Chairman Keiser opened the hearing on HB 1475. HB 1475 relates to the creation of the beginning again ND pilot program.

Rep. Myxter, introduced the bill.

Rep. Myxter: HB 1475 is an economic development bill aimed at smaller communities. It advocates a pilot program implemented by the commerce department and provides a way for smaller communities to promote businesses. In section one, the bill requires that three cities be selected for the pilot program. One city with fewer than five hundred people, one city with between five hundred and fifteen hundred people and the third between fifteen hundred and three thousand people. Section two requires that the commerce department collect data for many and all available sources about these three cities and this information is compiled and resources are found in and around those cities is used to consider possible business development. Section three provides that he information assembled shall be used to assist the city in producing a strategic plan of development. Rep. Myxter goes on to read the bill aloud to the committee. See the bill and read to obtain the remainder.

Rep. Ekstrom, spoke in support of the bill. See written testimony.

Rep. Thorpe: How do you determine which three cities are chosen?

Rep. Keiser: Where is the appropriation section?

Rep. Keiser: We need it on the bill.

Rep. Ekstrom: This got kicked out as a do pass and recommended to appropriations.

Rep. Keiser: That is correct, but if it coming from the general fund, there should be a fiscal note on the bill. I think we need an amendment.

Rep. Keiser: In 2005, was there some type of participation requirement?

Rep. Ekstrom: I don't recall but we may have.

Rep. Kasper: I'm trying to figure out what we do with the ones we develop and a data base of skills and residence, what type of data are you looking for?

Rep. Ekstrom: This is based on a program out of the University of Nebraska. They have already detailed questionnaires that they use.

There were no further questions. The hearing was closed. No action was taken at this time.

Assemble and compile asset information: \$30,000 (\$15,000 per community)

Develop two strategic plans: \$60,000 (\$30,000 per community)

Report to the Legislature: No additional expenditures

Biennium Total: \$90,000

*It is assumed that an electronic data base would not be developed during the pilot period due to the fact that data from only two communities would be involved in the program. If the program became successful and additional communities were added, it would be economical to appropriate funds for the development of a specific data base. If the pilot program expanded to cover additional communities, expenditures would increase to cover the expanded

scope of the program.

Mr. Chairman and members of the IBL committee, for the record, my name is Mary Ekstrom and I represent District 11 in south central Fargo.

I hope you will not treat this bill unfavorably simply because of my defection from this committee. In truth, Mr. Chairman and committee it is a delight to back before you again. Yes, this is the same concept that I presented to you in the 2005 session which this committee voted out with a Do Pass recommendation.

Last session this concept bore a fiscal note of \$68,800 – this time the price has gone up to \$135,000 – so we are paying for our lack of action.

I have to ask you. What are you willing to try, to promote economic development?

Beginning Again North Dakota is a concept to encourage <u>small</u> business development in smaller places.

We, as a State, are a community of 640,000 people – it's been said – that we just have very long streets. The big four, Fargo, Grand Forks, Bismarck, and Minot probably have the critical mass necessary in terms of population for long term sustainability.

This bill is aimed at communities of fewer than 3500. That means that exactly 13 cities do not qualify to apply for this pilot program. That's right, if your town is smaller than Beulah than your town is on the list. I have included a list of cities by their population with my testimony.

This concept says that we look at the human and physical assets of a community. All of us have attended meetings where we discuss (endlessly) the needs of our communities. What do our communities NEED(?): literally everything – infrastructure, day care, arts and entertainment facilities and more businesses that pay good wages.

Beginning Again is a bottom up approach that will tell us what we have, not what we need – that tells us what we can do with what we have.

Small businesses are hard to find - new ideas are in even shorter supply.

This bill says we believe in the inherent worth, the values, skills and talents that already exist within our people and it says we can invest in the ideas of our people to provide economic development, good jobs and hope.

I have suggested that the Department of Commerce administer this program as a pilot. I suggest that we try this in three small communities in North Dakota — one with a

population of not more than 500, one with a population of 500 but not more than 1500, and one with a population greater than 1500 but not more than 3000.

I have long believed that there are two things we need to change if we are to grow as a state. The first is attitude, that is: what do we believe about ourselves? The second is image – what does the rest of the world believe about North Dakota? A program like Beginning Again North Dakota will showcase the talents and gifts of our citizens for ourselves as well as the rest of the world.

There is a shining example of what one small entrepreneur has been able to do. Samsara Cues is located in Rugby, North Dakota (population 2,900). This small business makes custom pool cues, employs 10 people and exports their product all around the world. This is the kind of business I would hope would come out of this proposal.

I would respectfully ask for a Do Pass recommendation.
