**Testimony of
Representative Lonny Winrich
In
Support of HCR 3055**

Chairman Mutch and members of the Senate Industry, Business & Labor Committee, I am Representative Lonny Winrich from District 18 in Grand Forks and I appear before you this morning as the prime sponsor of HCR3055. I hope to convince you to give this resolution favorable consideration. Early in this legislative session, I introduced HB1403 to address the issue of accountability for economic development subsidies. That bill was defeated in the house. I would like to think that the opposition to the bill was not due to an unwillingness to hold businesses accountable for their expenditures of public funds but rather manifested a feeling that the proposed bill was premature and, in fact, might not be inclusive enough. I am encouraged in that belief by the fact that several colleagues who voted against HB1403 have encouraged me to submit this study resolution.

Governments at the state and local level work very hard to encourage existing businesses to relocate in their jurisdictions and to encourage the growth of new business. These efforts usually involve the subsidizing of private businesses with public funds. The subsidies take various forms and include outright grants to new and developing companies, loans, loan guarantees, reduced interest rates, tax increment financing, and tax exemptions from sales, income, or property taxes. There seems to be a general consensus that, although we are not sure how effective these incentives may be, we can't afford to discontinue them because that would leave us unilaterally disarmed in the battle for "economic development." If we, as a state or a community, don't offer these incentives and everyone else does, then obviously businesses will go elsewhere and we will lose out.

I confess that I am not prepared to challenge that assumption. But I do think that we should attempt to gather information on just how effective the many forms of business subsidies are. HCR3055 asks the Legislative Council to study the feasibility of collecting information on various economic development incentives and creating a reporting system that would make it possible to evaluate and compare the effectiveness of those programs. Wouldn't it be great if we as legislators had data showing that in certain economic situations a new business development is aided more by a low interest loan where perhaps the state subsidizes the loan to achieve the low rate than it would be by an investment tax credit on corporate income tax? We would be in a much better position to allocate the state's scarce resources among the many demands for support of economic development. The Department of Economic Development and Finance (or a new Department of Commerce) would be in much better position administer the various programs created by the legislature in different economic situations.

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, this is information we need to do our jobs well and it is information that several administrative departments of state government need to do their jobs. I urge you to give a DO PASS recommendation to HCR3055.
