdivision d of subsection 1 of section 15-10-48 of the North Dakota Century Code is repealed.

SECTION 18. REPEAL. Section 15-18.2-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is repealed.

SECTION 19. CAMPUS CAPITAL PROJECTS - PROJECT MANAGEMENT. During the period beginning with the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 2023, each capital project authorized by the state board of higher education must have adequate project management oversight by either an institution official or a representative of an external entity. An institution may seek assistance from the North Dakota university system office for project management oversight of a capital project.

SECTION 20. UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA - TECHNOLOGY ACCELERATOR BUILDING REFINANCING. The state board of higher education, acting for and through the university of North Dakota, may enter into a refinancing agreement with a private entity for the technology accelerator building during the period beginning with the effective date of this Act and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 21. TRANSFER OF DAKOTA INSTITUTE INVENTORY. Bismarck state college may transfer any rights, title, interests, copyrights, and inventory of any of the Dakota institute's publications, books, or other documents or productions, regardless of format, to the author or

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- producer of the document or production for the period beginning with the effective date of this

 Act, and ending June 30, 2023.

 SECTION 22. EXEMPTION TRANSFER AUTHORITY LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT

 REPORT. Notwithstanding section 54-16-04, the office of management and budget shall

 transfer appropriation authority from the operations to the capital assets line items within

 - SECTION 24. EXEMPTION PROJECT AUTHORIZATIONS. Any unexpended amounts remaining from the \$49,900,000 appropriated from the general fund for capital projects at institutions under the control of the state board of higher education in section 2 of chapter 53 of the 2019 Session Laws are not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from the appropriations are available to the respective institutions to complete the projects during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

21 SECTION 25. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - STUDENT AFFORDABILITY.

During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall study higher education student affordability, including all forms of financial assistance available for students enrolled at institutions of higher education in the state. The study must include a review of available scholarships, student loan programs, waivers, grants, and any other forms of student financial assistance available for students enrolled at institutions of higher education in the state. The study must also include a review of the eligibility requirements and other criteria relating to each program, and their impact on the financial cost and utilization of each program. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.
