(2518) Jerry Coleman, Assistant Director, School Finance and Organization, Department of Public Instruction See Attached Testimony.

Coleman: we want to go from paper form to electronic reporting.

Rep. Hawken: Will that be 400 cells?

Coleman: no new information, collecting current information, on-line system, web based. As data is due, the districts will go on line and complete form. This should be more timely and accurate information.

Rep. Mueller What is your rational for cutting the county superintendent out of the loop?

Coleman: Currently only 1/2 the counties employ county superintendents now. The system really isn't working that well now and the other is to streamline the reporting process.

Rep. Sitte Doesn't every county have Superintendent of School.

Coleman: No, they can choose not to employ, they have probably appointed someone to do the duties of the position, It usually falls on the auditor.

Rep. Hunsakor : In visiting with the county superintendents, when students move around very often during the school year, One of those school districts may claim that particular student, the numbers are being tweaked. Now if it runs through the county, they see the name and they know the student.

Coleman: That additional check can work for the smaller district, but for the larger ones, they have to many names. As far as the duplicate names, once we collect information in a district, we have some capability to review that type of information.

Rep. Hunsakor You are pretty good tab on this?

Coleman: with the electronic process we are able to do better than what we are currently doing.

Bonnie Johnson, Cass County Coordinator, employed by the Cass County Board of Commissioners.

(3375) Cass County was instrumental in working through the options with regard to the superintendent schools position in county government. County government didn't need to be in the school business and so cutting out the superintendent of schools as an option for counties was something that took out the middle man in those services. This bill 1166, assists in cutting out further middle man services for county government. And allows the Department of Public Instruction to deal directly with the schools for the exchange of data.
