Minutes:

The meeting was called to order. All committee members present. Hearing was opened on HCR 3064 directing the Legislative Council to study workers' compensation fraud by employers, employees, attorneys, health care providers, and rehabilitation service providers in order to identify the financial impact of such fraud on the ND workers' compensation fund, the most appropriate method of addressing such fraud, and the cost of addressing such fraud.

Representative Mary Ekstrom, District 11, cosponsor. We usually look at employees when talking about workers' compensation fraud. There are other types of fraud that should be looked at : employers (do not declare all employees, classify them incorrectly to get lower premiums, etc.), providers (reimbursement methods, medical care really being provided, etc..) ... Studying all kinds of fraud will make sure that we have all bases covered. This is a good idea urge do pass.

Senator Espgaard: I presume that the recovered amount includes the money they won't have to spend?

J Leer: About 90% is because people are not covered., this are civil cases. Sample of criminal fraud would be: uninsured employee suffers accident and employer says he is not employee but a contract laborer.

Senator Every: How do investigations come about? Tips?

J Leer: Normally through tips, referrals from analysts (inconsistencies in reports) and from policy holders and claims division staffs. Information gathered during investigation is confidential and protected by statute.
